

The steamboat Caroline was a hostile vessel engaged in piratical war against Her Majesty's people, hired from her owners for that purpose, and known to be so beyond the possibility of doubt.

The place where the vessel was destroyed was nominally, it is true, within the territory of a friendly Power, but the friendly Power had been deprived, through overbearing piratical violence, of the use of its proper authority over that portion of territory. The authorities of New York had not even been able to prevent the artillery of the State from being carried off publicly at mid-day, to be used as instruments of war against Her Majesty's subjects. It was under such circumstances, which it is to be hoped will never recur, that the vessel was attacked by a party of Her Majesty's people, captured, and destroyed.

A remonstrance against the act in question has been addressed by the United States to Her Majesty's Government in England. I am not authorized to pronounce the decision of Her Majesty's Government upon the remonstrance, but I have felt myself bound to record, in the meantime, the above opinion, in order to protest in the most solemn manner against the spirited and loyal conduct of Her Majesty's officers and people being qualified, through an unfortunate misapprehension, as I believe, of the facts, with the appellation of outrage or of murder.

I avail myself of this occasion to renew to you the assurance of my distinguished consideration.

Sir,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your note of the 29th instant, in reply to mine of the 26th, on the subject of the arrest and detention of Alexander McLeod, as one of the perpetrators of the outrage committed in New York when the steamboat Caroline was seized and burnt. Full evidence of that outrage has been presented to Her Majesty's Government with a demand for redress, and of course no discussion of the circumstances here, can be either useful or proper, nor can I suppose it to be your desire to invite it. I take leave of the subject with this single remark, that the opinion so strongly expressed by you on the facts and principles involved in the demand for reparation on Her Majesty's Government by the United States would hardly have been hazarded had you been possessed of the carefully collected testimony which has been presented to your Government in support of the demand.

I avail myself of this occasion to renew to you the assurance of my distinguished consideration.

Our latest dates from Great Britain are by way of New York, which by arrivals at that port, Liverpool papers have been received down to the 12th December, inclusive.—In addition to the important transactions in the East Indies, the official accounts of which will be found in to-day's Gazette, we subjoin the following brief summary of English and Foreign intelligence:—

Her Majesty the Queen has completely recovered, and, together with the infant Princess, is doing remarkably well. Her Majesty in person held a Privy Council at Buckingham Palace on the 8th ult.

Parliament has been further adjourned until the 26th inst., on which day it will be assembled for the dispatch of business.

It is gratifying to perceive that the monetary affairs of the British Empire are in a highly prosperous condition, and that all demand for the exportation of specie has ceased. The impulse to trade is gradually increasing, and there is every prospect of a return to cheerful times.

It is in contemplation to create the Province of New Brunswick into an independent Episcopal See.

Her Majesty has appointed Com. Charles Napier a Knight Commander of the Order of the Bath, for his distinguished services in Syria.

The new steam ship Columbia was advertised

at Liverpool, to sail on the 5th January for Halifax and Boston.

The steamer Oriental had made a passage from Gibraltar to Malta in three days and twenty hours. It was supposed to be the shortest passage ever made between the two ports.

It is said that the English and French Cabinets were on better terms, and that the tone of the last despatches of the latter was more satisfactory.

General Sir Joseph Stratton, recently deceased, bequeathed £70,000 to the University of Edinburgh.

M. Guizot declared in the Chamber of Deputies, on the 9th of December, that it was the firm determination of the French Government, not to interfere, directly or indirectly, in the affairs of Spain. This is important.

The over-land India Mail arrived at London on the 7th of December, via Alexandria and Marseilles, containing advices from Bombay to the 1st of November, from China to the 4th of August, and from Calcutta to the 18th of October.

FRANCE.—The long and angry debates in the Chamber of Deputies had resulted in the adoption of the ministerial address in answer to the royal speech, by a majority of 86, the numbers being 247 and 161. A great triumph for the King and M. Guizot.

The Havre Journal gives an account of the entrance of the remains of Napoleon into the Seine, and their passing in front of that port.

The submission of Mehemet Ali was published on the 7th, in Paris, in a form of a telegraphic despatch from Marseilles.

The re-interment of the remains of the Emperor was to take place on the 15th of December. The escort was to consist of 30,000 men, under command of General Schneider.

By the packet ship Quebec, London papers to the 13th and Portsmouth of the 14th December, have been received at New York.

The Legislature of this Province assemble this day for the despatch of business. We shall issue His Excellency's Speech in an Extra Gazette immediately after its delivery.

We have to-day the melancholy duty of announcing the death of Lt. Colonel SNODGRASS, Deputy Quarter Master General of the army serving in Nova Scotia. He expired at half past 6 o'clock on Thursday evening last.—Halifax, January 16.
