[With reference to the Petition presented to the Governor General, it perhaps is not generally known that a Free School for the education of children of colour existed in this City some years ago, in connexion with the Madras Institution, the expenses of which were provided for by Legislative Grants;—and we believe the closing of this School was mainly attributable to the carelessness of the people for whose benefit it was instituted,—who neglected, at that time, to avail themselves of the advantages afforded to them, and which, we doubt not, would have been permanently continued, had they been duly appreciated.]

We learn with sincere pleasure that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, has issued an order for the survey of a fine tract of land, lying between Gagetown and the Nerepis Road; and, from about the middle of the flourishing settlement, called Cote Hill, towards Gagetown. This Ridge will be near Adair and a new road which has been laid out to meet the Nerepis from the shire town of the County about four or five miles above Darby Gillan's. The base line, when extended, will meet the fine old settlements west of Manger's and Ox Islands, and there meet the road to Oromocto and Fredericton; and by the way of Mrs. Mathers' on the Nerepis Road, the settlers can reach St. John Market by water through Coffin's Manor to Indian town or the Market Slips. As very abundant means of settlement have been afforded to the illustrious labouring Emigrants here during this and other seasons, we would earnestly recommend to the prudent to avail themselves of every eligible opportunity to settle in the interior of New Brunswick, where the Executive and Legislature are alike anxious to promote the interests of all its inhabitants by opening Roads; by affording means of moral and religious instruction, and by every philanthropic and patriotic course. When the survey is sufficiently advanced, information relative to the land will be furnished by the Honourable the Surveyor General to the Government Emigrant Agent here, and Mr. Wedderburn will then communicate it to all applicants. In the mean time he will receive and transmit to the proper authorities, applications from parties, who can satisfactorily show to them, their intention to become actual settlers!—City Gazette.

ASSASSINATION OF LIEUTENANT FARQUHAR BY CAPT. M'ADAM.—We regret to have to announce an event which, happily for the race and the country to which we belong, is of rare occurrence among us. Yesterday morning at Phillipsburg (Missisquoi Bay,) Captain M'Adam, of Colonel Dyer's Corps of volunteers, accosted Lieutenant Farquhar of the same corps in the street, and after a few words drew a loaded pistol, which he had kept concealed under his clothes, and discharged its contents in the body of his unfortunate victim. Lieutenant Farquhar fell instantly, and upon examination it was discovered that the wound was mortal, the ball having passed through the lungs and injured beyond all hope of reparation, some of the abdominal viscera. Captain M'Adam was easily secured by the police. A despatch was sent off to Montreal without loss of time by the commandant of the regiment, with the particulars of the event. Mr. Farquhar of this city, the father of the unhappy gentlemen thus prematurely cut off by the blow of an assassin, lost no time in obeying the summons to repair to Phillipsburg but with little hope of being in time to receive the last adieu of his son. He took medical attendants with him, although told that their assistance could be of no avail.

We are unable to give any minute particulars of the circumstances which led to this tragic event. All that we know upon the subject is, that some high words passed between the parties at the mess supper on Monday night, and that on the following (yesterday) morning, Captain M'Adam, after breakfast called upon Lieutenant Farquhar to retract and apologize for certain words he had used on the previous night, calling them "lies," or using some opprobrious epithet of the like nature. This the Lieutenant refused to do, whereupon his murderer drew forth the deadly weapon and consummated the crime with which he now stands chargeable to the offended laws.

The Quebec correspondent of the Morning Courier, gives an account of the interesting ceremony of creating Mr. Seguin, the celebrated vocalist, a Chief of the Huron Tribe, at the village of Lorette, near Quebec, by the name of *Wach-an-wach*, signifying an aquatic bird of passage possessing a strong and harmonious note called *The Great Diver*. It is only on rare occasions, and for some service rendered them by the White Man, that the Hurons ever confer this, the highest honour they have it in their power to bestow, and in this instance it was conferred on Mr. Seguin in grateful remembrance of the kindness and hospitality to the principal chiefs of their village when in London in the year 1825, shown to them by himself and father.—Mr. Seguin returned thanks in French for the honour conferred on him; and with Mrs. Seguin and Mr. Horncastle, who were present, sang "God save the Queen," with the most thrilling and soul stirring effect.

There was a strange occurrence at the Criminal Court, now sitting at Montreal, on Saturday last. One *Quin* was under trial for the murder of a child at St. Eustache, by shooting it with a pistol; the principal witness, after relating the affair, was questioned as to the identity of *Quin*, when he declared that he was not the person, and being asked if he could point out any person in Court who committed the act he had testified to, he pointed out one *Johnston*, who was one of the witnesses of the Crown, on whose deposition *Quin* had been arrested. *Quin* was discharged and *Johnston* sent to gaol.

INTERESTING SCENE IN THE ISLE OF SKYE.—July 17, 1840.—For the last fortnight Uigg Bay in the parish of Salsburgh in Skye, has presented a scene of much interest, owing to two transports being anchored there, for the purpose of removing for ever from their native hills and glens, several hundred souls, for the islands of Prince Edward's and Cape Breton, North America; the natives, sensible of the many disadvantages arising from a superabundant population, and no doubt dreading the recurrence of a similar destitution to that of 1836 and 1837, having voluntarily resolved in great numbers to emigrate to Her Majesty's colonies, in the already mentioned islands; consequently, for the last three months, there has been a great movement for this purpose in the northern parishes of Skye, and probably no fewer than 700 souls came to the determination of leaving their native isle, under the agency of Archibald M'Niven, Esq. of Tobermory. The general appearance, cleanliness, and comfort of the vessels provided by Mr. M'Niven, reflect much credit on his skill and attention, and prove that he spared neither trouble nor expense in getting them fitted out for the accommodation of the poor Hebrideans. The transports are, the *Nith*, of Liverpool, Captain Shaw, and the *Rother*, of Sunderland, Capt. Hall. The former is a splendid new ship of about 100 berths, capable of accommodating 400 full passengers. The latter is a beautiful brig of about 325 tons register, with about 40 berths, which are sufficient for 160 full passengers. On the morning of the 14th instant, the *Rother* weighed anchor, with her complement of passengers, for the custom house at Tobermory, and the *Nith* was to follow in a few days.

We regret to learn, from the Quebec papers, that the steam ship *Unicorn* ran ashore on the upper part of Percie Island, in the *St. Lawrence*, on her passage to Halifax, but we are happy to add, without any other injury than the detention of about twenty hours, and a few tons of coals, which were left on the Island, to lighten the ship. The following letter from Captain Douglas, published in the *Quebec Mercury*, contains the particulars of the accident:—

STEAM SHIP UNICORN,
Off Rivière du Loup, Aug. 31, 1840.

You will, no doubt, have heard before this reaches you, that the *Unicorn* has been ashore, and, very likely, report will have made her a wreck. We are, thank God, afloat, and proceed immediately, six, P. M. and I hope, therefore, in time for the *Acadie*.

I must give you an account of the mishap. Shortly after leaving Kamouraska I retired to rest, but had not closed my eyes—(this was at four o'clock in the morning)—when I heard the pilot call out "hard a starboard," and the vessel gently touched the ground, so lightly that I could scarcely believe her to be aground. The tide was ebbing fast, we therefore, had not a chance of floating before the tide again rose. The vessel has not received the slightest injury; she lay the same as if she was in dock and there is not even a wrinkle in her copper to be seen.

The place where we went ashore is the upper part of Percie Island, which, fortunately is quite smooth. I left about twenty tons of coal on the Island, which is the only loss we have sustained.
