#### ADDRESS

Of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John.

His Excellency the Right Hon. CHARLES POULETT THOMSON, Governor General of British North America, &c. &c. &c.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John; MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

We, the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of St. John, for this special purpose convened in Common Council, beg leave, on behalf of ourselves and fellow citizens whom we represent, most cordially to welcome Your Excellency upon our shores.

We attach great importance to this visit from Your Excellency. On no former occasion, since the original organization of the Province, has the distinguished honour been conferred by the supreme Representative of Her Majesty on this Continent.—The position Your Excellency has held in the Councils of the Nation, and the commanding influence which we are aware you possess, make it of great consequence that a personal inspection should make Your Excellency more intimately acquainted with the innumerable advantages of this infant though thriving City, and we hail Your Excellency's appearance amongst us as indicative of our future welfare, and the permanent interests of this Province.

Founded as this Colony was, in 1783, by a band of British American Loyalists—the principles of our Forefathers are held sacred both by their descendants, and those who have made this the land of their adoption from their mother country. We therefore yield to no part of the widely extended British Dominions in Loyalty to our Queen and attachment to our common country—without internal discord, and in the absence of all political excitement, the Province is tranquil and happy, and, as Your Excellency will discover, fast rising into importance, as one of the not least valuable appendages of the Crown.

In conclusion, we fervently hope, as we have every reason to believe, from Your Excellency's well known talents and habits of business, that Your Excellency's object in taking upon yourself the high trust you have the honour to fill may be crowned with full and complete success.

#### REPLY:

GENTLEMEN,—I thank you sincerely for your kind Address, and I feel most anxious, if possible, to convey, through you, to the Inhabitants of this City, my most grateful acknowledgements for the generous welcome with which I have been greeted.

I derive great satisfaction from the opportunity, which has thus presented itself to me, of visiting New Brunswick. The spectacle of a Colony, in which, as you justly remark, internal discord and political excitement are strangers, is the most gratifying I can witness, and I recognize, in the rapidly growing prosperity of your Province, the natural consequences of this happy state of feeling. Elsewhere upon this Continent, my task has been to calm party agitation, to reconcile political differences and to point the attention of the People to their real interests. Here, my duties are of a more pleasing character; to witness the happy results of your union and confidence, and only to lend my best assistance to your Lieutenant Governor, under whose administration your affairs have prospered, and to the People themselves, in advancing whatever may tend to the happiness and improvement of this fine Province.

For these objects, I beg you to believe that you may rely upon my utmost endeavours.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—The Chamber of Commerce of the City of Saint John, representing the Commercial community generally, approach Your Excellency with feelings of profound respect, and in all sincerity beg leave to tender to Your Excellency their hearty congratulations on your arrival in New Brunswick.

This Chamber indulges in the fond anticipations of important results to the Trade and Commerce of this Port, (and of our highly favoured Province throughout all its interests,) from the visit of one so high in station, and so influential in the Councils of our Fatherland; not alone from the knowledge your Excellency will acquire of the capabilities and resources of the country during your progress through it, but also from the impressions derived by personal observation, of the superior advantages and facilities of our Harbour (open at all seasons, and formed by the embouchure of a mighty River) affords us, of extending our commercial relations to an indefinite extent, provided those relations are fully sustained, fostered, and protected by our Parent Government.

There are many subjects of vast importance to the interests of New Brunswick, and relatively to the lower Provinces of British North America, which this Chamber are desirous to bring under the notice of Your Excellency, and which they would most respectfully and most earnestly urge for a favourable consideration.

The first subject is that of a Canal to connect the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence with the Bay of Fundy; this body feel deeply interested in the early completion of that important line of communication; they have laboured strenuously and unweariedly in bringing the merits of this undertaking before the country, and latterly, through the assistance of

our able and popular Lieut. Governor, Sir JOHN HARVEY, (to whose prompt courtesy in attending to our many representations on this and on other subjects, we would here bear grateful testimony,) we have attracted the attention of the Imperial Government to its utility. We now beg leave to submit to Your Excellency certain documents explanatory of the extent of our labours, as connected therewith.

