R. is an officer of very gentlemanly character, high respectability, and during his long connection with the British Navy, has seen service in almost all parts of the world.

We mention these particulars that passengers may know something of the character, worth and estimation of gentlemen with whom they will come in contact; and in relation to the ships in this line, it affords us great pleasure to be able to speak in the highest terms of the several mail agents and officers who are attached to them.

The steamship Acadia, for Boston, will sail from Liverpool on Friday next, 4th Dec., and may be looked for about the 17th. The Caladonia (now in this port,) will sail for Liverpool, on Friday, 1st January.

The steamships to and from New York, will probably not make any more passages until the spring, so that the Boston ships will be the only steamers running for three or four months to come.

A GOOD ARRANGEMENT.—The "British Queen" was to leave New York yesterday for London, it being her last trip this season. We learn from the Transcript, that on her arrival at London, she will be overhauled and some alterations will be made in her arrangements. In the Spring, the "President" and "British Queen" will re-commence their trips; and the days of departure on both sides will be changed from the 1st to the 10th of each month. This will be a good arrangement, as they will not interfere with the Cunard line, and they will be spared the mortification of having their news anticipated by the mail steamships. During the Winter, the Cunard line will be the only steamers running.—*Boston Cou., Dec. 2.*
