SUPREME COURT, TRINITY TERM, 3d VICTORIA, A. D. 1840. GENERAL RULES.

Filing Writ and Affidavit.

I. IT IS ORDERED, That Interlocutory Judgment shall not be signed in any case, for want of appearance, until the Process with the requisite Affidavit of Service, and where the case requires it, the order of the Court or Judge for perfecting such service shall be filed.

Service of Process at Defendant's residence.

II. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, That from and after the first day of Michaelmas Term next, when Service of Process is effected at the usual place of abode of the Defendant, pursuant to the Act, 7 W. 4, C. 14, S. 1, the Affidavit of such service shall be in the form following or to that effect, in order to entitle the Plaintiff to an order for perfecting such service.

Form of Affidavit.

A. B. of [name, residence and addition of Deponent] maketh oath and saith, that he this Deponent did on the day of deliver true Copy of the annexed Writ or Process at the house of C. D. the Defendant named in such Writ or Process, for the house of any other person, as the case may be, situate in the Parish of in the County of unto E. D. the Wife of such Defendant [or to G. H. an adult person residing in the said house, and known to this Deponent as a member or inmate of the family of such Deponent] and this Deponent further saith that the said house was at the time of such delivery the usual place of abode of said Defendant, and that the said Copy of the said Process was accompanied with an English Notice in writing to the Defendant of the intent and meaning of the service of such Process, pursuant to the statute in such case made and provided, and this Deponent further saith, that at the time of making such service of the said Process, the said Defendant was not, as he this Deponent verily believes, without the limits of the said County.

*NOTE.—The clause as to the Notice may be omitted in the Service of Summary Writs.

Grounds of Denial.

III. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, That where a General Denial shall hereafter be put in to any Declaration or other pleading; the party putting in the same shall deliver at the same time to the opposite party, a statement or minute of the grounds of such Denial; and if the opposite party intend to rely on any defects in the previous pleadings, he shall deliver with the Joinder in Denial, a statement or minute of such alleged defects; and such particulars shall be entered in the margin of the Books delivered to the Judges. This regulation to extend also to cases of special Denial, where other grounds are intended to be relied on than those specifically set out.

Trial by the Record.

IV. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, That in any case of trial by the Record, it shall be sufficient for the party to make up and deliver to the Chief Justice one paper Book, instead of delivering Books to all the Judges, unless the

Court should otherwise order, in any particular case.

Agents.

V. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, That henceforth no Attorney of this Court do employ any Student in the office of a Barrister of this Court, as his Agent in any suit or matter pending in this Court; or in the transaction of any business before a Judge, or in the office either of the Clerk of the Crown or Clerk of the Pleas; and that no Barrister of this Court, do suffer any one of his Students to act as the Agent of any other Attorney: Provided that this Rule shall not extend to prevent the employment by a Barrister, who may himself be the Agent of any Attorney, of any Student in his office, in the professional business of such Attorney.

INSPECTION OF THE 36TH REGIMENT.

The Inspection of Her Majesty's 36th Regt. under command of Lieut. Col. Maxwell, K. H. took place on Friday last, and it affords us no trifling gratification to be able to state, that the appearance of the Regt. on that day excited universal admiration, the evolutions having been performed in the most perfect and compact manner, the men most uncommonly steady under arms, and the firing kept up with a sharpness and rapidity which we have never seen equalled. One part of the Field Exercises struck us as particularly well performed, it was when the Regiment acted as a Light Infantry Battalion covering the front of the Brigade, the changes of position to the right and left were admirable, the skirmishers at one time lying the bank of the river, at another firing over the palisades on the road above the race course, the whole presenting one of the most admirable sights we have for a long time witnessed. His Excellency seemed highly gratified, and expressions of approbation were frequently heard to escape his lips.

The Review over dinner became the order of the day, and the officers entertained His Excellency and suite, the heads of the different military departments and other members of the garrison in the mess room, which being small, part of them dined in an adjoining room, messages, sentiments and toasts being continually interchanged throughout the evening.

The gallant Colonel who, we understand, has given up speechifying in public, was on this occasion constantly upon his legs, notwithstanding a long day's work, and began by announcing an order he had received from the home government (meaning, as he said, the petticoat one) saying in his usual happy strain, that he would endeavour as heretofore to combine toasts and sentiments, and giving—

The illustrious Lady who rules over our destinies, Queen Victoria, and the selection of her heart, Prince Albert.

His next toast was another union, the United Service, here the gallant Colonel enumerated the deeds of valor that had been performed in the month of June by the united service, beginning with Lord Howe's victory in 1794, and ending with the immortal field of Waterloo, in 1815, and finishing by proposing—

"The Army and Navy of England."

His third toast began by presuming, that the month of June could never pass, as long as this nether world existed without the immortal deeds of His Grace the Duke of Wellington being talked of. He then gave—

"The unconquered and unconquerable Wellington!"

His fourth toast we give verbatim—

"Mr. President and gentlemen, I now rise to propose the toast which I feel assured you will all most cordially and heartily respond to: We have already drunk the Queen and her illustrious consort, the selected of her heart, and I am now about to propose the health of Her Majesty's Representative in this Province. Whilst giving the prelatory toasts to this the principal one of the evening, I endeavoured to show that the present month is one celebrated in the annals of our country, by deeds of arms and days of rejoicing, and I trust it will not be deemed inapplicable to the present occasion, to state, that the 1st of June is also marked by an event that will long be cherished and remembered in this loyal Colony, as the day on which His Excellency the present governor, now our distinguished guest, arrived and assumed its government; for I think the loyalty, the festivities, and the enthusiastic expressions of friendship, attachment, and good feeling exhibited during His Excellency's recent visit to Saint John and elsewhere, will bear me out in what I have advanced, and gentlemen we have all reason to rejoice at this event, especially my friends and fellow soldiers of the 36th Regiment.

