The night had far advanced and Colonel Maxwell, rising, said he would take leave of them by shaking hands with the worthy Colonel, and left the room followed by the acclamations of all at table.

The Band of the 69th Regt. attended during the evening, and appropriate airs were played after each toast and sentiment.

**SHAM FIGHT.**—On Thursday last the 69th Regiment with the Uniform Companies of the First and Rifle Battalions City Militia, and two divisions of the New Brunswick Regiment of Artillery exhibited the novel and exciting spectacle of a Sham Fight, in the vicinity of this City. The part assigned to the Militia Companies, we are informed, was performed with much spirit, and the different movements were made in good style; altogether the scene produced a thrilling interest, and from its novelty and the fineness of the weather drew forth numerous assemblages of our citizens as spectators.

It is pleasing to observe the increasing interest that is evinced in behalf of Sabbath School institutions. An appropriate sermon was preached in St. Luke's Church, Portland Village last Sabbath, evening, by the Rev. Mr. Harrison, from Ecclesiastes, chap. xi. verse 1, "Cast thy bread upon the waters; for thou shalt find it after many days."—and a collection (including a gold ring which was redeemed for £1 5s.) amounting to £22 5s. 6d. was taken up, in aid of the funds of the Episcopal Sunday School in that place.—*City Gazette.*

**ST. ANDREWS, Oct. 5.**—A number of inhabitants of this town are forming themselves into a company for the purpose of pursuing the fishing business, the capital in the first instance is limited to £1,500 divided into 150 shares of £10 each. We have no doubt but that the whole stock will be subscribed for, and we heartily wish the spirited individuals engaged in the undertaking the best success.

The Bermudas were visited on the 11th September, with a tremendous hurricane, which raged with but little intermission from the evening of that day until noon the day following. The houses in the towns of St. George's and Hamilton, suffered severely—many were unroofed, verandahs torn down, &c. the destruction of cedar trees throughout the island has been immense—fish were found in several gardens, hundreds of yards from the sea, which may give an idea of the violence of the storm. The breakwater of the Dock yard, is nearly destroyed, and most of the public buildings and other houses in Ireland Island, have suffered—the convict hulk *Coromandel* broke from her moorings in the Chamber, and the whole of her roofing was torn off. Of the shipping in the harbour, four vessels rode out the gale in safety.—A number of fine sail boats have been sunk or wrecked, and several ships' boats have been crushed to pieces—the wharves have also received considerable injury. The fine barque *Sir Colin Campbell*, was driven ashore on Hen Island, and is almost a total wreck. Nearly all the boats owned in St. George's have been driven ashore or destroyed.—*Halifax Times.*

**THE** following Section of the Act of the Imperial Parliament, 1st Victoria, cap. 36, is published for the information of the Ferryman in the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick:

"SECTION X. And be it enacted, That no Deputy, Officer, or Agent of the Postmaster General, travelling with a Mail, shall pay for passing or re-passing a Ferry within any of Her Majesty's Colonies or Dominions in North America, but the Ferryman at every such Ferry shall forthwith on demand convey over every such Deputy, Officer or Agent, without any payment for the same, on pain of forfeiting for every offence *Five Pounds*, to be recovered in any Court of Record within any of the Provinces or Colonies in North America, by Bill, Plaint or Information, wherein no Essoign, Protection or Wager of Law shall be allowed, one moiety thereof to Her Majesty, towards the support of the Government of the said Province, and the contingent charges thereof, and the other moiety to the Postmaster General, who shall sue and prosecute for the same, together with full costs of suit."
