**Resolved**, That the sacrilegious and dastardly attempt to destroy the Monument on Queenston Heights, excited in this County the strongest sentiments of abhorrence and disgust—that Her Majesty's Subjects here, although residing far distant from the Field of Glory, most cordially unite in those patriotic feelings which called together the Militia and other inhabitants of Upper Canada at Queenston Heights, on the 30th July last; and most heartily responded to the Resolutions which were adopted unanimously on that exciting occasion.

Moved by Wm. End, Esq. and seconded by Captain Lee:

**Resolved**, That while the individuals composing this Meeting, are ready to lend their aid towards the re-construction of the Monument, in such a manner as to render it (if possible), as imperishable as the Fame of that Hero, whose glory it is erected to perpetuate,—this Meeting is of opinion, that the cause for which the lamented and gallant Sir Isaac Brock fought and died, is the Cause of the British North American Colonies; that the spot, consecrated by his last victory should be distinguished by a Monument worthy of these Colonies, and the several Provincial Legislatures, reflecting the Spirit and Feelings of the Land, should come forward with liberal grants of money in furtherance of this truly Colonial undertaking.

Moved by Captain J. Fraser and seconded by Captain F. Ferguson:

**Resolved**, That the Members of Assembly for this County, be furnished with copies of these Resolutions, and that the unanimous desire of the Constituency be at the same time conveyed to them.

Major Miller being called to the Chair, it was **Resolved**—That the thanks of this Meeting be given to the High Sheriff for the promptness for which he attended to the public wishes in calling this Meeting, and also to Lieutenant Colonel Young for his conduct in the Chair.

BIBLE SOCIETY.

On Monday evening the Annual Meeting of the New Brunswick Auxiliary Bible Society took place in the National School Room.—The President of the Society, the Hon. Judge PARKER, having been necessarily absent in the discharge of his judicial duties, the Rev. I. W. D. GRAY, the Rector of the Parish, was called to the Chair.

The Chairman, in his usual happy manner, having opened the Meeting with a few words of explanation, and a part of the 19th Psalm having been sung, the Secretary of the Society read the Report of the Committee. The audience, which was numerous and respectable, and very patient and attentive during the period of nearly five hours, derived, we think, much satisfaction from the Report and the various luminous and impressive addresses which were delivered by the Gentlemen on the platform.—The Report conveyed to us the pleasing intelligence that the Auxiliary Society, and the Ladies' Associations and the Branches connected with it, are all in a very prosperous condition. Four Hundred Pounds sterling had been lately remitted to the Parent Institution, of which the Ladies' Society at St. John had contributed no less than one fourth. Plans had been devised for finding out the needy and supplying them with the Scriptures. Appropriations of the Scriptures, had been made to our Steamers, our Coasting Vessels and Wood-Boats. Among the contributions mentioned was a remittance of £42 4s. from Richbuneto, the proceeds of the benevolent exertions of the Ladies' Branch Bible Society lately established there, during the past year. The comprehensive outline given in the Report of Bible Society operations abroad exhibited the august Parent Society in a very engaging attitude pouring out from her beneficent reservoir the Scriptures of Eternal Truth to almost all the different nations in the world. Her revenue and distributions last year, much exceeded those of any previous year; and yet little, very little, has been done, compared with what remains to be accomplished, ere the great object of the Society has in view can be attained,—the supplying every individual in the world with a copy of God's Holy Word.

We would gladly give an abstract of the very eloquent and impressive addresses that were delivered on this interesting occasion—but our limits will only allow us at present to insert the names of the speakers, which we give in the order of the Resolutions which they moved or supported.—Capt. REV. JAMES THOMSON.—It will give the friends of the Bible Society, who have been anticipating much benefit to the cause of Bible circulation from the visit of the Rev. James Thomson much pleasure to be informed, that, while circumstances have made it necessary for him to return immediately to Quebec, *via* Halifax, and to leave many places in this Province unvisited, it is highly probable, that his engagements with the Parent Society will enable him to repeat his visit next spring, when he will devote his time to those parts of the Province especially, which have on this occasion been omitted.

We beg leave to direct public attention to the Prospectus of a contemplated work, advertised in our present impression, to be called, the "New Brunswick Compendium and Merchant's Companion," the publication of which, we are informed, will mainly depend upon the number of names that may appear upon the

subscription lists, which will shortly be laid before the public. As such a compilation is loudly called for, and as we are assured that no pains will be spared to render it not only accurate, but very generally useful, we have no doubt but that a reasonable share of public encouragement will be secured to foster the undertaking. At present, the information which this work will contain, can only be procured from a variety of different sources, and some of which, to the inhabitants of different parts of the Province, are wholly inaccessible.

On Monday the 26th inst., we were visited by a furious gale of wind which lasted several hours, and we regret to say, did considerable damage to the vessels in the harbour, and to many buildings in course of erection in this city. The wind sprang up about 9 o'clock A. M. from the S. W. and increased until near noon, when it blew with the greatest violence, accompanied at intervals with rain and hail, causing the tide to rise several feet higher than usual. The harbour presented a furious aspect, and the Beacon light at the bar being completely immersed in the roll of the sea. The pilot boat *Tenzer*, and the sloop *Three Brothers* dragged their anchors and went ashore; both vessels we understand received considerable damage. The schooner *William and Augusta* lying at the wharf, had their bulwarks stove in. Several rafts of timber broke loose, and the timber was scattered about the harbour. The frame of a new building at the corner of Sydney and Duke Streets, belonging to Mr. Jacobs, was entirely blown down. We are happy to learn that no lives were lost, although it was feared that such was the case. Several large vessels left our harbour on Sunday, but the fair wind that accompanied them, and which continued during the night, causes us to anticipate that they obtained a good offing before the gale commenced. We fear, however, that disastrous accounts will be received from the smaller vessels on this and the neighbouring coasts.

The Right Rev. Lord John Bishop of Nova Scotia arrived here on Tuesday last, and on the same day consecrated St. Luke's Chapel in this place, which was built some four or five years ago. After the performance of that interesting ceremony, he invited all who were desirous of confirmation to come forward to the altar. He impressed upon their minds the solemn obligations they had thus taken upon themselves, and then addressed himself to the congregation in a very affectionate and highly interesting discourse; and congratulated them on the taste they had displayed in the erection of an edifice so creditable to this enterprising Village, and to the community at large. His Lordship proceeded in the afternoon to Richmond for the purpose of consecrating a Church lately erected in that settlement. And on the following morning he proceeded down the river to visit the Churches between here and Fredericton.—*Woodstock Times*.

**HALIFAX HOTEL.**—This really most excellent and convenient edifice is now nearly finished. The design of both the outside and the interior of the building, and the general arrangements for convenience and comfort, reflect the highest credit on the committee under whose direction and superintendence, and by whose exertions it has been brought so near its completion. We hope soon to publish a particular description of this hotel, for it is justly deserving of it. At present we may state that it contains 105 rooms; the large dining room, (capable of accommodating 200 persons) is superior to any we have seen in the United States, and the internal arrangements of the building, (according to the opinion of gentlemen who have extensively travelled there,) are quite equal to any thing to be met with in that country.—*Morning Post*.
