He then entered into a comparative statement of the different items of revenue during the past and preceding years. The estimate he made of the revenue for the past year was £47,271,000, it had produced £47,833,000, being an excess of 611,3151. over the estimate. The expenditure of the country had, however, far exceeded his calculations; that expense was occasioned by the defence of Canada, and other causes. The right hon, gentleman then enumerated the different causes of increased expense. The estimate of the total expense which he had made for the past year was 47,477,000, it had, however, amounted to £48,263,000, being an excess over the estimate of £785,000. In the customs the increase had not been great -- it had been steady and progressive. In some small articles, however, there had been a triffing decrease. On the whole, the returns from the customs were satisfactory, and showed an improvement in trade. #### DISASTROUS FIRE.

Yesterday morning about half past one clock a Fire broke out in the workshop of Mr. W. S. Estey, Blacksmith, which in less than two hours extended its ravages to an extent greater than was ever witnessed in Fredericton ince the year 1825.

When the fire was first discovered, the flames were bursting from the roof of the Smithey, and in a few minutes communicated with Mr. Estey's Barn, and an extensive range of outbuildings belonging to the Messrs. Beckwith. The alarm bells were rung and although the attendance of the different Engine Companies and the regiment in garrison were prompt, it was soon evident that no effort could save the property already on Fire.

The attention of the fire wardens was then principally directed to the removal of goods and furniture from the adjoining buildings, but we regret to add that in consequence of the very crowded state of the back stores and barns, together with the direction of the wind their efforts proved ineffectual. Before 3 o'clock the dwelling house of Mr. Estey, Mr. F. E.Beckwith, Mr. Bedell-the whole of the extensive premises occupied by Messrs. G. & J. Munro were in flames, and the wind continuing to blow steadily altho' on the Clearwater Brook, not complied with, no not strong from the south-west, the prospect of arresting the devouring element was faint, and the danger of a complete conflagation of Besides the buildings above enumerated the store and back store belonging to Mr. T. It would be impossible to estimate exactly the amount of property destroyed by this disastrous occurrence, but those who are likely to be best informed on the subject, estimate the entire loss at from Ten to Eleven Thousand Pounds, and the greater amount of this sum is uninsured. We understand that the Messrs. Munro are by far the greatest sufferers, they had but just commenced business and have lost very heavily without having any insurance, but we are certain that if perseverance and industry can insure success they will soon recover from the effects of this unfortunate and unexpected calamity.
