

stroying two entire regiments, amounting to 1,200 men, who were drawn up on the ramparts, and not leaving a living soul within an area of 12 acres; and this is further corroborated by the paragraph in Sir Robert Stopford's despatch, short as it is, in which the gallant Admiral ascribes the merit to the Gorgon; in fact, none of the line of battle ships threw any shells. It is worthy of remark, and it is a most singular coincidence, that in the operations on the coast of Spain, under Commodore Lord John Hay, it was the shells from the Phoenix, Captain Henderson, directed by Sergeant Smith, of the Royal Marine Artillery, that killed the Spanish General and breached the Carlist lines at St. Sebastian, and which alone enabled the Legion under General Evans to storm them. Thus the two steam-frigates which Captain William Henderson commanded have been the immediate cause of the most brilliant success in both operations.

The following naval intelligence is abridged from the *Hampshire Telegraph* of last Saturday:—"The Britannia, 120, Captain Drake, with the flag of Rear Admiral Sir John Ommanney, K. C. B., and the Howe, 120, Captain Sir W. O. Pell, unmoored this evening, and will proceed to the Mediterranean to-morrow morning. The Hecla, steam frigate, for the same quarter, is only detained for the survey of the surgeon's stores, in consequence of that officer having been dismissed the ship, and for his successor joining; but she will go to sea to-morrow. These large ships were paid wages on Thursday, and inspected yesterday by Admiral Sir E. Codrington; who expressed himself highly gratified with their appearance both as respects crews and ships. Each ship will go to sea with nearly 1,000 men on board, as they carry out upwards of 350 disposable men for the fleet, of the very best description. They, as well as the Salamander, are filled with Ordnance and Commissariat stores. The Pelican, 18, is ordered for commission at Chatham, by Commander C. Napier. The Iris, 26, is to be commissioned immediately by Captain Hugh Nurse, at Plymouth. The Driver, steam frigate, building in this dockyard, is ordered to be completed by the 1st of January next. The crew of the Queen was turned over from the Donegal on Thursday last; she has three hundred disposable seamen on board. The Hecla and Salamander steamers were paid wages to day; the crew of the latter vessel were permitted to go on shore on fourteen days' leave, and when they return she will proceed on service. The Albion, steam vessel, and the Pantaloon, 10, arrived yesterday, the former from Liverpool with fifty five newly raised men; and the latter, from the coast of Sussex, with twenty men. The Pantaloon proceeds to-morrow to assist the Inconstant in raising seamen at Bantry Bay. The Raven, also with men, arrived on Tuesday from Liverpool. The Salamander steam frigate arrived yesterday from Woolwich, with an Ordnance boy in tow, loaded with ammunition and munitions of war, which have been landed at the gun-wharf, also with one hundred and twenty seamen for general service. The Vengeance, 84, will be taken out of dock on Monday the 9th instant, and will then be rigged under the superintendence of Mr. Miller, the master of the Victory. The masts and yards are selected for the St. Vincent, Neptune, Warspite, and Vindictive. The Trincomalee and Madagascar are in every respect ready for commission, the bulkheads and interior fittings being all complete."

The following three-decked ships are ordered to be commissioned immediately. The Caladonia, 120, and Impregnable, 104, both at Plymouth; the former as port flag ship of Admiral Sir Graham Moore, and the latter for service in the Mediterranean, to be commanded by Captain Thomas Forrest. The Camperdown, 104, is also ordered for commission at Sheerness for the same quarter.—*Brighton Gazette*.

**LONDON MARKETS, Dec. 2.**—SUGAR.—In the West India market there was little business done to day, but prices were firm; not 200 lbs. &c. were sold; at public sale a small parcel of Mauritius went at former rates. The foreign market is dull, and the parcels at public sale to day were taken in, Brazil at 22s. 6d. to 28s. per cwt.

**COFFEE.**—The demand was steady to day from the home trade for all kinds of clean Coffee, and previous rates were fully maintained at the small public sales.

**TEA.**—The demand was dull to-day for free trade, and former rates were barely supported; Company's Congon flat at 2s. 3d. per lb; some large auctions are declared.

**SPIRITS.**—Prices must be quoted rather lower for Rum, and the market dull; Brandy steady at last prices.

**THE ARMY.**—Regimental Schoolmistresses.—Her Majesty has within the last fortnight, signed a warrant for the appointment of a schoolmistress to every regiment of cavalry, and every regiment, battalion, or depot of infantry. Her duties will be to instruct the female children of soldiers in reading, writing, arithmetic, and plain needle work. For this she is to receive a salary of £20 a-year, or, where a regiment of infantry is on detached service, or in depot, at the rate of £3 a company. The want of such a person has long been felt in the service; for, hitherto, although ample provision has been in existence for the instruction of the sons, none has, until the present time, ever been afforded to the daughters of soldiers. Wherever it is possible, it is intended that this situation shall be filled by the wife of a non-commissioned officer of the regiment to which she is appointed.—*Dublin Monitor*.

