

BOSTON, JULY 7. THE BRITANNIA AT HAND.

In a few days we are to have a new steamer in this harbor.—We mean "the BRITANNIA," which is now on her route from Old to New England. She is spoken of as one of the noblest Steam Ships that ever floated on the sea—being superior in her Engines and Machinery, cabins, and accommodations, to any other vessel of her class. She is the first great packet of the royal mail line established by Mr. Cunard between Liverpool and Boston; and without a doubt her presence in our waters will attract uncommon attention. There is a lively curiosity to behold her on her first passage up the bay—and thousands from town and country will visit her, as soon as she reaches the steamboat-dock in east Boston. It is understood that the Britannia will bring Mr. CUNARD, her principal proprietor, and one of the most public-spirited men of the day. The undertaking of that gentleman to establish a line of steam packets between Liverpool and this city is one of the highest magnitude to Boston; and as he deserves, so will he receive a most hearty and hospitable reception from the inhabitants.

If she left Liverpool on the first of this month, as she undoubtedly did, "the Britannia" has been out six days, having, in all probability, performed one half of her voyage over the ocean. We hope to see her in the Bay State, by Monday or Tuesday next. Her entrance into the harbor will be a beautiful sight; and there seems to be a general desire on the part of the public to witness her arrival for the first time in Boston. As soon as she is telegraphed, the British and American ensigns will be raised upon all the observatories and flag staffs, and upon the masts of the principal vessels in the harbor. In passing up towards the Navy Yard, she will be saluted by a discharge of cannon from the cutter, and from South and East Boston, and by the bands on board of the United States ships of war, as well as by the cheers of the people in sailing boats and at the wharves. It is recommended that there should also be a discharge of artillery the moment she appears in the outer water, in order that the inhabitants may have an opportunity to reach the wharves in season to obtain a full view of "the great Steamer," as she enters the bay. This being done, the concourse of spectators will be immense; and all who wish it, will be enabled to enjoy the novelty and beauty of the spectacle. It has already been stated in this paper, that Mr. CUNARD will be among the passengers of "the Britannia," and that our fellow citizens are preparing to give him a most hearty and hospitable welcome.—Boston Atlas.