As that fortuitous occurrence has placed us almost ever since we touched the shores of British North America under the command of one, whom we all love, honor and obey,—one who has ever proved himself the soldier's friend, as I have often before stated, and never more so than on a recent occasion, I now beg leave to propose the health of His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey with all the honors.

After these few words were uttered, His Excellency immediately rose, and spoke in flowing and eloquent language of his admiration of the Regiment he had just inspected, emphatically saying that the 36th if possible had surpassed themselves, alluded to his having been the soldier's friend for the last forty-eight years of his life, and repeatedly said that he had identified himself with the 36th Regt. whose health with that of their Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Maxwell he begged leave to propose.

Upon this the Lieutenant Colonel once more got up, and was about to burst forth into a torrent of eloquence, when in a most amusing strain of mimicry he pretended to be checked by a vision which appeared to enter at the door, and forbid him utterance, it was the vision of one from whom his duty to his country, has long separated him, but whom he tenderly loves, and the same which warned him, as we have been credibly informed, to abstain from speaking at the Temperance Soiree, on the celebration of Her Majesty's nuptials, when His Excellency honored the entertainment with his presence, the Commander of the Grass Greens had a subject allotted to him, to address the meeting upon, on that occasion, which we have no doubt he would have handled well, but not surpassing the masterly manner in which his friend Capt. O'Holloran performed his part. The gallant Colonel then sat down after expressing his warmest thanks for the flattering manner in which His Excellency had been pleased to speak of the Regiment under his command. The remainder of the evening passed off in peace and quiet, enlivened by the most agreeable conversation, which was only interrupted by the exquisite music of a very superior Band.

The 36th Regiment are undoubtedly favorites with all classes of this community; the gentlemanly deportment and upright, honorable bearing of the officers, as well as the excellent and admirable conduct of the under officers and privates, securing to them that good will and esteem which it seems to have been their anxious endeavour, ever since their arrival among us, to merit. Crime in this well reputed corps is unknown, drunkenness but of rare occurrence, and a general tone of politeness and civility pervades all ranks. "Desecration from their colors," which has been carried on to such an alarming extent in these Provinces of late, through the instigation and assistance of the vilest and most infamous of mankind, has not been able to take any root in this noble corps. A few misguided, weak-minded, or abandoned wretches will of course always be found, upon whom the poisonous lies and promises of the seducers will have their effect, but such is the abhorrence in which the crime is held by all ranks, that the officers have at great expense, succeeded in bringing back, with one or two exceptions, the few who have made the attempt, and the non-commissioned officers have entered into a subscription to defray the expenses of any of their comrades who may be sent in pursuit of them—no aid whatever being given by government to check this growing and serious evil.

Gentleman, whose talents and high attainments, justly entitle him to the honor, will afford, as well to his brethren in the ministry, as to his Parishioners, the very highest gratification.—Sentinel.

Yesterday afternoon arrived at this port the Steam Packet Unicorn, Captain Douglas, from Liverpool, May 16. She arrived at Halifax at 11 o'clock, June 1, and left for Boston at 12 o'clock the following night. She has made the passage in 18 days, and brings London papers to the evening of May 15, it being fifteen days later that were brought by the British Queen. She brought 27 passengers to Halifax, and 24 from Halifax to Boston. She had head winds during nearly the whole passage. The next boat will be the Britannia, to sail July 1. Among the passengers is a son of Mr. Samuel Cunard.

The Unicorn was first seen from Mr. Parker's Observatory at 12 minutes before 5, being near the light house, and she arrived opposite to the wharf at East Boston in 48 minutes. She was saluted from India wharf and East Boston, and from the Revenue Cutter. The Cutter was dressed with flags, and the English and American flags were hoisted at the Observatory and at the Maverick House. Capt. Sturgis of the Revenue Cutter, went on board the Unicorn and saw her moored at the wharf. Before proceeding to the wharf at East Boston, she passed near the end of Long Wharf, and took a turn round towards the Navy Yard, thence back to East Boston. The handsome painted glass windows of her cabin, were broken by the firing from East Boston.

THE STEAM SHIP ACADIAN.—Another of those large steam ships intended for the Halifax Station, named the Acadian, came up the Clyde from Port Glasgow on Sunday morning, and now occupies the berth which was previously filled by the Britannia. This splendid vessel is intended as a consort to the Britannia, and is of the same proportions as that vessel. She is built by Mr. John Wood, of Port Glasgow. The Engines are in the course of erection by Mr. Robert Napier, of the vulcan foundry.—Scottish Standard.

A Temperance Soiree was held at St. John on the 25th ultimo, which was attended by His Excellency Sir J. Harvey, and all the elite of the city,—during the evening, a number of songs, anthems, &c. were sung, and several appropriate speeches made by the honorable Judge Parker and others, after which refreshments were distributed to the assemblage, and the evening's amusement concluded with the anthem—"Praise God from whom all blessings flow." Who will say that this is not a rational way of passing an evening.—Haligonian.
