> Not having received our Quebec Papers, beore going to Press, giving the particulars of the awful calamity which has befallen a portion of that City, by the falling of part of Cape Diamond, we must confine our remarks to the brief contents of a letter received by the Post Master of this place :--

"On the part of Cape Diamond, under the Governor's garden, to the extent of from 50 to 100 yards, fell with a tremendous crash, burying a line of houses in Champlain Street, which were completely smashed. Ten bodies had been got out during the first three or four hours; but it is not probable any person will be found alive.

The side of the precipice from being almost erpendicular, is now inclined at an angle of rom 45 to 60 degrees. Other portions of the rock were threatening to come down when the accounts left."
