QUEBEC, 24th October.

At 10 o'clock yesterday morning a Guard of Honor, of the Coldstream Guards, paraded in front of Payne's Hotel, where Sir John Colborne and his family have resided since their return to Quebec, to embark for England; and at eleven o'clock His Excellency with Lady Colborne and family left the Hotel and proceeded to the Queen's wharf, where the boats of Her Majesty's Ship Pique were in readiness to receive them.

Lady Colborne and the Miss Colbornes were conveyed to the place of embarkation in carriages, but Sir John proceeded on foot, accompanied by Sir James Macdonell, commanding this district, and the Officers of the general Staff and Departments and several civilians. The latter would no doubt have mustered in greater strength but the hour of his departure was not generally known; the marching down, however, of the Guard of Honor gave warning to many, and on the arrival of His Excellency on the wharf there was a considerable assemblage of the most respectable amongst the citizens to take a farewell look at the veteran to whose conduct and firmness we are indebted for the preservation of the Canada from those scenes of rapine and murder in which the machinations of rebels within the Provinces, assisted by unprincipled and licentious foreign allies, at one time threatened to involve them.—A number were also assembled on Napoleon wharf at the opposite side of the Cul-de-Sac.

A Guard of Honor of the 11th Regiment with the band was in attendance, and paid the compliments usual on such occasions. The Frigate and H. M. Sloop Ringdove, which was at anchor near the wharf, mowing their yards at the same time. As soon as the barge in which His Excellency was seated pushed from the wharf, three hearty cheers were given by the assembled spectators and were repeated by those on the Napoleon wharf when they caught sight of the barge, after it had cleared a vessel lying near the stairs. On His Excellency's gaining the quarter deck of the Pique she fired a salute, and the anchor being almost immediately weighed was taken in tow by St. George and proceeded down the harbour.

Sir John Colborne has now taken leave of Canada and probably of public life, to enjoy that easy retirement in the bosom of his family which his long and arduous services have abundantly won for him. The Administration of the Civil Government of this Province was, in a manner, thrust upon him by circumstances, but the prudence and firmness with which he acquitted himself during the critical period it remained in his hands justly entitle him to the praises and gratitude of all who desire to support Her Majesty's Government and to maintain the connexion with the parent state; his firmness, foresight, and integrity have achieved, what men of more brilliant talents might have failed to accomplish; and we feel assured that he bears with him the respect of the loyal population in both Canada and their warmest wishes that he may long wear in his native land, those honors which have been acquired during a life honorably and constantly devoted to the service of his country.

We publish below the Report of the Committee, appointed by His Excellency Sir John Colborne, to distribute the funds, voted by the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, for the relief of the sufferers in the Province from the late rebellions and incursions of brigands of the United States.—*Montreal Gazette.*

To His Excellency the Governor General, &c.

MONTREAL, July 12, 1839.

Sir:—The Committee appointed by your Excellency to distribute the funds, voted by the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick for the relief of those who have suffered in the late rebellion, and in the incursions of the brigands from the United States, during the last winter, have ascertained, they trust accurately, the names and circumstances of all those who appear to have any claim to assistance from this fund, have given pecuniary relief to the several individuals and families whose names are contained in the lists marked Nos. 1, 2, and 3.

The Committee are happy to be able to state, that it appears from the reports made to them, especially from those made by Mr. Kinneer, the resident and Stipendiary Magistrate of the District of Naperville, Lacolle, and Odelltown, that a larger amount of pecuniary assistance in the way of gratuity, than has already been advanced, does not seem to be necessary or desirable for the present; but the Committee have, they trust, been enabled to administer very essential and beneficial relief to many of those whose properties have suffered from the late rebellion, or from the attacks of the brigands, by granting them loans for the purpose of buying seed, and, in other ways, to enable them to resume their necessary labours in the cultivation of their lands. Many, or most of those individuals and their families, without said assistance, would have been wholly unable to avail themselves of the advantages the possession of land affords them, for the purposes of present sustenance, and of laying in provisions for the winter. In each case, however, where such loans have been advanced, it is probable that a larger sum will ultimately be awarded to the parties by the Commission of Indemnity; and the individuals who have received this assistance, have given receipts, (which have been forwarded to the office of the Civil Secretary,) promising to refund the amount, whenever they are indemnified by the Commission for the losses they have sustained, should their claims be allowed.

