Become all of you Subscribers, Annual Subscribers to the Bible Society, so shall you become irreconcilable enemies of Satan, and servants of the living God.

I have been a soldier, Sir, of my Queen and Country for many years, and I have sought for happiness as the world usually seek it, in the paths of gaiety and dissipation; but until I became a soldier of the cross, I knew the unsatisfactory object of my pursuits—happiness—only by its name. The lusts of the flesh, the lusts of the eye, and the pride of life—these did not confer it. I will not say that there was not honey in the cup which the world presented to my lips, but there was a sting also—the sting of conscience which told me that man was created for more exalted purposes and nobler ends than to be the slave of an existence merely animal, or intellectual. I can truly say that I knew no real peace or joy, until I felt the peace and joy of believing—until I preferred the Temple of my God to the hall of reveling and the bower of fashion—until I could say with the Psalmist, "Lord I have loved the habitation of thy house and the place where thine honor dwelleth, the place of the Tabernacle of thy glory."

I have travelled many countries, Sir, East and West, and fair and pleasant some of them are accounted, but I have found no land so fair and pleasant as the land of Canaan. On discovering the beauties of that land by the assistance of my Bible, I experienced the force and truth of the Psalmist's words, "The lines are fallen unto me in pleasant places, yea I have a goodly heritage," what wonder then that I should be anxious to point out the road to others—and this I feel I cannot do so effectually as by contributing my cordial and earnest support to Bible and Missionary institutions.

If, Sir, we esteem the Gospel an unspeakably precious gift, and are truly interested in its diffusion, let us prove our sincerity on this head towards God, as we would be expected to redeem our professions to our fellow men. Permit me to revert to the case just now supposed of an invasion threatened by Maine.—Who would respect the cold-blooded and unnatural Citizen, that in such an emergency would seat himself quietly down by his fireside, and contribute merely his hearty good wishes to the cause of his country. Who would value a patriotism that exhibited in the hour of need, no nobler fruits than these?—And even so my friends must our sincerity in the cause of God be tested, and judged of. It is in vain to pray him to extend "his saving health unto all nations," and to rest satisfied with a mere cold and heartless form of words, as if the Gospel were to find its way to the cottage of the uneducated poor, and the land of the distant and benighted heathen, by some supernatural manifestation of the Divine power.—No my friends, the days of miracles are gone by—it pleases God in the present advanced state of Christianity to work by human means—and we have the means, if there is only a corresponding will, of carrying his gracious purposes into effect in our own hearts. He has blessed this city with health and resources which are daily, nay, almost hourly increasing; make then, my christian friends an oblation of your first fruits unto God—let the fervent expressions of gratitude which we are called upon to offer up to the Divine author of the Bible, by the resolution which I have the honor to support, be indeed fervent in their character—let them be expressed in characters of silver and of gold, according to our respective abilities.—Consecrate unto the Lord, some portion of that abundance which you have received at his hands, and he will open the windows of Heaven, and pour out a blessing upon you, that there shall not be room enough to receive it.

In conclusion Sir, permit me to remark, that the prevailing reproach by men of the world, against those who in a measure separate themselves from the world, is, that they preach but do not practise—give us, they say, one act by way of example, and that will go farther in producing imitation than ten thousand pages of precept. A BILL.

For erecting a part of the Parish or Township of Sussex, in King's County, into a separate and distinct Parish or Township.

WHEREAS the Parish or Township of Sussex is so extensive as to render it inconvenient and burthensome to perform the several Parochial duties required by law, and it is expedient a separate Parish

should be erected therein, and that a certain part of the Parish of Sussex should be erected into a distinct Parish;

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That all that part of the said Parish of Sussex, in the said County of King's, which lies on the north side of the centre of the River Kennebec, beginning at the line between Norton and Sussex, in the centre of said River, and following the centre of said River upwards until it strikes the southerly angle of Lot No. Twenty Five on the north side of the Kennebec, or Salmon River, granted to Jacob Snider, thence running along the upper or easterly line of said grant, north to the rear of said Lot, thence north sixty six degrees east, till it intersects the County line dividing Westmorland from King's, thence along said line northerly to the intersection of the south line of Queen's County, thence following the course of that line to the dividing line between the Parishes of Springfield and Sussex, thence southerly on said line to the place of beginning, be, and the same is hereby erected into a separate and distinct Parish, to be called, known and distinguished by the name of—, any Law, usage or custom, to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.

II. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence and go into operation on the first day of March, which will be in the year of our Lord—.

III. And the Justices of the Peace for the said County shall at the first General Sessions of the Peace in the said year to be holden, and thereafter in like manner as for other Parishes in the said County, appoint Parish Officers for the said Parish of—, who shall be subject to the same laws and regulations, and liable to the same penalties in all respects as Parish officers in other Parishes are or may be subject or liable to.

IV. Provided always and be it further enacted, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend or be construed to extend to prevent the recovery of any Parish or other dues assessment, taxes, penalties, fines, or monies whatsoever, which may be due, incurred, forfeited or unpaid, when this Act shall go into operation, but the same shall and may be paid and recovered in like manner, as if the Act had not been made.
