

my eyes ever encountered. An English brig of war which cruises in the vicinity of Port Rico, while running from St. Thomas to this island, observed at a considerable distance a small dirty looking craft, which would not have been suspected as a slave but from the number of men seen upon her deck.—After a short chase the brig came up to her, and from her appearance the commander of the brig was satisfied she was no slave, but concluded that after having taken the trouble of giving her a chase they might as well search her. On opening the hatches they found the hold crammed with negroes from 8 to 12 years old, stark naked, with their heads shaved.

The crew of the slave was immediately taken on board the brig, and the slave, manned and brought into this port.

This morning, after breakfast, we engaged boat and went alongside the slave, and conversed some time with the lieutenant in command, on the subject of his vocation.

Several of the little sufferers were very ill, and one died last night. They were all placed round the sides of the vessel, and as we approached they grinned and waved their hands at us apparently quite happy and pleased with having their liberty on deck.

I do not regret that I took the trouble to see them, but I never desire to see another such horrible sight. The cargo belongs to a Spaniard in Port Rico, whose loss will be \$50,000. The brig has just fired a salute, which has been answered from the fort, and she is departing for Port Rico, whence the slave will be sent to Havana, where I suppose these unfortunate creatures will be apprenticed to Spanish masters.—N. J. Com. Adv.

THEFT BY A STEAM-ENGINE.—A wiseacre, who had seen a paragraph going the rounds, stating that some knowing fellow had put a fourpenny on a railroad, which the steam-engine had flattened out to the size of a sixpence, thought himself that he would try the experiment on a respectable scale. On Tuesday last, therefore, he spread out about the length of himself fourpenny pieces at one of the crossings of the Glasgow and Ayrshire Railway, at very far from home, and with his head aning over the wall, anxiously awaited the approach of the two o'clock train that was to ld a third to their value. But "the best-laid hemes o' men an' mice gang aft a-gley," p came the "snaky devil" with his long tail, and as the rails were wavy with the hoar frost, he fourpenny pieces stack fast all round the wheels, and off sped the train with the treasure, saving the "go a head" coiner in a state of bewildered disappointment.
