#### TO THE PUBLIC.

HAVING seen an advertisement in the newspapers headed "Illustrations of Canadian and American Scenery," signed by George Hardy, "Sole Agent" for the sale of said works, and to which advertisement he waxes "his Patrons" give him the solicitations of individuals stating themselves as Sole Agents, or Sub-Agents, whose slanderous and unfounded assertions during his absence from the City on business were calculated to leave impressions unfavourable to his reputation, they being mere speculators from New York," &c. &c.

As the said advertisement directly points to me, and the person acting under me, I request his "Patrons" to judge from facts, whether we be "mere New York Speculators," or that our assertions are either "slanderous or unfounded." As to who is Sole Agent, it is sufficient to say (and the public are aware of the fact) that I received the first consignment of Canadian Scenery in August, direct from George Virtue & Co., by the *Edwin*, as I can show by invoice, and subsequently a second, by the *Thetis*, of Canadian and American Scenery, with other works not yet shown to the public; such being the fact, if Mr. Hardy is sole Agent, why is he still expecting them, or why has he been three months in labor before he could be delivered of his advertisement, trading in me as Sole Agent, which can be seen in the *Courier* since the 8th of August last. As to "more Speculators," the term may be applied more appropriately to him who is speculating on their arrival, having no other goods to trade on, excepting an inexhaustible stock of assurance and duplicity, for which I find nine-tenths of "his Patrons" give him full credit. Will Mr. Hardy inform "his Patrons" where or when he got those "specimens" to be seen at all the booksellers? If Mr. Hardy be the slandered and calumniated man he represents himself, he in common honesty ought to have paid for the twelve parts of No. 1 of American Scenery, received from me in June last, and the four Nos. of Canadian Scenery which he received from the head "New York Speculator," Mr. Robert Martin, Partner of George Virtue & Co., residing in New York, before he left them "to be seen at all the booksellers." Will Mr. Hardy have the hardihood to deny that Mr. Martin, who was in Saint John in May last, and who had a power of attorney from George Virtue, came to inspect his accounts, and finding a large delinquency, removed him from the Agency? Will he deny that then, (instead of showing the pious spirit which he now exhibits) promised to give up all stock on hand, and book debts, due on account of the business, that he would give up everything but his furniture, and more could not be expected from him? Will he deny that then he was engaged to canvass for the Canadian Scenery as Sub-Agent, at the rate of one dollar for each subscriber, and then received from Mr. Martin, the more "New York Speculator," those four Nos. which "are now to be seen at all the Booksellers." On Mr. Hardy's promising to settle with whoever would be sent, and showing Mr. Virtue's power of attorney to Mr. Martin, I came here to take charge of the Agency of the two Provinces; on my presenting Mr. Hardy's account, which shows a deficit of £1,309 18s. 0d. sterling, Mr. Hardy said it was all right; he then recognised my Sole Agency by giving up, on Mr. Virtue's account, upwards of 9000 parts, besides bound works; and again on the 4th of August, 303 parts, and some other works.

After giving Mr. Hardy credit for the goods given up, I find there is still a balance of near £700 sterling to be accounted for, and of which I have not as yet received advice of its being in any way liquidated. Mr. Hardy has constantly evaded coming to a final settlement. On reference to Mr. Martin's letters, I find that in July, when I began to suspect Mr. Hardy's conduct, I wrote for a canvasser, Mr. Martin replies, "you had better give Hardy a fair trial, that is, if you find him honest;" his subsequent actions, however, have verified my suspicions. Again, in his letter to me of the 16th August, 1840, "Settle Hardy's account, without delay, I cannot imagine what he means; it is not by such a course he can expect to succeed; the debt is due, for which the creditor must be satisfied; on receipt of this, arrest him at once."—In regard to his having no money cannot be correct; he had a shipment of goods, last November, amounting to £444 16s. 11d. for which he has paid but 94 dollars only. Why have not followed my instructions in not arresting Mr. Hardy, is owing to an imperfection in the power of attorney, and of which neither Mr. Martin nor I were aware until I went to Duncan Robertson, Esquire, who pointed it out. Mr. Hardy has been fully aware of the defect since June last; as then, having every confidence, and thinking I was dealing with an honest man, I let him have the power twenty-four hours, for the purpose of himself and "Patrons." The delay of not receiving a new power, has been caused by Mr. Martin's absence in Canada and subsequent illness. Having stated those facts, I throw myself on the candour of the Inhabitants of the two Provinces, more especially "his Patrons," to judge whether we be "mere New York Speculators," or the "assertions" they have heard, respecting Mr. Hardy's character and conduct, are either "slanderous" or "unfounded."

Should any person wish to see the account, the power of attorney, or my instructions, I will show them with pleasure, on my return to Saint John, by their calling at my lodgings in King Street, any day next week.
