LONDON, 11th July.

THE BUDGET.—In the House of Commons, July 5th, the Chancellor of the Exchequer rose to bring forward the financial statement for the year. The right hon. gentleman said in the statement he was about to make he should have to crave the indulgence of the house, as it would take some time in explaining the important resolutions he had to propose. The first resolution related to the present state of the finances of the country; and in bringing that subject forward, he must allude to the new position in which he was placed. It had always been his duty to reduce the taxation as much as possible, but difficulties of a new character had lately sprung up. If they went into Committee of Supply, they were told that the navy was in such a very low state that it was disgraceful to the country. Again, it was said that the marines were not an efficient corps, and therefore the government were compelled to ask for money grants which they otherwise would not have thought necessary. The new Poor Law, for instance, had been beneficial to the agriculturists and others, but it had entailed on the country an expense of £73,000; the registration of electors, again, had cost the country £20,000; the great enterprise of steam communication with India had cost £109,000. [Hear, hear.] There were also many other matters which the house approved of, the money for which fell very heavy upon the public revenue. He did not complain of this, but he mentioned it to show the heavy charges on the revenue in modern times as compared to former years. The right hon. gentleman then stated the votes for the army, navy, and ordnance, which exceeded this year former grants by £12,000. If, therefore, large grants were made in supply, the house must not find fault with the individual who had the charge of the finances of the country. He then entered into a comparative statement of the different items of revenue during the past and preceding years. The estimate he made of the revenue for the past year was £47,271,000, it had produced £47,833,000, being an excess of £561,315, over the estimate. The expenditure of the country had, however, far exceeded his calculations; that expense was occasioned by the defence of Canada, and other causes. The right hon. gentleman then enumerated the different causes of increased expense. The estimate of the total expense which he had made for the past year was £47,477,000, it had, however, amounted to £48,263,000, being an excess over the estimate of £785,000. In the estimate the increase had not been great—it had been steady and progressive. In some small articles, however, there had been a trifling decrease. On the whole, the returns from the customs were satisfactory, and showed an improvement in trade. In most of the important branches of Excise there had been a considerable increase, but in some, as in the customs, there was a decrease, he might mention hops & one or two other branches. In the article of glass, the duty on which had been reduced, there was a considerable increase. [Cheers.] In soap there was an increase; in the spirits there was an increase, and there was nothing in the Excise estimate which could create distrust. [Hear, hear.] Under the head of stamps there was nothing worthy of mention.—He should now remark on the Post Office revenue, which had not realized quite so much as he had anticipated; that, however, might be accounted for by increased charges of conveyance by railroads, &c. The increase on the quarter's revenue derived from the Post Office for the quarter ending the 5th April was £43,382, being about 19 per cent. The expense incurred in Canada he wished to be clearly stated to the house; he would conceal nothing. The complete accounts from Canada had not been received to a later date than March 31, 1838. The total extra expenditure, in consequence of the disturbances in Canada, was in 1837 and 1838, £245,000, in 1838 and 1839, £701,000, making a total in two years of £946,000. A vote of £500,000 had been granted, and therefore, the sum of £447,000 remained to be provided for. The total extra expenditure of Canada for the last three years, as near as the same could be ascertained was £1,053,000. [Hear, hear.] That was not the proper time to discuss the policy adopted towards Canada, but he thought the house would be of opinion, as long as the colonies were retained, all means necessary must be used for their protection. [Hear, hear, hear.] The right hon. gentleman then went into a detail of the increased military force, and other causes, which had led to the extra expense in Canada. [Left sitting.]

We perceive with pleasure that Mr. Palmer gave notice last night that he would this evening, move for leave to bring in a bill to prevent the loading of timber upon the decks of vessels engaged in the timber trade. This is following up the report of the committee on shipwrecks with laudable celerity. To pass such a bill as Mr. Palmer's should occupy but little delay, as it cannot be complicated or prolix, it being, we presume, but a simple prohibition.—*London Shipping Gazette, July 4.*

SESSION OF PARLIAMENT.—From the state of public business, it is understood that Parliament will be prorogued about the 24th of July.

AMERICAN BOUNDARY QUESTION.—Her Majesty's Government has selected two Commissioners to proceed immediately by the British Queen to North America, to examine into the possibility of simplifying this arduous undertaking, and bringing the question to a prompt and honorable settlement. Lieutenant Colonel Mudge, of the Royal Engineers, an officer of high reputation in geodetic operations, is one of the Commissioners. The other is Mr. Featherstonhaugh. This gentleman has been selected as well for his scientific attainments, his very intimate acquaintance with the details of this troublesome question, as for the topographical knowledge which his extensive travels in North America have enabled him to acquire.—*Globe. (Ministerial paper.)*

THE BIRMINGHAM RIOTS.—Yesterday morning at two o'clock, another draft of the metropolitan police was despatched to Birmingham by the railway. Notwithstanding the magistrates have sworn in several special constables within the last few days, it has been

deemed advisable, from the present state of the town, to augment the civil force rather than have recourse to military aid, should another outbreak of violence take place on the part of the Chartists. When the last accounts left, Birmingham was in a perfect tranquil state.—*Id.*

LONDON, Wednesday evening, July 10.—The permanent securities have advanced a fraction on yesterday's quotations. Consols left off at 92½ to 4 for Money, and 93½ to 3 for Account.

