To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir William Macbean George Colebrooke, K. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

WE, the President, Vice-President and Members of the Saint Patrick's Society of Fredericton, beg most respectfully to offer Your Excellency our hearty congratulations on your safe arrival in New Brunswick, to administer the Government of a Province which has so largely partaken of the gracious consideration and bounty of our beloved Monarch.

Bound as we are by every tie of loyalty and attachment to our Queen, as well as to the unrivalled constitution of our Country, we respectfully approach Your Excellency with those warm feelings of devotion and sincerity, to which, as the Representative of our Illustrious Queen, you are so justly entitled.

Formed as this Society is for charitably relieving and advancing the necessities poor, not only of Ireland, but of every other Country, when brought under our notice, we cannot but anticipate Your Excellency's cordial approval and support, especially when we assure Your Excellency how cheerfully we shall devote our best endeavours in promoting the great object of Immigration, which if judiciously applied to a Country like this, cannot fail to increase its wealth, strength and prosperity, which under Your Excellency's fostering care we confidently look forward to seeing fully developed in New Brunswick. REPLY:  
To the President, Vice-President and Members of the Saint Patrick's Society of Fredericton.

GENTLEMEN,—  
The Address which you have presented to me on my arrival, has peculiar claims to my attention.

On assuming the administration of a Province possessing such various and extensive resources, I cannot overlook that the increasing influx of Emigrants from the United Kingdom and especially from Ireland, will lead, under due encouragement, to the formation of numerous and prosperous Settlements, and from the sufferings and privations to which the more indigent class are sometimes exposed, the existence of Asso-

ciations which are prepared to afford them relief, is calculated to alleviate the anxieties which must attend those who quit their home and their friends, to settle in distant Countries.

In extending your charity to the necessities of every Country, regardless of their origin, you act in a spirit which evinces that you justly appreciate the feelings of the Queen, and the principles of the English Constitution, and I feel that I cannot more effectually fulfil Her Majesty's intentions and contribute to promote the welfare and happiness of Her subjects, than in fostering these principles.

I will only add, that I wish you all success in your benevolent undertaking, and I return you my very sincere acknowledgements for the cordial terms in which you have tendered to me your confidence, in the responsible charge which has devolved on me.

The following Rules of the York County Emigrant Society, are published in conformity with the Resolution to that effect:—

1. That a Society be formed, under the title of the YORK COUNTY EMIGRANT SOCIETY, for the purpose of affording employment, information and assistance to Emigrants in the County of York, newly arrived in the Province.

2. That the Society be in connexion and correspondence with every similar Society already existing, or that may be formed within the Province.

3. That the Officers of the Society shall consist of a President, two Vice Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and twelve other Members,—all to be annually elected, and to continue in office until others are elected to supply their places; the whole, when so elected, to compose and be called The Managing Committee, to whose management and control the business of the Society, and the care, disposal and appropriation of the Funds is committed during their continuance in office, subject to the Rules and such Resolutions as may from time to time be made and passed at the Annual or at any General Meeting of the Members of the Society; the said Committee to have power in their own body to fill up any vacancies therein, until the next General Meeting.

4. That any five Members of the Committee (the President or a Vice President being one) shall constitute a Board for despatch of business.

5. That a subscription of Five Shillings at the least, payable annually, or Five Pounds paid in advance, shall constitute a permanent Member; the first payment of the annual subscription to be made at the time of subscribing, and the others on or before the first Tuesday in January in every year, to the Treasurer.

6. That all Donations of every kind, however small, whether in money, fuel, clothing or provisions, will be thankfully received, and a fair account kept thereof.

7. That an Office be opened, to be called "The Emigrant's Office," where a Register will be kept of the names and circumstances of applicants, who will there be furnished with advice, information and assistance, as may be required, consistently with the instructions of the Managing Committee.

8. That for this purpose, the Secretary be required to attend at the Office daily, or on such days as the Committee shall think necessary; and that he keep a Register, in which shall be entered the names and circumstances of every Emigrant applying for employment, for land, or for assistance of any kind,—and the number in family both males and females,—and the places where to be found; and also a Register of the names and places of residence of all persons sending information to the Office of their being ready to furnish employment, and to what extent, to Emigrants, and in what capacity.

9. That the Committee of Management have a discretionary power of appropriating such an amount of the funds of the Society as they may from time to time deem requisite, (consistent with the rules and objects of the Society,) as well in giving temporary relief to sick, indigent or disabled Emigrants in the County; as also in aiding and assisting Emigrants in their transport to distant parts of the County, for the purpose of obtaining employment,—or for the settling upon Lands: Provided always that no such relief or assistance be granted out of the funds of this Society to any but Emigrants who have not been in the Province more than one year preceding such application for assistance.

10. That all applications made to any Member of the Society be referred by ticket to the Secretary.

11. That it be the duty of the Committee of Management to make such necessary arrangements with the Secretary as their means will admit of, for the reception of Emigrants at Fredericton, and getting them forwarded to different parts of the County where employment may be obtained for them, or where Lands are open for settlement,—and to furnish the Secretary with the necessary instructions for his guidance, in all cases that do not require to be first submitted to the consideration of the Committee.

12. That it be the duty of the Secretary to attend strictly to the general and all other instructions of the Committee of Management, and that he keep a Book to be called The Minute Book of the Committee of Management, in which he shall enter the proceedings of the Committee at every Meeting thereof, and shall at all Meetings of the said Committee, submit a Statement of his proceedings since the then last preceding Meeting, and also his Books of Registry for inspection.

