gone to the forest, cleared away the woods from about their dwellings; and in a few years have made "the desert around them to blossom as he rose."

We refer our readers to the document that called forth these remarks, which we reeat is one of very great interest; and is another proof of His Excellency's desire, to make iself acquainted with the wants and capabifities of the Province, and to contribute to its permanent peace and prosperity.

For erecting a part of the Parish or Township of Sussex, in King's County, into a separate and dis-tinct Parish or Township.

HEREAS the Parish or Township of Sussex is so extensive as to render it inconvenient and burthensome to perform the several Parochial duties required by law, and it is expedient a separate Parish should be erected therein, and that a certain part of the Parish of Sussex should be erected into a distinct Parish;'

I.
