

The long passage of the Queen has been caused by her southern route. The weather generally was moderate, but she got into the Gulfstream, and thus was retarded at least two days. The action of the stream was equal to 250 miles of latitude.

The New York Herald says:—"In a commercial point of view we have important news. The Liverpool had not arrived when the British Queen sailed—nor was there any intelligence of the suspension of the United States Bank—great anxiety was felt for her arrival. According to our accounts by letters and papers, it would seem that Mr. Jaudon's difficulties are not over. The loan on London for £500,000 had not been filled up beyond dispute—and a great controversy had broken out in the press respecting its character. The negotiation for the loan in Holland had failed. Cotton had fallen three eighths of a penny in Liverpool, and yarns one-half penny in Manchester—most unlooked for and unprecedented decline—and fears were entertained that new difficulties would break out in the money market. If such was the condition of money and commercial affairs before the arrival of the Liverpool, what will they be after the arrival? She carried out \$350,000 in specie, part of which was for the United States Bank.—This steamer is now on her way to New York, having sailed on the 16th inst. and is out eight days. In a another week we may expect her with the funds."

We have still a continuance of most delightful weather, almost unprecedented at this late season of the year—the channel of the river is entirely clear of ice, and there has been but a few days interruption to the navigation as far as this place, since the first indications of winter appeared.

The Receiver General acknowledges the receipt of Fifteen pounds from the Priest at Madawaska, being a conscientious restitution on the part of one of the inhabitants of that Settlement of duties on Timber clandestinely passed.

FESTIVAL OF SAINT ANDREW.

On Monday evening the 24th December, the Members of the Fredericton Society of Saint Andrew celebrated their 15th Anniversary, by dining together at Jackson's Hotel. The Company sat down to dinner at 6 o'clock, and among the guests were Lieut. Col. Maxwell, K. H., Major Cairnes and other Officers of the 36th Regt., the Hon. the Solicitor General, L. A. Wilnot, Esq., M. P., and a number of Gentlemen connected with the Sister Societies of Saint George and Saint Patrick.

The dinner furnished by Mr. Jackson was spoken of by all present in terms of the highest commendation, and the wines were excellent. A portion of the fine Band of the 36th Regt. were in the hall, and during dinner and throughout the evening entertained the party with a variety of National and appropriate airs.

On the cloth being removed, John Gregory, Esq. first Vice-President, who had filled the Chair in the absence of the President, James Taylor, Esq., proposed the usual Toast of the Day,—

1st. Saint Andrew's Day, and all who honor it.—
"Kail Bross of Old Scotland."
2d. Our Queen—Queen Victoria—God bless her.—
"Air, 'God save the Queen.'"
3d. The Queen Dowager and Royal Family.—
"Our Queen is the Wife of a Sailor."
4th. His Excellency Sir John Harvey, our Lieut. Governor.—
"Who would refuse to a Sovereign his Heart."

This Toast was received with the utmost enthusiasm, and brought a reply from Lieut. Col. Maxwell, which produced a scene of hilarity and good feeling seldom equalled, and not to be surpassed.—The gallant Colonel warmly thanked the Gentlemen present for the enthusiastic manner in which His Excellency's health was received—made some very happy remarks with reference to the difficulties with which His Excellency was surrounded in the early part of last Winter, and warmly eulogized the course of policy adopted by His Excellency, by which the calamity of a rupture with the United States had happily been avoided; and concluded with assuring the Gentlemen present that no man in or out of the Province had or could have his best interests more deeply at heart.

During this address, the gallant Colonel was greeted with loud and long continued cheering.

9th. Sir Colin Campbell, and the gallant Inhabitants of Nova Scotia.—
"Air, 'The Campbell's are coming.'"

The Chairman introduced this Toast with a well merited compliment to our brethren in Nova Scotia, who on a late occasion so gallantly tendered their aid to assist in protecting the rights of this Province and of the British Empire.

This Toast was received with rapturous applause, and responded to by A. Scott, Esq., in a neat and appropriate speech.

Charles P. Wetmore, Esq., in the absence of L. A. Wilnot, Esq., who retired early in the evening, ably responded to this Toast.

12. Our Countrymen Lieutenants General Sir Howard Douglas, and Sir Archibald Campbell, Barons, the Patrons of our Society.—
"Air, 'Auld Lang Syne.'"

This Toast again brought the Solicitor General upon his legs, who in a speech of considerable length thanked the Society for the manner in which it was received. He bestowed a warm eulogium on his friend Sir Archibald Campbell. The feeling manner in which he spoke of the gallant veteran, did honor alike to his head and to his heart.—It is hardly necessary to add, that on this as on all former occasions, the Hon. Gentleman was exceedingly happy in the numerous responses which he was called upon to make during the evening.

13. Lady Harvey, and the fair Daughters of New Brunswick.—
"Air, 'Here's a Health to all good Lasses.'"

Major Cairnes, 36th Regiment, returned thanks. 14th. Lieut. Colonel Maxwell, and the 36th Regiment.

This Toast again called up the gallant Colonel, who as usual made a most happy reply to it.

The Chairman then proposed successively the Clergy, the Bench and Bar of New Brunswick, and the Sister Societies of St. George and St. Patrick.

Want of space prevents the publication of the remarks elicited by these Toasts,—and from the same cause we can only notice a few of the Volunteer Toasts, among which were—The Duke of Wellington, "the Hero of a hundred fights,"—Major Brooks, and the gallant 69th.—The President of the United States,—Our Father Land,—The health of Lieut. Colonel Maxwell, upon his announcing his intention of becoming a Member of the Society.—The Staff of His Excellency Sir John Harvey,—Major General Scott, United States' Army,—&c. &c. &c.
