MILITIA GENERAL ORDERS.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct that the 2d Battalion Northumberland Militia, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Davidson, be divided into two separate and distinct Battalions, and the Districts to be as follows:—

The Second Battalion to commence at the Mouth of Renou's River, from thence down the Miramichi River to its old bounds, and including the North West Branch of the Miramichi. The Third Battalion to commence at the Mouth of Renou's River aforesaid, to include the Settlements on the said River, and from thence to extend up the main South West Branch of the Miramichi to the County line.

Major James Gilmore, from the 1st Battalion Northumberland Militia, to be Lieutenant Colonel Commandant of the new or 3d Battalion.

2d Battalion Westmorland.

William Atkinson, to be Ensign, vice William Chapman, promoted, dated 1st April, 1840, to take precedence of Otho Sayre.

The Christian name of Ensign Brophy, who was appointed to the 1st Battalion Northumberland Militia on the 8th March, 1839, is Patrick, and not James.

At a Special Meeting of the Fredericton Society of Saint Andrew, held at their usual place of meeting on Monday evening the 13th day of April, 1840.

JAMES TAYLOR, Esquire, M. P. P. in the chair.

Read an Extract of a Letter from the Earl of Dalhousie, addressed to His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B., and communicated to the President of the Society, as follows:

Dalhousie Castle, 4th Jan. 1840.

"I should not have ventured even on the plea of old acquaintance, to take up any of the time occupied in your more weighty matters, where it not that I believe the subject on which I am writing, will serve as my ample apology.

You will probably have received before now an official letter to you as Governor of the Colony, mentioning that it has been resolved by men of all parties and politics, uniting to raise a National Testimonial in Scotland to the Duke of Wellington. They have done me the honor of naming me chairman, which will account for my share in requesting your attention for a moment to it. The committee are desirous of giving to Scotsmen and all of Scottish descent in Colonies, an opportunity of joining with us at home in this National object; and they hope by the formation of Committee on the spot, or such other measures as may be thought best, to facilitate the collection and transmission of the subscriptions to the General Committee."

Read also the following Resolutions, unanimously agreed to at a numerous Meeting of Noblemen and Gentlemen, held on Tuesday the 24th December, 1839, in the Hopetown Rooms, Edinburgh.

"I. That the Great and distinguished services of His Grace the Duke of Wellington, ought to be commemorated within the Metropolis of Scotland, by some public and permanent expression of National gratitude.

II. That in the opinion of this Meeting, an Equestrian Statue of the Duke of Wellington, erected in a conspicuous situation in this City, would be an appropriate Memorial for perpetuating the personal remembrance of His

Grace, and recording the gratitude and admiration of the Scottish Nation.

III. That for this purpose, a subscription be opened, and that the following Noblemen and Gentlemen be appointed a Committee (with power to subcommit) for promoting and superintending the Subscription, and carrying into effect the preceding Resolution; and that the Committee now appointed, be instructed to correspond with the Counties and Boroughs of Scotland, with London, Dublin, and generally with all parts of the United Kingdom, the East Indies and the Colonies, in order to afford to all an opportunity of contributing towards this National undertaking."

Whereupon, Resolved, That this Meeting do most cordially and unanimously respond to the several Resolutions passed at the Public Meeting, held in Edinburgh on the 24th day of December, 1839, relative to the erection in the Metropolis of Scotland of a National Testimonial to His Grace the Duke of Wellington.

Resolved, That the following Gentlemen be a Committee to devise means for giving effect to the object of the Edinburgh Committee, with power to carry the same into execution:—

THE COMMEMORATION OF THE BIRTH AND MARRIAGE OF THE QUEEN.

On Friday the 24th inst. a meeting of the Inhabitants of Fredericton and its vicinity, was held at the County Court House, for the purpose of carrying into effect the proposal of His Excellency the Lieut. Governor,—that Saturday the 23d of May next, should be set apart as a day of Rejoicing throughout the Province, to commemorate the Birth and Marriage of our Most Gracious Queen.

The Hon. JOHN S. SAUNDERS in the chair.

The Hon. W. F. Odell, His Honor the Master of the Rolls, and several other gentlemen having addressed the meeting; it was resolved on the motion of the Hon. Geo. F. Street, the Solicitor General, that a Committee be appointed to collect funds, for the purpose of providing some amusement and refreshment for the poorer classes of the inhabitants of Fredericton and its vicinity, on the 23d day of May next; in celebration of the Birth and Marriage of our Most Gracious Queen; and that the Committee be empowered to send refreshments to the houses of any poor families, to whom they may have the means of extending relief.

The following persons were named members of the Committee:—

The Hon. Lieut. Col. Shore, Geo. F. Street, and John S. Saunders, Lieut. Col. Hayne, Lt. Col. Allan, Major L. A. Wilmet, Messrs. Jas. Taylor, Charles Fisher, W. H. Odell, Stephen Miller, Geo. Garden, Geo. Lee, Jun. Benjamin Wolhaupter, John T. Smith, John A. Beckwith, Geo. Minchin, Jun. Dr. Fraser Mark Needham, James S. Beck, S. Barker, George Munro, William Berton, J. F. Gale, and John Gregory.

When it was further resolved, that it be left to the Committee to make such arrangements for the amusements of the day (and on the motion of the Venerable the Archdeacon) for the extending relief to poor families at their homes, as might be most calculated to carry into effect the intentions of the gentlemen who composed the meeting.

The Chairman having left the chair; on the motion of the Solicitor General, Col. Minchin was called to the chair; when the thanks of the meeting were given to the Hon. John S. Saunders, for his conduct as chairman.—*Sentinel.*