13. That in order to assist the Committee in finding employment for those who may have recourse to this Society,—the Inhabitants of Fredericton and the County generally, be requested by a public notice in the Royal Gazette, to make application to the Society at the Office, for such Mechanics, Labourers, and Servants, as they may require, and to the same end, Letters be written by the Secretary in the name of the Society, to the Magistrates, or any other respectable persons in each Parish in the County, enclosing a copy of the rules and requesting similar applications, and also general information as to the number they can employ and the means they possess of furthering the objects of the Society, and soliciting their aid in procuring subscriptions in their respective Parishes towards the funds, and in inducing

the Inhabitants generally to become Members thereof, so as to enable the Committee to extend its benefits widely through the County.

14. That it be the duty of the Secretary to furnish to Emigrants applying at the Office, all information in his power relative to the means of their procuring Land for settlement, assistance, or employment for themselves or families, and in all cases where he may require further instructions from the Committee before the then next monthly Meeting—it shall be the duty of the President, or (in his absence) of one of the Vice Presidents, to call a Special Meeting of the Committee on being applied to by the Secretary for that purpose, and in such case it shall not be necessary to send notice to such Members of the Committee who may be absent from the County at the time, provided the Members so absent shall not exceed five.

15. That there be a meeting of the Committee on the first Monday of every month, at half-past three o'clock, P. M., at such place in Fredericton as the Committee may themselves determine on, besides such Special Meetings as may be called at the request of the Secretary, according to the provisions of the 14th Rule—and a general yearly Meeting of the Subscribers on the first Tuesday in January, at two o'clock, P. M., at the County Court House in Fredericton, at which general Meeting a report of the state of the Society shall be submitted by the Secretary, having first passed the Committee, and also at such annual general Meeting the Officers for the ensuing year shall be elected, and any alterations in or additions to the Rules now established may then be made, that the majority of the Members present may deem requisite.

16. That it shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all subscriptions, grants, donations, and other pecuniary contributions to the funds of the Society, and to make all such payments and advances thereon as the Committee of Management may from time to time direct—and that he shall keep a true and correct list of the names of all Members paying their subscriptions or making donations to the Society, with the respective amounts thereof—and shall keep a correct Book of accounts in which shall be entered all monies received and paid by him, on account of the Society, which shall be balanced at the end of each Month, and submitted to the inspection of the Committee at every Monthly Meeting.

17. That the Committee of Management be empowered to call a Special General Meeting of the Members of the Society, as often as circumstances may require; but such Special General Meetings shall have no power to elect Officers, except to fill vacancies occurring, subsequent to the preceding Annual Meeting, or to make any alterations in the Rules, but may by a majority of votes, determine any other matter relating to the business of the Society that the Committee of Management may submit to the consideration of the Members then present.

We are glad to hear that the N. B. and N. S. Land Company are about to lay out fifty or sixty allotments of 100 acres each, extending from the upper granted lots on the Keswick to the Royal Road, for actual settlement. The land is excellent, and will be offered for sale on reasonable terms; the particulars of which may be known by applying at the Emigrant Office, Fredericton, or to the Commissioner at Stanley; where information will also be given on the subject of the vacant lots on the Stanley Road, as well as of the Company's lands generally, and which we consider as very liberal and satisfactory.

Through the liberality of the Company, a medical gentleman of high reputation has been ordered to purchase lands, with a view to establish himself at Stanley, and efforts are making in England to encourage a clergyman of the Church of England to follow this example. Such conduct reflects the highest credit on an Association, whose heavy expenditure on improvements have hitherto met with so unprofitable a return. We nevertheless feel confident of the ultimate success of the undertaking, and consider that the farther outlays now in contemplation for the encouragement of Emigration, cannot fail to produce the result it merits.

We understand that Hay and Clover seed, together with a few bushels of Seed Wheat of the first quality, belonging to the Company, are to be purchased at Mr. Coburn's Store, Fredericton, at cost price.—Sentinel.

Mr. Editor,—In a young country like this it is hardly to be expected that the fine arts should have much chance to take root and flourish, yet I see no reason why the trial should not be made, nor do I doubt but that there are sufficient persons of cultivated and refined taste in this Province to prevent such an attempt from failing altogether. Whether this be the case or not may not be ascertained, since Mr. Petersilea, Musical Professor of Saint John, has just published a set of songs adapted to some of Mrs. Hemans's finest compositions.—They are seven in number, and without exception contain much excellence. As may be inferred from the source whence the words are derived, these pieces are all of a serious character, and breathe throughout a spirit of piety that is equally as perceptible in the music as in the poetry, it being evident that, in qualifying himself for appearing before the public in the character of a composer, Mr. P. has not forgotten that most essential requisite, the art of "adaptation." I have been favored with an opportunity of hearing these songs, and consider it no small proof of the composer's talents, that his music gave increased effect to language which in unskilful hands must have suffered from the attempt. Perhaps the best specimens of this effect may be found in two simple and plaintive airs called "Lights and Shades," and "The Silvery Snow," whilst "The Song of Emigration," which is of a bolder character, portrays in natural colours the alternations of feeling that are experienced by persons that are first leaving home for a new country. The remaining four songs are excellent, but these I have mentioned made the deepest impression on me at first hearing them, and I therefore give them the most prominent place.

That Mr. Petersilea is a man of talent cannot be doubted by those who are able to appreciate his compositions, and I trust to see him in time occupy that position in the musical world to which he deservedly aspires.
