## ENGLISH MAIL FOR FEBRUARY.

The Steamer with the February Mail had arrived at Halifax. Despatches were received here, by express, and forwarded to His Excellency the Governor General yesterday morning.

The Letters and Papers however, for this place had not reached us when our paper went to Press, consequently in the absence of Foreign News, we have occupied our columns with several lengthy and important extracts from the Journals of the Legislature.

## POSTSCRIPT.

Since writing the above we have been politely favoured with the *London Morning Herald*, of the 2d Feb., which was received by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and is the only English paper, we believe, in town, from which we have hastily collected the subjoined Summary of news:—

## HOUSE OF LORDS, 2d February.

On Motion of the Earl of Shaftesbury, the Earl of Cardigan was taken into custody by the Usher of the Black Rod. His Lordship was admitted to bail, on furnishing two sureties in £5,000 each, and himself in £10,000 to appear when ordered.

The *Monitor* of Sunday evening publishes the following:—We have received this evening by means of the Austrian embassy, intelligence of importance from the East. On the 12th January one of the Officers of the Sultan left Constantinople for Alexandria, the bearer of a firman, by which His Highness officially accords to Mehmet Ali the hereditary possession of Egypt. On the 14th of the same month Mehmet Ali restored the Turkish flag to the *Monitor* adds, we conclude from this that all the difficulties which disturb the peace of the East are definitively settled.

The funds rallied slightly in consequence of the statements about of the positive establishment of the Eastern, that is of the Turco Egyptian question. But Consols after all reached only to 89½ for money, and 89½
