

ARRIVAL AND LANDING OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

The landing was fixed for ten, A. M. at which harbour; the steam ferry boat Victoria went alongside, and, receiving the distinguished party, proceeded with them to the steam ferry slip, where, on landing, His Excellency was received by His Worship the Mayor, and the Members of the Common Council, the Magistrates of the City and County, the Members of the Executive and Legislative Councils, the Excellency the Governor General. Judges, the Members of Assembly, the Clergy, the Bar, the Merchants, &c.

His Excellency the Governor General, and His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, Sir JOHN HARVEY, took their seats in an open carriage, and were escorted by their mounted Staff and the personages above named. The 69th Regiment was drawn up in quarter distance column, right in front, opposite the steps leading from the landing place to Prince William street, and saluted as His Excellency mounted the same. The streets from the landing place to the Court house were lined by the Trades, through a lane formed by whom, His Excellency passed.