We have received by express, via Vienna, a letter from our correspondent in the Turkish Capital, dated the 19th of June, being two days later than the intelligence which we have published via Smyrna. The present communication adds, however, little to our previous information. It mentions the receipt at Constantinople of despatches from Hafiz Pacha, the Turkish Commander-in-Chief, claiming the advantage in the affair with the Egyptian cavalry.

Hafiz Pacha is to assume the offensive when Mehmet Ali Bey, the bearer of the firman of investiture and the Sultan's instructions, shall have arrived at his camp, Mehmet having proceeded to Samson on the 12th ult. Our correspondent says a decisive action was not likely to take place till a few weeks after Hafiz Pacha had concentrated the various divisions which are at Kutaya, Angora, and Bagdad.

The Turkish fleet was at Lemnos, and had been completely victualled. It was to sail on the 20th ult. for Rhodes. "It is expected," says our correspondent, "the French squadron will come in time to prevent mischief. Up to this day (the 19th June), notwithstanding, there are only four ships under Admiral Lande at Smyrna, and these it is probable would gain little by interference in the quarrel, but, on the contrary, only share the impending disgrace of their friends the Egyptians."

No mention is made by our correspondent of the part Lord Ponsonby is playing in the Eastern drama, nor is there the most distinct allusion as to the line of conduct which will be pursued by the British squadron in the event of a collision between the Turkish and Egyptian fleets.

The French Chamber of Deputies on Tuesday came to a very unexpected decision respecting the Ministerial proposition of a loan of five millions of francs to the Versailles Railroad (Left Bank) Company. The Chamber has decided by a majority of 166 against 118 in favour of the Government loan. Thus, between Versailles and Paris there will be now two railroads, one departing from the Champs d'Anten, and the other from the Faubourg St. Germain. The Left Bank Shares rose 12½ 50c. on Wednesday.

On Tuesday the Peers met to deliberate on the verdict on several of the insurgents of the 12th and 13th May last. Sixty questions, upon each of which a ballot will take place, were submitted to them, and the fate of Barbes, Mialon, and Martin Bernard gave rise to animated discussions, the result of which would not, it is expected, be known before Thursday. In the event of any prisoners being condemned to death, they will be executed 24 hours after the sentence, and Louis Philippe alone can save them—an event of extreme improbability, as every public office in Paris was put in a state of defence for the day of execution. Additional troops had been summoned to the French capital, which gave rise to the supposition that mercy would not be extended.

It is presumed from the number of insurgents of May yet to be tried, that the affair will not be concluded before the end of year. A numerous and highly respectable public meeting, at which the Lord Mayor presided, was held in London on the 10th of July, to consider the propriety of passing resolutions in favour of Mr. Rowlands Hill's plan of a uniform penny postage, and of petitioning Parliament to give effect to the measure this season. Several members of Parliament were present. Several resolutions were passed, and a petition to Parliament agreed upon.

In the House of Commons, July 10, Lord G. Somerset presented a petition praying for protection to, and an extension of the Church in the Colonies, and two petitions against the Government plan of education.

The British Queen, Lieut. ROBERTS, R. N. Commander, arrived at New York early on the morning of the 28th ult. in fifteen days and a half from Portsmouth, whence she sailed on the 12th, bringing London dates of the evening of the 11th. The Queen is said to be indeed a noble vessel, and capable of being made the most comfortable passage ship that ever floated; her cost is estimated at \$375,000. She was to sail from New York on the 1st August, in company with the *Great Western*. All England are on the *qui vive* to ascertain which of the magnificent floating palaces will make the quickest trip home,—large odds are offered on the Queen.—We regret to say that the same gloomy condition of monetary and mercantile affairs still continued to prevail in England. The pressure for money has been diminished in only the very slightest degree. Cotton had fallen in Liverpool ½ per lb., since the sailing of the *Great Western*, and persons desirous of speculating, might almost make their own prices. Nothing now is of so much importance in the affairs of the Mother Country, as the prospects of the harvest, which we are truly happy to learn are very promising.

The Commissioners appointed by the British Government on the Eastern Boundary, Colonel MUDGE and Mr. FEATHERSTONHAUGH, arrived at New York in the *Great Western*; those gentlemen, we understand, are expected here in a day or two, to confer with his Excellency Sir JOHN HARVEY, on the important object of their mission.
