

siding. His Honor, in charging the Grand Jury, stated that the number of criminal cases were fewer than he had hitherto been accustomed to witness;—he alluded to the recent act passed with regard to the erection of wooden buildings, over a certain height and urged upon the Jury, the necessity which existed that every engagement of the Law should be presented. The learned Gentleman, in his address, spoke of the present condition of the seamen of the port—and upon the state of the Gaol wherein they were frequently placed for safe keeping; and urged the importance of the matter upon that part of the mercantile community who were daily sending large ships to sea; he hoped that some general endeavour would be made to improve their present degraded state, and expressed his pleasure that the press had taken up this important subject. He suggested that the establishing of a Blue Coat School, where those numerous idle and dissolute boys, who frequently thronged the street, might be placed and improved for the purpose of supplying the growing wants of the shipping out of this port. These latter remarks were not particularly addressed to the Gentlemen as Jurors, but as Citizens in general; and he had no doubt a Legislative grant would be given to assist so laudable and desirous an object.—*S. John Herald.*

Gas.—Our friend, Dr. Gesner, will not be idle.—Amid his Geological Reports, Surveys and discoveries, Lectures and Experiments, he has lately made a proposal to our Common Council, to have our City lighted with Gas, and we believe it has been received favorably by that Body, who are about to take up the matter, and ascertain all particulars of this useful undertaking.—We thank this gentleman for his exertions to give to Saint John, what every City should receive, that has reached an opulence and standing similar to it, and it is with pleasure we record his name as the first mover of this grand scheme. We say to our Corporate Body—"go ahead," and have the City Gas Works in full and complete operation before another season shall come round.—*ib.*

THE ATLANTIC STEAMERS.—The British Quena was advertised to leave London on the 1st January—she would probably remain at Portsmouth until the 4th, and her news cannot, therefore, be expected for some days. The Liverpool leaves Liverpool on the 20th, (four days after the meeting of Parliament,) for New York, and thereafter alternately on the 20th of each month; the new steam ship New York, of 1400 tons burthen, belonging to the same company, will commence playing early in 1840, and thus afford a departure on the 20th of each month, to and from Liverpool and New York.—The Great Western may be expected at New York in February.—*S. John Courier.*

SEIZURE.—A coasting schooner of about 50 tons called the *Three Brothers*, owned at Shepody, was seized in the early part of the week by the Revenue Officers of this port. She had on board American Gin, Brandy, Shoes, Bacon, and other smuggled goods, to the value of several hundred pounds.—*ib.*

STAGE ACCIDENT.—On Monday last, as Green's Stage was returning from Fredericton to the City, being unfortunately off the regular winter track, and proceeding at a good pace, it suddenly broke through the ice, and being heavily laden with passengers, it was for some time extremely doubtful whether they could be saved. After great perseverance, they were all extricated. One lady passenger, Miss McLeod, of this City, suffered greatly from the length of time she was immersed and exposed to the cold, and great fears were entertained of her recovery.—*ib.*

We are informed that the preservation of the passengers' lives was in a great measure owing to the forethought and promptitude of N. Vail, Esq. of Georgetown, who, at a considerable distance, discovered the danger into which the stage was rushing, and, with his son, hastened to the spot prepared with ropes, &c., to furnish the necessary assistance.—*Courier.*

#### A BILL

For erecting a part of the Parish or Township of Sussex, in King's County, into a separate and distinct Parish or Township.

WHEREAS the Parish or Township of Sussex is so extensive as to render it inconvenient and burdensome to perform the several Parochial duties required by law, and it is expedient a separate Parish should be erected therein, and that a certain part of the Parish of Sussex should be erected into a distinct Parish;

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That all that part of the said Parish of Sussex, in the said County of King's, which lies on the north side of the centre of the River Kennebec, beginning at the line between Norton and Sussex, in the centre of said River, and following the centre of said River upwards until it strikes the southerly angle of Lot No. Twenty Five on the north side of the Kennebec, or Salmon River, granted to Jacob Suidor, thence running along the upper or easterly line of said grant, north to the rear of said Lot, thence north sixty six degrees east, till it intersects the County line dividing Westmorland from King's, thence along said line northerly to the intersection of the south line of Queen's County, thence following the course of that line to the dividing line between the Parishes of Springfield and Sussex, thence southerly on said line to the place of beginning, be, and the same is hereby erected into a separate and distinct Parish, to be called, known and distinguished by the name of—any Law, usage or custom, to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.

II. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall commence and go into operation on the first day of March, which will be in the year of our Lord—

III. And the Justices of the Peace for the said County shall at the first General Sessions of the Peace in the said year to be holden, and thereafter in like manner as for other Parishes in the said County, appoint Parish Officers for the said Parish of—, who shall be subject to the same laws and regulations, and liable to the same penalties in all respects as Parish officers in other Parishes are or may be subject or liable to.

IV. Provided always and be it further enacted, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend or be construed to extend to prevent the recovery of any Parish or other dues assessment, taxes, penalties, fines, or monies whatsoever, which may be due, incurred, forfeited or unpaid, when this Act shall go into operation, but the same shall and may be paid and recovered in like manner, as if the Act had not been made.
