A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS a Proclamation, bearing date the twenty sixth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty seven, was issued by the Lieutenant Governor, forbidding all persons from occupying any part of the Wild Lands within this Province, comprehending the Territory in dispute between Great Britain and the United States of America, known under the denomination of the *Disputed Territory*, or trespassing thereon by cutting Timber or otherwise: And whereas by another Proclamation, bearing date the twenty second day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine, this prohibition was repeated, and the Warden of the said Territory was duly appointed and authorized to arrest, seize, take and destroy all Timber which might be cut in violation thereof: And whereas it is deemed necessary that the aforesaid prohibition should continue to be strictly enforced; I do hereby call upon and direct all Peace Officers and other Liege Subjects of Her Majesty within this Province to be aiding and assisting in enforcing the same, and also in effecting the seizure of any Timber cut in violation of the aforesaid Proclamations by any persons whomsoever.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton the twenty ninth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty one, and in the fifth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

Official accounts have been received in London, of the taking of the Forts at Canton, together with other operations of British Forces in that quarter.

The President is still unheard of.

The following are some of the most important items copied from the latest papers received:—

THE CROPS.—Haymaking is now generally in full operation in this neighbourhood. The crops are most luxuriant, and the quantity of clover, or more properly speaking, cow grass, which is to be seen in all the old pastures, is greater than has been known for many years.—*Wiltshire Independent.*

The hay harvest has commenced in this neighbourhood, several fields having been cut and carried off in prime condition during the week. The crops in general are very abundant, promising more than an average yield. There is every prospect of a fine harvest, both as regards quantity and quality.—*Carmarthen paper.*

Captain Sir Henry Prescott, R. N., C. B., late Governor of Newfoundland, arrived at Cork on Tuesday week, per the Lady Stafford, after the extraordinary short passage of 13 days.

On Wednesday a Court of Directors was held at the East India House, when Major General Sir Hugh Gough, K. C. B., was appointed commander in chief of the company's forces on the Madras establishment.

At a meeting of the archbishops and bishops held at Lambeth on Tuesday, it was decided that the immediate erection of bishoprics was much to be desired in New Brunswick, amongst other dependencies of Great Britain.

WATERLOO.—The 18th of June was celebrated with great pomp.

We understand that the instructions given to Sir Henry Pottinger, on proceeding as Commissioner to Canton, to supercede Captain Elliot, were warlike against the Chinese to an extreme degree.

A contract has, we understand, been concluded with Mr. Green, the ship owner, for tonnage for the conveyance of 1000 troops which Government are about to send direct to China. Three vessels have been taken up for this service, at a charge to the public of £15,000.—*Morning Post.*

Reinforcements for India will commence leaving Chatham during the present month. The total number of troops to be embarked for the three Presidencies will average about 800. Detachments to about the same extent have also been placed under orders to proceed direct from this country to China, in addition to those which are now on their voyage thither from India.—*United Service Gazette.*

A third assistant surgeon has been appointed to each of the Queen's Infantry Regiments borne on the Indian establishment. This desirable increase restores these corps to the same strength, as regards Medical Officers, from which they were reduced in the year 1830.

Official information has reached London, to the effect that the Porte had issued, on the 22d May, an amended firman, in accordance with the recommendation of the four powers, respecting Egypt.—*Observer.*

Lord Ponsonby's departure from Constantinople on his return to this country, has, we hear, been deferred, in consequence of the serious state of things in various parts of the Ottoman empire.—*Id.*

CANADA AND CHINA.—The estimate of the further amount that will probably be required to defray the expenses of the service in Canada, consequent upon the late insurrection, amounts to £108,000; and the estimate of the sum required to be voted this year, on account of the expenses of the expedition to China, to £400,000.

Accounts have been received in town of the alarming illness of the Queen of Hanover.

The Crown Prince of Hanover (Prince George of Cumberland) has irrecoverably lost the sight of both eyes.

The Tea Market in London, on the 18th, was represented as dull for all kinds of free trade, and prices were barely supported. Company's congon flat at 2s. 0½d. cash. Sugars were declining.

In the Commons, on the 14th, Mr. Hume presented a petition, signed by the Speaker of the House of Assembly in Prince Edward Island, praying the House to adopt measures to prevent, if possible, the distress and distractions which at present existed in that colony.

