Several of the little sufferers were very ill, and one died last night. They were all placed round the sides of the vessel, and as we approached they grinned and waved their hands at us apparently quiet happy and pleased with having their liberty on deck.

I do not regret that I took the trouble to see them, but I never desire to see another such horrible sight. The cargo belongs to a Spaniard in Port Rico, whose loss will be \$60,000. The brig has just fired a salute, which has been answered from the fort, and she is departing for Port Rico, whence the slaver CENTRAL BANK STOCK. will be sent to Havana, where I suppose these unfortunate creatures will be apprenticed to Spanish masters .- N.
