

New Brunswick, has just been published, and duly laid before His Excellency Sir John Harvey, our worthy and talented Lieutenant Governor. The Report is about the same length as the first one, or nearly ninety pages. It is extremely well written and clear in all its details.

We believe it is to the wisdom and foresight of His Excellency that we are indebted, in the first place, for the commencement of this highly important Survey. The many advantages which have already resulted to the Province at large, from the valuable discoveries made by Dr. Gesner, prove the correctness of the warm terms in which His Excellency recommended the Survey to the favourable consideration of the House of Assembly, and his confidence in the talent and ability of our worthy and enterprising Provincial Geologist. We feel satisfied that the immense labour which the Doctor undergoes in the prosecution of his duties, could only be accomplished by an enthusiast of great scientific acquirements. In this opinion, we are fully borne out by the high standing he has already acquired, by his publications alone, among the first Geologists in England.

With respect to the great importance of such a Survey, we have only to refer to our noble Mother Country, and we will find that even up to this hour, in consequence of the improvements in the different departments of Science, a minute and searching Survey is going on in every part of England, that vast store-house of mineral wealth. It, therefore, it is still deemed proper and profitable to carry on such a Survey in the Mother Country, where, we may very naturally suppose, that the Government must have been well acquainted both with the Geological and Mineralogical characters of the country many years ago, how much more is it necessary for us, in this unexplored Province, to proceed in the same manner until we acquire sufficient knowledge of the various resources which God, in his infinite wisdom, has stored up in the bowels of the earth for the use and comfort of man? From the discoveries made by Dr. Gesner in two short seasons, we may fearlessly assert that New Brunswick is one of the richest and most important dependencies of the British Crown!

With respect to the Scientific department of the Report, our author proves that he is well qualified to discharge the important duties intrusted to him. Although, to those who have never studied the Science of Geology, it may appear a dry, unprofitable and uninviting subject, yet Dr. Gesner never fails, in his writing and public Lectures, in rendering it not only pleasing, but even extremely inviting.

The gorgeous beauties connected with the Science of Astronomy, rank it next in order to that of Geology; for, although the latter Science may more readily captivate and arrest the attention of the common observer by the splendour and brilliancy of the countless worlds which float in yonder distant ether, yet, the former is not less attractive to the patient enquirer, who finds, at every step that he takes in it, more and more reason to admire the beauty and harmony which exist in the material world; and fully satisfied that there must be an Almighty Architect who created, and still preserves this ponderous globe of ours in its unvarying revolutions amid the immensity of space—and that the same Omnipotent Intelligence must preside over, and preserve in unison all those silent and secret operations, which are still going forward both on its surface and in its deep and fiery caverns!

While the Astronomer by the aid of his powerful telescope, surveys the splendid and countless worlds that float in far distant space, all obedient to the Divine will of their Creator, he cannot help being impressed with the most overwhelming conceptions of the magnificence, power and splendours of the Deity! Yet the Geologist, whether he wanders upon the surface, or descends into the bowels of the earth, cannot but feel equal wonder and astonishment at the harmonies and beauties which he uniformly finds existing in every part of this terraqueous globe—and which must inspire him with the most profound veneration for the Omnipotent character of an all-bountiful God! But, as our present limits will not permit us to enter upon the many natural beauties connected with this delightful Science, we must content ourselves, in the mean time, with directing attention to those parts of the Report which are of most importance to the inhabitants of the Province, in a commercial point of view. And as the objects of the Survey are both clearly and satisfactorily explained by the Doctor himself, we shall now introduce him to our readers in the full confidence that they will feel as much pleasure in perusing this valuable document as we have done ourselves.

We understand that on Saturday last, the Hon. J. S. Saunders was sworn in, at the office of the Secretary of the Province, as Provisional Commissioner of Crown Lands and Surveyor General; till the pleasure of Her Majesty's Government respecting the permanent appointment to those important offices can be known. Mr. Saunders is a native of New Brunswick; a gentleman of the highest standing in society; whose character, talents and manners render him deservedly popular among all classes, whose station and property in the country are a strong guarantee for the faithful discharge of his official duties; and who, having the good fortune to be well known and respected among the ruling powers in the Mother Country, will undoubtedly possess, as well the confidence of the parent Government, as that of his native Province.

The eminent services of his late venerable father, Mr. Chief Justice Saunders, who was universally esteemed among us, also constitute some claim for attention to the son, and as Mr. Saunders has hitherto performed many gratuitous services for the Province, under various confidential commissions from the Executive,

we rejoice at the prospect of his being at length rewarded by an office of emolument as well as trust.—Some of those services, we believe, required Mr. Saunders at various times, to inspect the management and accounts of the Crown Land Office, under its former incumbent; and the knowledge thus acquired is a sufficient assurance, that he does not now assume its control, in ignorance of its duties or unqualified for the performance of them.