The names of those persons, and a statement of the amount of the several losses they have sustained, should their claims be allowed. The proposed appropriation of the sum re-

maining on hand, will be presently advertised to; but it will be right first to show what steps the Committee took to ascertain the number of claimants, and the authenticity of their claims: and on this point, the Committee have to express their thanks to the Lacolle and Odelltown Committee, who at once furnished them with the particulars of the cases they had become acquainted with, most of which have appeared in the Report made, after personal and minute investigation, by Messrs. Redpath and Mills. This Report, with further information contained in letters from Colonel C. Taylor, Mr. Kinneer, and others, together with the list furnished to the Committee by the Dep. Asst. Adj. General, of the names of all those who had been killed or wounded in the late rebellion (a copy of the official returns,) in addition to a few claims brought forward, in consequence of a printed notice issued by them and an advertisement in the public journals, having enabled them, they think, to get all the well-founded claims on this fund. The Committee are anxious to express their grateful sense of the very valuable assistance afforded them by Mr. Kinneer, through whom, indeed, the most essential part of their duties has been carried into effect. Able as he was, on the spot, to investigate and report upon the several cases, the active and zealous co-operation he has afforded the Committee, has enabled them to feel that the duties entrusted to them by your Excellency, have been faithfully, and, they trust, efficiently performed.

In conclusion, the Committee beg leave to suggest for your Excellency's consideration, the mode in which it appears to them that the remaining money, namely, the sum of £233 3s. 1d. together with those sums which have been granted as temporary loans, (which will, of course, return to the fund,) might be appropriated, so as to meet the benevolent intentions of the Sister Provinces in giving relief to the sufferers in the late rebellion.

The Committee have classed the claimants under three heads:—

1. Persons wounded in the late rebellion.
2. The widows of persons killed in ditto.
3. Persons who have suffered in the late rebellion or in the incursions of the brigands, either in person or property (not included in either of the above lists.)

The individuals whose names are contained in list No. 1, will be, they are informed, provided for by pensions; but those whose names are in list No. 2—the widows of men who either fell in action, died of their wounds, or perished through cold or fatigue—have not been so provided for, but are to receive gratuities varying in amount from £25 to £100. This relief (together with that afforded by the two Commissions,) prevents their suffering any immediate want;—but several of them having large families—still too young to be able to work, however well they may husband the relief afforded them—will, in all probability, before another year, feel the pressure of poverty and want—having been entirely dependant upon their husbands for the cultivation of their lands, and means of subsistence. It appears, therefore, to the Committee, that the mode in which the remaining fund might best be appropriated, so as to meet the benevolent intentions of the Legislatures of the Sister Provinces, would be—to vest them in some public stock or debentures, in the names of three trustees, (resident in Montreal or its vicinity,) who should have the power, from time to time, to sell out any part thereof, for the purpose of administering relief to the above mentioned individuals or their families, or to any of the other sufferers from the rebellion or the incursions of the brigands, if their cases should deserve or require it.

The amount of money in the fund, is not sufficient to purchase annuities to the extent for which there would be claimants, to any amount which would furnish them with a livelihood; nor is it, perhaps, desirable, as it might deprive them of the incentive to industrious exertions; but the occasional assistance which might, from time to time, be afforded from this fund, when really necessary, at the discretion of the trustees, would, probably, be the most efficacious charity to these unfortunate individuals, and would, therefore, best meet the wishes of the liberal donors.

These suggestions, and this Report of the proceedings of the Committee, are respectfully submitted to your Excellency, with the assurance that the Committee will be happy, either individually or collectively, to contribute any further assistance they can give to the object for which they were appointed.

Arrival of the Governor General.

Last night the Canada steam boat arrived in port from Quebec, having His Excellency the Governor General and suite on board. We understand that it was the intention of His Excellency to have landed this forenoon in state, but that he was so much indisposed as to find it necessary to leave the steamboat late last night, and proceed to the Governor's residence, when a physician was immediately sent for.

His Excellency General Sir R. D. Jackson, Commander of the Forces, accompanied the Governor General to this city in the Canada.

The Governor General, it will be seen in another place, intends to hold a levee, at the Government House, on Saturday.

The Magistrates of this city and vicinity have voted an Address of congratulation to His Excellency, which was intended to be presented this forenoon; but owing to the indisposition of His Excellency, the presentation has been postponed.

26th October.

We are happy to learn that His Excellency the Governor General has so far recovered as to be able to hold the Levee to-day at the new Government House.

Last night His Excellency Sir George Arthur, accompanied by Captain Sandon, R. N. Captain Arthur, A. D. C. Mr. Donville, A.