Thirty pounds per annum will be allowed to regiments of Cavalry, and same to regiments of infantry, to provide for the education of the daughters of soldiers, and £5 for a school-room.

**THE NAVY.**—When the vessels now building in our dockyards are completed, the strength of the British navy will be very considerable. The following vessels are on the

Friday last being New Year's Day, a large body of the Melicite Tribe of Indians, including a considerable number of well dressed Squaws, and headed by their respected old Chief THOMA, attended at Government House to pay their annual compliments to the Representative of the Sovereign, and were received by His Excellency with great kindness. The principal Officers of the Government with their Ladies and Families, including the Junior branches, and the Officers of the Garrison were present, and the Band of the 36th attended. After their reception, several of the Dances of their Nation were performed by thirty or forty of the Indians and their Squaws in the great Drawing Room; after which a Waltz and Quadrille were danced by several of the young Ladies and Gentlemen present, at the request of the Indians.

His Excellency availed himself of this occasion, publicly to decorate the worthy old Chief with a splendid silver Medalion suspended by a blue Ribbon, exhibiting a beautiful effigy of our gracious Queen on one side with the Royal Arms on the reverse—one of several similar Badges which we understand His Excellency the Governor General has been liberally pleased to place at the disposal of the Lieutenant Governor.

On Thursday evening Sir JOHN and LADY HARVEY, gave a Ball at Government House; and although, owing to various casualties, the females of several families in town were prevented from attending, yet a large party assembled; and the juvenile portion, and some of the seniors also, "tripped on the light fantastic toe," till the dawn of the present year, when the supper room was thrown open. After a short time had been spent in paying proper attention to the various delicacies, with which the tables were spread, His Excellency rose, and having made a few preparatory remarks in his usual happy style, addressed the company as follows:—

Ladies and Gentlemen.—Convinced that no observations in my power to offer, could add to those feelings of love and loyalty, with which I well know that every individual of this company is animated, I have no intention to introduce the toast which I have to propose by a formal speech; but will put a few plain questions, which I will also myself undertake to answer on your part.

In what respect then, let me ask, is one sex less fitted than the other for the duties of the throne, under the admirable Constitution under which we have the happiness to live?—Have we found that a female Sovereign is less enlightened, less firm, less gracious, less merciful, less pure, less assiduous in the discharge of all duties than one of the other sex?—And, as the period has gone by, never, it is to be hoped, to return, when the personal prowess of the Sovereign in the field of battle, was regarded as an almost indispensable qualification for the kingly office, I ask again in what respect is a Princess less fitted for that office than a Prince? I ask these questions of you Ladies? You are silent—then let me answer for you, IN NONE.

Ladies and Gentlemen.—When we met under this roof (not very long ago) to celebrate the auspicious union of our young and lovely Queen with the Man of Her choice, prayers and wishes

as fervent and sincere as those which could have proceeded from the hearts of any other portion of Her Majesty's loyal subjects, throughout the whole of Her widely extended dominions, were here breathed, that all domestic felicity might be Her Majesty's lot, and the hopes which were cherished by the universal British nation, with an ardour commensurate with the importance of their object, might, under the blessing of Divine Providence, be accomplished in due season.

Those petitions have been graciously accorded; and we now meet for the purpose of celebrating their fulfilment. In proposing the Toast in which I invite you to pledge me, I am sure that I shall meet the wishes of the Ladies, and I trust those of all around me, by not separating—even in a toast—those whom God and their own hearts have so closely united, from this first precious link in the chain of their wedded happiness. I call upon you all then, to join me in invoking—Health, continued happiness and long life to the Queen, to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, Her Majesty's beloved Consort, and to the bright realization of the hopes of the Empire—the PRINCESS ROYAL OF ENGLAND.

After this toast had been drunk, which was followed by three times three, and the ladies had retired to the ball-room; Mr. Justice CARTER said, that having drunk the health of Her Majesty and her illustrious consort, it only remained to propose another toast, which he felt assured all present would drink with much pleasure. His Honor then gave Sir John and Lady HARVEY, and may health and happiness attend them; which was drunk in the most enthusiastic manner. The Lieut. Governor returned thanks for the compliment which had been paid to himself and Lady Harvey; which he said he felt as one directed also peculiarly to himself. His Excellency said, that since his assuming the government of the Province, individually he had met with the esteem and good will of its inhabitants, of which the present was a fresh assurance; and formed another link in that chain of attachment, by which he was bound to New Brunswick. And originating as it did with a gentleman, totally unconnected with the government, and free from any undue influence, he felt the compliment more forcibly. His Excellency then proposed and drank the health of all present, wishing them at the same time a happy New Year; and then returned to the ball-room, where dancing was resumed; and the party began to retire about half-past one o'clock, evidently well pleased with the manner in which the evening had been spent, and the urbanity and kindness of His Excellency and Lady HARVEY, and the several members of their family.—*Sentinel*.

On Friday the first of January, there was a Levee at Government House, "in honour of the auspicious event of the birth of a Princess Royal," which was numerously attended.
