

ther Thomas, were released on the 7th. They proceeded, with a vast concourse, to the Temple to offer up thanks to God and prayers for Mehmet Ali. The Mussulmans of Damascus approve the justice and humanity of the Pacha in this step. Sir Moses Montefiore and the Jewish mission of mercy are returning to England, with the consolation that, if political circumstances have prevented their proceeding to Damascus, and in open court demonstrating the innocence of the accused, they have at least obtained their liberation, saved nine lives, and ransoms, by their representations, abolished for ever the use of torture in the East.

FATHER MATHEW'S CORK CONVERTS.—The following extract is from Father Mathew's last address to the people of Cork:—"The numbers who had violated the pledge in this city almost incline me to think that they are obstinately bent on their own destruction. Cork is the only place where the pledge has been violated, and violated to such an extent that, when in parts of Connaught and Leinster, I have been actually ashamed to read the Cork papers, so many instances were recorded of people having been brought before the magistrates for the crime of drunkenness."

QUICK TRAVELLING.—On Monday fortnight, his Royal Highness Prince Albert and suite reached Buckingham Palace from Windsor in the short space of fifty nine minutes. A special train started with them from the Slough station at six minutes past three, and arrived at Paddington at twenty eight and a half minutes past three, thus performing the distance between Paddington and Slough (eighteen and a half miles) in twenty-two and a half minutes, which is at the rate of forty nine miles and one third an hour.

A flood, unprecedented in the memory of man, has occurred at Benares, Bengal. The Barua overflowed its banks, and inundated a part of the cantonments. Many stables and other out-offices were washed down. On the 25th June, the water rose to within a few feet of the centre arch of the bridge leading from the cantonments to the civil lines. The bridge stood the pressure, which must have been tremendous.

FRIGHTFUL TUMBLE.—Last week a man fell over the new bridge at Barking, a height of 90 feet, into the water below. Fortunately he fell towards the deep part of the river, and strange to say, with the exception of being stunned by his alarming descent, got out uninjured.

There is no political intelligence from Portugal. The Queen was delivered of a still-born daughter on the 34 instant, but was doing well at the departure of the steamer, on the following day.