A second subject is that of a daily Mail communication between Halifax and Saint John, at all seasons of the year. This Chamber petitioned the Legislature of this Province at their last session, pointing out the benefits likely to arise from it, to the political, mercantile, and social relations of the communities more immediately interested, and Sir JOHN HARVEY subsequently named Commissioners to meet Commissioners expected to be appointed by the Governor of Nova Scotia, to investigate and report upon the most practicable route for realizing so desirable an object. We regret to state that Commissioners cannot at present be appointed by the Governor of Nova Scotia, and this great improvement is consequently delayed—this body can only now look to Your Excellency for the adoption of such measures, as will facilitate the so much desired establishment of a daily Mail intercourse between this City and Halifax.

A third subject, that of a reduced and equal rate of Postage on letters passing to and from Halifax and Saint John, is more local in its nature: this Chamber humbly submit, for the perusal of Your Excellency, a copy of the Petition of their Committee to the Postmaster General, the Earl of Litchfield, embodying their views and wishes thereon; and they would solicit Your Excellency's favourable co-operation in obtaining for them the prayer of their Petition.

The survey of the Bay of Fundy, the protection of our Fisheries, the export of Timber, our Ship building and Mill Establishments—all matters of vital consideration to us, will, no doubt, attract the attention of Your Excellency, and as containing a full and clear detail of the subject, we submit for Your Excellency's information, our two last annual Reports, feeling assured that Your Excellency will not overlook any one object of importance to the Commercial interests of New Brunswick.

Deeply imbued with love and veneration for the glorious birth place of our Fathers—proud of the high heritage, which our connection with Great Britain entails upon us, and yielding to no section of that mighty Empire in devotion and loyalty to our Sovereign, we hail as a most auspicious event, and as an augury of great promise for the future, this visit of the Governor General of British North America to our youthful City.

The Members of this Institute beg to offer to Your Excellency their congratulations upon your safe arrival among them, and tender Your Excellency a hearty welcome to the shores of New Brunswick. While they regard this, the first visit of a Governor General to this Province, as an event of great importance to its welfare, they also view it as an evidence of Your Excellency's anxious desire to perform faithfully the important duties which Her Gracious Majesty has committed to your trust.

"The Mechanics' Institute of Saint John," although but recently established in a Colony which may still be considered in its infancy, yet feel sensible that they represent in a great measure the Manufacturing interests of a flourishing City in a prosperous and loyal portion of the British Empire. The Members of the Institute, one and all, have great gratification in availing themselves of this opportunity of expressing to Your Excellency their heartfelt loyalty and ardent attachment to Her Majesty's person and Government—a government under whose gracious protection they have ever enjoyed the glorious

privileges of the British Constitution, and which has of late been administered by His Excellency Sir JOHN HARVEY, their respected Lieutenant Governor, in a manner to give the most unqualified satisfaction, and maintain universal harmony and tranquillity while promoting the welfare and prosperity of the Province.

The Institute fervently hope that the blessings they now possess may be continued to them, and that they may ever enjoy the protection of the British flag—and they conclude with an earnest prayer to the Giver of all Good that Your Excellency may be blessed with health and happiness, and be enabled so to rule the affairs of these Colonies, as to promote peace, harmony and good will among all classes of men, establish their best interests on a firm footing, and permanently secure their onward course of prosperity and improvement.

GENTLEMEN,—I accept with much pleasure your congratulations on my arrival, and your good wishes in my behalf.

I regard with great interest the establishment of Institutions similar to that with which you are connected. By dispensing among the people of general knowledge of the principles of Science, they tend directly to their Commercial and Manufacturing prosperity, and help to develop the resources of the country.—It will therefore give me great satisfaction should it be in my power to assist your advancement, or promote your connection with similar Institutions in the adjoining Provinces and the Mother Country.

It affords me great pleasure to receive your testimony in the manner in which the Government of this Province has been administered by your Lieutenant Governor. The loyalty of the people of New Brunswick has been repeatedly proved, and I feel confident that in the harmony which now prevails throughout the Province, and among the different branches of the Government, is to be found the best assurance for your advancement in the Arts of peace and all that constitutes the true wealth of a Country.
