

by Her Majesty, or the Visitor on Her Majesty's behalf, always requiring the Professor of Divinity to be a Clergyman of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Fifthly.—That the Council consist of the Chancellor, the Bishop of the Diocese in which Fredericton may be situated, or (in the absence of the Bishop) the Arch-Deacon, the President of the College, the Master of the Rolls, the Speaker of the House of Assembly, the Secretary of the Province, the Attorney General, and six other Members, (of whom two shall be Professors in the College,) nominated or to be nominated by the Visitor, with the power of suspension in the Visitor now vested in the Chancellor, provided, however, that the seat of any of the present Members of the Council shall not be affected hereby, and that no less than seven Members shall form a quorum for the despatch of business.

Sixthly.—That it shall not be necessary that the Members of the Council be Graduates, nor shall any religious test or qualification be appointed for or required of them.

Seventhly.—That the Council have power to make, revoke, renew, amend or alter Statutes, Rules and Ordinances, on the motion of any Member, without the previous sanction of the Chancellor, subject, however, to the approbation of the Visitor, as now provided by the Charter.

Eighthly.—That the Registrar shall in each and every year prepare a full and detailed account, duly attested, of the income and expenditure of the College for the previous year, together with a statement of the number and names of all the Officers and Members, to be laid before the several Branches of the Provincial Legislature, within fourteen days after the meeting of the General Assembly.

The Council are further of opinion, that should the foregoing modifications of the Charter take place, it shall be expressly provided, that Divine Service in the College shall be performed according to the order, rites and ceremonies of the United Church of England and Ireland.

A meeting of the Provincial Temperance Society was held at the Friary, on Wednesday evening, the Rev. Dr. Gray, President of the Society, presided, and opened the Meeting with a suitable address. Resolutions were submitted to the Meeting, and eloquently supported by the Rev. I. W. D. Gray, Rector of this Parish, Rev. Mr. Topper, Capt. O'Halloran, 69th Regt. and the Hon. Judge Parker. The room was excessively crowded, and great numbers could not obtain admittance. A collection amounting to £5 18s. 6d. was obtained, and 35 persons joined the Society.—City Gazette.

In the Speech of Sir John Harvey to the Legislature of New Brunswick, His Excellency announces the important fact, that Her Majesty's Government are about to order a survey of the route from the head of the Bay of Fundy to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, through which it has been so long recommended to carry a canal. This intelligence must be very gratifying to the inhabitants of New Brunswick, Prince Edward's Island, and such other portions of the colonies as are interested therein. If a large ship canal should be resolved on, even Quebec and Montreal will participate in the benefit, as it will shorten the distance and lessen the danger of the voyage to any part of the United States, the West Indies, South America, &c. To the port of St. John the value of such a communication will be inestimable, as it will, even if no other advantage be reckoned, place that port at a much more convenient distance from the coast of Labrador, and other great fishing grounds of the Gulf.

We are glad to see a favorable mention, by the Lieut. Governor, of a New Land Company, as nothing can be of more permanent utility to the colony than the introduction of a hardy and industrious set of Emigrants. All will join Sir John in his pious views in relation to the Boundary, which is now we hope in a favorable train for a final adjustment.—New York Albion, 15th February.

By Capt. POWER.—View of the Destruction of the Houses of Lords and Commons by Fire, on 16th Oct. 1834. Three views of the ruins of St. Stephen's Chapel.

LIEUT. GEN. LORD SEATON, G. C. B. This gallant nobleman (late Sir J. Colborne) returned to Dover street on Wednesday, from a visit to Her Majesty. His Lordship was severely wounded in the arm in the Peninsular campaign, where he commanded the 52d

Light Infantry. He was subsequently appointed Lieut. Governor of Guernsey, whence he proceeded to command the Forces in Canada. His Lordship has two sons the Hon. Lieut. James Colborne, of the 25th foot. His Lordship having declined the invitation of the merchants of London to a public dinner, a subscription has been set on foot by the leading mercantile firms in the city, to present this gallant nobleman with a handsome service of plate, as a mark of the high consideration in which he is held, and as a testimony of esteem for the important services he rendered in suppressing the Canadian rebellion.

Testimonial to Lord Seaton, (Sir J. Colborne.)
