

of Havana. The Havana papers give the names of about a dozen more of the piratical gang, who were sentenced to imprisonment for life in solitary dungeons, to work in the docks.

IMPORTANT FROM MEXICO.—By the *Schr. Emblem*, which arrived at this port yesterday from Metamoros, we have received letters and papers of that port to the 1st instant, and dates from Mexico City to the 16th of July. Urrea the late Republican leader, had escaped from the dungeon of the Inquisition, roused the people, attacked and captured the City of Mexico, and made President Bustamante a prisoner. Bustamante subsequently got his liberty, and called the Centralists to the rescue; and a general battle is yet to decide which party shall remain master of the capital.—*New Orleans Bulletin*.

Later accounts had subsequently been received at New Orleans from Mexico, giving an account of a revolt in Mexico—great carnage—and ten days continued fighting in the capital.

ENGLISH EXTRACTS.

THE THAMES TUNNEL.—The whole of the wharfs, buildings, dwelling houses, sheds, and two public houses in High Street, Wapping, which covered an area of about 200 feet by about 70 in depth, purchased for the formation of the footway descent into the tunnel, have been entirely removed, and preparations for sinking the shaft of the north shore upon the site of the buildings have already commenced. The wharf will be extended about twenty four feet into the river, and workmen have been for some time employed in pile driving, and forming an embankment, on a portion of which the shaft will be formed. The works below are proceeding with great activity, and that part of the tunnel already completed is in a very sound state. There is no fear of any further eruptions, as the excavators have approached so near the north shore that the most dangerous portions of their labours can be carried on when the tide has receded, and there is no water over them. The steam engine over the shaft on the Rotherhithe shore is constantly kept going to pump up the water caused by the land springs, by which the Tunnel is always kept dry. The Thames Tunnel will be opened for foot passengers early next spring.

PRESENTATION OF PLATE TO SIR GEORGE COCKBURN.—A magnificent present of silver plate was made, on Thursday, to Sir George Cockburn, the value of which exceeds £1000. It was subscribed for by 86 officers, of both services, a deputation from whom waited on the gallant admiral with the gift, which consists of two separate pieces of plate, one of which was a large salver, and the other a superb plate, or centre piece for a table. This latter is composed of an architectural elevation of the height of 24 inches, the base of which supports four allegorical figures, emblematic of the quarters of the globe, in the whole of which Sir George has been employed in the battles of his country; from the base springs a quadrangular pillar, three sides of which are occupied with a coat of arms, and wreaths, having engraved thereon the names of the victories in which he participated, and the fourth contains a complimentary inscription. Surrounding this pillar is a group of four figures, representing the seamen, the soldier, the marine, and the marine artilleryman, the four services in which Sir George has been successfully engaged, the alternate spaces being filled with lions, sea horses, dolphins, and other characteristic ornaments, and the top surmounted with an elegant case.—*Bell's Weekly Messenger*, July 20.

R. W. Grey, Esq. of Cliphase Castle, has been appointed Private Secretary to the Right Hon. C. P. Thomson, Governor General of the North American Provinces.

The Countess of Mount Edgcombe has succeeded Lady Barham as the Lady in waiting on the Queen; and Lord Byron has succeeded the Earl of Listowel as the Lord in waiting on Her Majesty.

The new Houses of Parliament will be completed in 1844. There are 500 workmen employed at the buildings.

Col. Paisley was going on successfully with his operations on the wreck of the Royal George. On the 27th ult. a large piece of the keelson was got up, measuring 23 feet in extreme length, 15 inches in width, and 22 inches in depth. Some shorter fragments of the same, which were nearer to and under the sternpost, had been previously got up, so that nearly 30 feet of the after part of the keelson have now been removed, together with the floor timbers over it.

THE AFRICAN EXPEDITION.—The English are about making a great effort to penetrate the interior of Africa, by ascending the Niger. Three iron steam vessels built expressly for this purpose are to be used, to be commanded by Capt. Henry D. Trotter of the Navy, who will also have charge of the expedition, Commander William Allen, and Commander Bird Allen.

Africa has been the grave of many noble and enterprising men. There is something in the atmosphere, and particularly in the vicinity of the Niger, dreadfully fatal to European constitutions. Of those who embark in this expedition, but few can expect to revisit their native land.

THE SCOTT MONUMENT IN EDINBURGH.—The first stone of this national tribute to the genius of the greatest of Scotland's Sons, is, our readers are aware, to be laid next month, on the anniversary of Sir Walter's birth day. We understand from good authority, that the usual notice required by Parliament, has been given and the plans lodged, for obtaining a bill next session, for permission to make an extensive dock, on the Cheshire side of the river, at Wallasey Pool, where vessels will, as in the case of the Harrington and Herculaneum Docks (should the bills now in the House of Lords pass, as they were expected to,) be exempt from dues; so that, ere long, we may anticipate seeing both shores of the Mersey lined with shipping. To such an extent has the progress of building and location advanced on the Cheshire side, that we cannot conceive a more appropriate name for the district commencing with Birkenhead, and terminating with New Brighton, than "New Liverpool."—*Liverpool Standard*, Aug. 4.

The calendar for the city of Kilkenny, containing a population of 30,000 souls, is a perfect blank, there not being a single case for trial. Thus there have been assizes without prisoners, in three of the principal cities in Ireland, namely, Limerick, Waterford, and Kilkenny, after a season of unexampled distress among the poor. Such are the gratifying results of temperance and good government.

CORONER'S INQUEST.—An Inquest was held at the Parish of Andover, County of Carleton, on the 18th ult., before Mr. J. P. Taylor, Coroner, on view of the body of Battis Legassy. The Jury after a long and patient investigation of the case, returned a verdict that the deceased Battis Legassy came to his death in consequence of the injuries received on the body while in a state of intoxication in some way unknown to them.