WAR OFFICE, June 11.—36th Foot.—Assistant Surgeon John James Russell, M. D., from 73d, to be Surgeon, vice Lloyd, retired upon half pay.

TIMBER PRICES CURRENT.—Liverpool, June 19.—PINE.—The sales of Pine Timber are not animated, and prices are rather on the decline. A cargo of good Quebec has been sold at 18½d. per foot, and a cargo of St. John of fair average at 20d. per foot. There seems to be a prospect of more business being done.

RED PINE is low in price. The best Quebec may now be quoted at 2s. per foot, and common at 23d. per foot. St. John, Red Pine 19d. per foot.

DEALS.—Three cargoes have been sold from the quay in the present month; the first a large cargo of St. John Spruce at 2½d. per foot of 2 inches, the second a parcel of 6000 Spruce St. John at 2½d. per foot of 2 inches, the third a cargo of St. Andrews Spruce by auction at 2½d. per foot of 2 inches.

PITCH PINE, in consequence of the excess in the import, is much reduced in value,—the last two parcels sold at 2s. 0½d. and 2s. per foot.

We are just on the eve of a general election in Great Britain, and business is, therefore, though the prospects of trade have latterly been much brighter than heretofore, almost completely at a stand-still. The merchants connected with the United States and British North American colonies, are well pleased with the symptoms of improvement that have begun to manifest themselves in the branches of commerce in which they are interested, but which, however, are hardly decided enough yet to allow of confident congratulation. In the manufacturing districts, also, matters begin to wear a more

cheering aspect; but politics, doubtless with a view on both sides to the benefit of the nation, are now all absorbing, and nothing of consequence will be done in the monetary or commercial world, except as far as regards the completion of orders for export, until the strength of parties, by which the nation is governed, is ascertained, and the dominance of liberal or conservative is decided.—*European.*

In France a ministerial crisis has been approaching, but it is for the moment put off. A law for recruiting the army was proposed by Marshal Soult and thrown out by the Peers—the Duke of Orleans himself voting against it. The Marshal tendered his resignation, or affected to do so, and his son was appointed minister at Rome. The Marshal resumed his seat as President of the council.—Twelve ships of the line under the command of Admiral Hugon, were to leave Toulon on Tuesday. Their destination is not known; it is, however, conjectured that the collection of this enormous force has something to do with the affairs of the East, and the sudden return of the division under the command of Rear Admiral Case gives additional force to the conjecture. The loan contracted by Rothschild for the Austrian government is 75,000,000 florins. M. Humann had postponed the French loan, which was expected would be brought out in September.

LONDON, June 18.—The announcement of an Austrian loan of 75,000,000 florins, being upwards of six millions sterling, said to be taken by the Messrs. Rothschild at 103 for a 5 per cent stock, (although some doubt exists as to the specific rate of interest) produced a flatness in the funds. Consols which opened 81 1-8 sellers, declined to 89 sellers; the closing price, however, was 99 buyers. Bank Stock, 16½; 8½; Exchequer Bills, 4s. to 6s. premium.

ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE OF TROOPS.

The Head Quarters of the 69th Regiment arrived here, by the Steamer New Brunswick, last evening, to supply the place of the 36th, which is about to proceed to Saint John, the Head Quarters of which left this Garrison this morning in the same Steamer.

BIBLE SOCIETY.

A meeting of the Fredericton Bible Society was held on Friday evening in the Wesleyan Chapel, when His Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR took the Chair. The Rev. Mr. Thomson addressed the audience at considerable length, describing the origin of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and detailing many of the good effects that had resulted from its establishment; and recommended increased effort in a cause, which while it produces inappreciable benefits to mankind, blesses the giver as well as the receiver.

His Excellency then stated that wherever he had been he had felt it his duty to give his support to those Societies, which had for their object the diffusion of the Holy Scriptures, and which must have the effect of doing away in a great measure with those distinctions that exist among Christians, and producing among different denominations unanimity and concord. His Excellency stated that during his residence in the West Indies he had witnessed the good effects that were produced by the diffusion of the Scriptures among the black population, and attributed to that circumstance the satisfactory manner in which the great experiment of negro emancipation had been carried into effect.
