His Excellency, we understand, was much pleased with the attention shown him, as well as gratified by the fine views which the excursion afforded. In the evening, His Excellency met a large company at Dinner at the City residence of His Honor the Chief Justice.

His Excellency returned to Head Quarters in the steamer *Norfolk* on Thursday.

The following is a copy of the Regimental Order issued after the Review on Tuesday:—

SAINT JOHN, 30th July, 1839.

DISTRICT GENERAL ORDER.

Major General Sir John Harvey has much pleasure in being able to speak in terms of unqualified approbation of the state in which he has found the 69th Regiment, both in their Quarters and in the Field of Exercise. The disadvantages of their long residence in the West Indies, and their very recent concentration in this command, would have entitled the Regiment to much consideration on the part of a General Officer now making the inspection: but it has been evident to the Major General that no such allowance is required; on the contrary, in respect to discipline and system, health and efficiency, Major General Sir John Harvey will be enabled to report the 69th Regiment in a perfectly serviceable condition, and the Major General renders his sincere thanks to Major Brooks, the Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers of the Corps for having by their zealous exertions brought it into its present most creditable state.

MURDER.—A most atrocious and wanton murder was committed at the house of Mr. Terence Ferguson, on the road to Kingston, about seven miles from this city on Tuesday last. It appears that four men, named *Leonard*, *McGinnis*, *Coyle*, and *Haley*, (some of whom are married and had their wives with them,) left town on the morning of that day in wagons for a day's amusement in the country, and having drunk rather freely of spirituous liquors, became abusive and quarrelsome, and insulted several persons on the road; and finally entered Mr. Ferguson's, where their behaviour towards Mrs. F., while insisting upon being furnished with liquor, was highly criminal. A man named Bernard Coyle, in the employ of Mr. Ferguson, having interfered, was literally beaten to death by the ruffians. Three of them were immediately secured by men from Mr. Appell's ship yard, and conveyed to Kingston Jail, but *Leonard*, who is said to have been the ringleader, effected his escape, and is still at large. We have not heard, indeed, of any hue and cry having been made after him; but we cannot believe that the authorities are so negligent in so serious an affair. The deceased was a native of Athlone, Ireland, by trade a Butcher.—*St. John Courier*.

THE ARMY.—Mr. Clay, in company with his eminent friend General Porter, crossed over the river yesterday, at the Falls, to witness the parade of the 43d Regiment, and were received with all Military etiquette by the Colonel and his Staff. The Colonel very politely invited his distinguished visitors to review the regiment. But though Mr. Secretary Forsyth, a year or two ago, complied with a similar invitation, by reviewing a body of troops at Montreal, Mr. Clay seemed to think, notwithstanding the precedent, that such occupation of arms belonged to the soldier rather than the statesman, and therefore declined his share of the intended honor in favour of his war worn friend, whose title to the claim and honors of a soldier, more than one English regiment has before now had occasion to appreciate and acknowledge; and General Porter took position and reviewed the troops. As the columns passed him in review, his thoughts must have reverted to the times when on the same frontier, and in the very vicinity of the spot where he stood, British Columns were displayed before him for very different purposes. Amid the battles and bloodshed of the Niagara frontier, he little dreamed that in the very neighbourhood of Lundy's Lane, and almost on the trampled sward of the battle field, and a British regiment would honor him and the statesman whose eloquence and labours in the Cabinet, co-operated with his own bravery and services in the field, with the peaceful pageant of a gala day review. Henry Clay and Peter B. Porter are entitled to the respect of Englishmen, scarcely less than to the gratitude of Americans; and as long as the splendid diplomacy at Ghent, of the one, and the bravery on the Niagara frontier, of the other, are remembered, they will enjoy it. In honoring such men, the gallant "Forty Third" honored themselves and the glorious country which they serve, and which is the common mother of us all.—*Buffalo Journal*.
