

union with His Royal Highness Prince Albert of Saxe Coburg and Gotha.

We are happy to learn from a Boston paper that the *British Packet Swift*, which sailed from Falmouth about the 10th January, had put again that port, from the severity of weather, where she arrived on the 26th of month. The February Packet will probably bring the Mails for both these months.

We understand that the *Packet Ship Siddons* had arrived at London, after a quick passage on board of which Colonel MURDOCH and Mr. FEATHERSTONHAUGH, the Boundary Line Commissioners, took passage from New York.

Both houses of Parliament have voted thanks to Lord Auckland for the war in Afghanistan.

The allowance voted by Parliament to Prince Albert is £30,000 per annum.

Among the deaths announced is that of Sir Wilkins William Wynne.

By late accounts from India, it seems that the Anglo Indian government is still pushing on in its career of war and conquest. The Khan of Khelet had been attacked, his capital stormed and captured, and the Khan himself slain. The British loss was 31 killed and 105 wounded; that of the natives very severe, both in killed and wounded. One account says nine hundred.

Accounts of the recent hostilities in China had reached England. The Hampshire Telegraph states that a great naval armament is to be sent immediately from Portsmouth, to take on board 16,000 native troops to India; to lay the city of Canton under contribution, or destroy it if necessary, and then proceed northward to Peking, and compel the Emperor to submission.

Joseph Bonaparte is giving splendid entertainments at his house in Regent street.

Miss Penelope Smith will listen to no proposition from the Royal Neapolitan father in law, until she is acknowledged the legitimate Princess of Capua.

Michael Angelo Taylor, a London Banker, left £70,000 for a picture gallery and lecture rooms in Oxford University.

In Limerick County alone, 50,000 swear to the Temperance pledge.

The papers announce the death of Admiral Sir F. L. Maitland, and the storming of Khelet, by a handful of British troops. This mail also brought interesting details of the advance of the Russian troops on China. The Bombay division, however, in consequence of this inward march, had been detained at Sukkur.—Cholera had made great ravages among the troops.

The Pantaloon brig of war, which sailed from Plymouth about three weeks since, relieved a sloop, which proceeded forthwith to the South American station, it is supposed to order some of the vessels on that station to join the East India squadron.

The Nimrod, seventy four, refitting at Portsmouth, joins the East India Squadron as quickly as possible, and carries out four of the large guns for throwing hollow shells, for the Admiral's ship *Wellesley*, seventy four.

The Blonde, forty six and Pique, thirty six are also going from Portsmouth to the same destination.

Also, the Thalia, forty six and Wanderer, sixteen, fitting at Sherness, and the Cyclops, steam frigate fitting in the East India Dock.

THE 36TH REGIMENT.

Yesterday morning being the 17th of March, Lieutenant Colonel MAXWELL, the gallant Commander of this Regiment, appeared at their head, and in a speech replete with the pithy diction of a soldier, as well as the refined sentiments of a good moralist, addressed them on a subject, which every one must allow to be of great importance, in the present age of reform, namely—Temperance.

The gallant Colonel, after alluding to the great advancement of sober principles in Europe of late, and particularly in Ireland, succeeded, we think, most happily with his object; for although he subsequently led them to the parade ground, where they performed a great variety of difficult evolutions, in the presence of a large number of highly respectable spectators, not one man appeared under the influence of ardent spirits; nor have we, up to the present moment, heard of a single instance of inebriety in the Regiment during the festival of St. Patrick.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,

Wednesday, March 11.

LIBEL ON THE QUEEN'S REPRESENTATIVE.

Mr. L. A. Wilnot, from the Joint Committee of the Legislative Council and Assembly, appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address on the subject of the false and scandalous Libel against His Excellency, which appeared in a weekly Newspaper printed in Saint John, called "*The Weekly Chronicle*," reported, that they had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to make the following answer:—

GENTLEMEN,
I came among you charged by our Gracious Sovereign to announce to the Inhabitants of this Loyal Province, the Royal decision upon a proposition which had been laid by them at His Majesty's feet, and with respect to which, use the emphatic language of one of the most excellent men and ablest Statesmen of his day, "The King had only to be satisfied of its advantages, as respects the interests of His faithful Subjects of New Brunswick, to insure for it His Majesty's most willing and gracious assent." The circumstances, therefore, under which I assumed the administration of the affairs of this Province appeared to be calculated to disarm political hostility, to calm party feeling, and to unite all classes of the King's Subjects in gratitude towards their Paternal Monarch, and in a desire to manifest their confidence in His Representative. From that hour to the present I have devoted myself zealously, and, I will add, laboriously, to the duties of my station, and have used my best

endeavours to convince the Legislature and the People of this Province of my anxious desire to administer its Government upon sound, Constitutional principles, in conformity with the commands of my Gracious Sovereign, and, therefore, in accordance with the wishes and interests of Her Majesty's Provincial Subjects;—and that I have not wholly failed in effecting these important objects of my mission, I proudly appeal to the Legislature and the Country, from both of which I have received so many gratifying assurances and proofs of confidence and satisfaction. To say that I am deeply sensible of these repeated marks of approbation and good will, is to use language which very inadequately conveys the intensity of the feelings under which I now address you.

With reference to the immediate cause of your present Address, I would observe, that from an early period after my arrival in this Province, I found myself, my measures, and my confidential advisers, assailed through the print in question, by calumnies so bitter, so malignant, so personally abusive, so atrociously and scandalously false as to excite my utmost indignation and astonishment, never before having in any Country, been made the object of any thing of the kind, during the whole course of a long public life.

That these attacks have proceeded from a small and disappointed party, I have not entertained a doubt,—but that any individuals of respectability can have lent themselves to anonymous proceedings of so mean, so base, so unmanly a character, I must continue incredulous, until such proof shall have been produced as may satisfy the minds of a Jury of the Country.
