

26th inst. It is believed that the court will remain in town for about a month, and then return to the castle, where it will remain till the end of April.

We have reason to believe that the christening of the Princess Royal is fixed for the 10th of next month, the anniversary of Her Majesty's marriage.—*Morning Post*.

Yesterday at three o'clock in the afternoon, the ceremony of christening the Queen was performed, in Her Majesty's private apartments at Buckingham Palace, by the Archbishop of Canterbury. Only Prince Albert, the Duchess of Kent, the Lady in Waiting, and the Deputy Clerk of the Closet were present.

A rumour prevailed in Paris on Saturday that several changes would take place in the French Cabinet. Count Mole, M. Passy, and M. Dufaure would, it was affirmed, replace MM. Guizot, Humann, and Dacheux. The *cheval de bataille* of the new Cabinet will be said to be an attempt to court the alliance of Russia. Despatches from Russia are stated to have reached the French capital having for their object to conciliate the French Government.

Vice Admiral Grivel, the Maritime Prefect of Brest, the only surviving officer of the Marines of the Imperial Guard, had arrived in Paris, to be present at the funeral of Napoleon.

The venerable and gallant Lord Lynedoch, now upwards of ninety years of age, is on board the *Howe* as a passenger to Malta, for the benefit of a warm climate during the winter.

Sir Moses Montefiore, the English Jewish gentleman, who went to the East on the subject of the oppression of the Jews of Damascus, has succeeded admirably in his mission, and been received by the Sultan in the most flattering manner.

Advices from Venice of the 10th, state that the Duchess of Cambridge, her son, and daughters, were treated with the greatest distinction by the Austrian government. Count de Spar, the Governor, generally accompanied them in their visits to the monuments, and establishments of that city.

THE NEW HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT.—The walls of the new houses of Parliament are progressing very rapidly. The elevation of most of the outside walls now reach about twelve feet. Every exertion will be made to complete both houses in the time originally specified.

KEEPER OF THE GREAT SEAL.—We understand that the Earl of Stair has been appointed Keeper of the Great Seal for Scotland, formerly held by the late Duke of Argyll.

Mrs. Packer, who has been appointed wet-nurse to the Princess Royal, is a native of Edinburgh, where she was well known as Miss Augusta Gow. She is a daughter of the late Nathaniel Gow, of this city, and granddaughter of the celebrated Neil Gow. Mrs. Packer studied music at the Royal Academy, London, with the view of becoming a public singer; in which character she appeared here at several concerts. Mrs. Packer has, or at least had, a splendid figure; and no doubt possesses all the qualifications requisite for the proper performance of the duties of her important office.—*Scotsman*.

A Toulon letter of the 13th states, that the *Jena*, of 30 guns, Admiral Hugon's flag-ship, the *Montebello*, 120, bearing Admiral La Suse's flag, the *Suffren* 90, the *Jupiter* 90, the *Alger* 84, and the *Neptune* 84, are the vessels which have received orders to get ready for sea; but nothing certain was known as to their destination. Tangier was still considered as the most probable point to which they would be sent.

The correspondent of the *Herald* announces that a wonderful gray parrot has been added to the Royal Establishment, which has been purchased for Prince Albert for £50. Among its other qualifications, the parrot sings, "with great apparent feeling," the first verse of "The flag that braved a thousand years;" it also sings, "with considerable humour," the first verse of "Jim Crow," with the whistling and jumping accompaniment; finally, when convivial, it drinks the health of the Queen and Prince Albert. This wonderful bird has been placed under the appropriate special care of Baroness Letzen.

A rumour which has prevailed in Paris for a few days, was renewed on Monday, that the Continental Powers had protested against the fortification of Paris. The rumour appeared originally to be suggested by the temporary suspension of the works.

On Wednesday, Prince Albert visited the Polytechnic Institution, and descended in the diving-bell. The Prince, it is said, ordered his attendants to give the man who descends in the diving-dress two guineas, "to keep the cold out."

CHINA.—IMPORTANT.—THE BRITISH IN PEKING.—Commercial letters from St. Petersburg continue to speak of the appearance of the British at Peking. In one of them, it is stated that two considerable towns, besides the capital, had been taken possession of. The *Manchester Guardian* gives the following (dated St. Petersburg, Dec. 11), which has been addressed to "an eminent foreign house" at Manchester, and which was received on Wednesday morning:—"At the beginning of this week a Tartar arrived here from Kiakta with the news that the English had taken the capital of China, after having bombarded it and destroyed all the forts near the river. The Emperor, the son of the sun, had fled with all his mandarins. The consequence of this event will be a good treaty, which will completely change the commercial dealings with that empire." This information seems to be express and intelligible enough. It is given, not as a matter of hearsay, but as one of fact, and as it agrees substantially with a variety of statements previously obtained here and at Liverpool, it may be considered, in the opinion of the *Guardian*, as not without foundation. Kiakta is geographically the nearest and, moreover, the most convenient point from which news might be expected overland.

OCCUPATION OF PEKING BY BRITISH FORCES.—The last Dutch mail which arrived in London on Saturday, brought accounts from St.

Petersburg confirmatory of the previous reports of the occupation of Peking by the English forces. We understand that several letters have been received in Liverpool, mentioning this report as current and generally believed in the Russian capital when the last accounts came off. The following is an extract from a letter on the subject, received by one of the first houses in Liverpool yesterday, and with which we have been favoured:—

LONDON, Saturday.—The Letters from St. Petersburg, by to-day's Dutch boat, repeat that Count Nesselrode had received despatches from Kiakta, dated 15th September, mentioning that a report prevailed there that Peking had been taken by the English, and teas had advanced at Petersburg 15 or 20 per cent., which looks as if the report was believed to be true.