D. C. and Captain Halkett, Military Secretary, arrived at Rasco's Hotel from Upper Canada. Mr. Featherstonhaugh and Col. Mudge, proceeded in the Ringdove sloop of war, yesterday. They are to be landed at Rimouski, from whence they proceed into the interior towards Lake Metis.—*Quebec Mercury.*

Sporting Intelligence.

We have been favored with an account of the GREAT GARRISON HURDLE RACE, for Fifty Sovereigns, 45 entrance, which came off on the Race Course at Fredericton on Saturday the 24th instant.

The following were the conditions of the Race:—The Horses to be the property of and ridden by Officers—each weight, last horse to pay the second horse's stake; the winner to be sold for £50, to include within a quarter of an hour after the Race—four hurdles 4 feet high, and 12 feet apart.

Capt. Reeves, 36th, g. g. Tom; Owner, white and red, green cap.

Capt. Havelshaw, R. E. c. m. Cushmanacre; Lord Graham, 6th Regt. b. & pink, w. cap.
Ensign E. Harvey, 34th, b. n. Mullin; Owner, crimson jacket, bl. and c. cap.
Capt. Nugent, 36th, c. m. Ziggy; Owner, pk. and black, bl. cap.

Lieut. Nugent's Dandy, Lieut. Pratt's Kitty, and Ensign Butler's Sybil, paid their debts.

1st Heat.—The horses got well away—Mullin and Meggy leading, taking the first hurdle in their stride, closely followed by the rest. At the second hurdle, Mullin resumed her place, which was well contended for between Zee and Cushmanacre; the three first horses being in the air together over the drain.

At the fall, Zee challenged, Cushmanacre winning on her flank over the third and fourth hurdles. A desperate race took place in the winning post, which Zee reached first, Cushmanacre second, and Meggy third;—the Judge did not place the others.

2d Heat.—After a good start the horses came nearly together to the first hurdle and flew over it gallantly; at the second hurdle Cushmanacre took the lead, and kept it over the third and fourth hurdles, winning cleverly;—Meggy second, Zee third, and Tom fourth.

3d Heat.—This heat excited the greatest interest—many of the most knowing having been not a little surprised at the result of the two former. The riders themselves appeared to be on mischief, and accordingly set off at a killing pace from the very first; Meggy about half a length in front;—Tom, Zee, and Cushmanacre, head and neck together. In this order they cleared the first and second hurdles;—the drain, Cushmanacre being cleared upon, went to the front, Meggy close on one quarter and Zee on the other. Now came the tug of war—most desperate it was, to the fourth hurdle, where Cushmanacre having slipped, fell—although instantly picked up by her noble rider, could not reach her place; Meggy winning cleverly, Zee second, Tom third, and Mullin fourth.

4th Heat.—The odds were now difficult to ascertain, although many depending on Meggy's known powers, were inclined to back her, whilst others depended on the strength of Tom, who had hitherto shown the most very quick. Zee, too, had many friends, whilst Cushmanacre having, as was supposed, strained herself, was not expected even to start. Mullin had retired from the busy scene.—The horses having come to the post, went off at a snapping pace, Meggy leading, closely followed by Tom; Zee and Cushmanacre well up. In this order they continued over the first and second hurdles and the drain;—at the third hurdle, Tom, who were strength began to show, collared Meggy, who made every effort to throw him off, but in vain, he would not take the hint, and made a DEAD HEAT of it with her,—Cushmanacre third, Zee fourth.

5th Heat.—It was now nearly dark, and in fact at a short distance it was impossible to distinguish between the horses;—however, when the saddling bugle sounded, Tom, Meggy and Cushmanacre appeared at the post, eager for the fray. The Starter having put on his night glasses, gave the word "away," and quick as an arrow from the bow, flew the gallant steeds—Tom in the van, with Meggy on his haunches, Cushmanacre closely following, all going the pace "and no mistake." In this order they reached the drain, when Meggy took her usual lead, and cleared the "yavener."—Tom and the little mare close to her. On the flat Tom challenged and got first over the third and fourth hurdles; Cushmanacre then went past Meggy, challenged Tom, who answering the call of his rider, won cleverly.—It being now half past 5 o'clock, and quite dark, it was therefore impossible to start again;—the Race was consequently undecided.

This ended one of the best day's sport ever witnessed in this part of the world, or we will venture to say in any other part. Every heat was strenuously contested from the starting to the winning post, and at a pace which none but real good ones could keep up.
