We publish for general information the following Report which has been received by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Colonial Land and Emigration Office,
9, Park Street, Westminster,
27th January, 1841.

SIR,—We have the honor to report, for the information of Lord John Russell, and with a view to its being communicated to the proper Authorities in the North American Provinces, that we have instructed our Naval Agents to transmit through the Post, by the earliest Mail Steamers leaving this Country after every Passenger Vessel has cleared for sea at their res-

pective Ports, a Duplicate List of her Passengers, addressed to the Immigration Agent of the Colony to which the Ship is bound.

We have adopted this measure under a belief that it would be equally advantageous to the Emigrants and to the Colonists. From a knowledge of the number of Passengers to be expected before the arrival of the Vessel in which they embarked, the Colonial Authorities would be enabled whenever they should deem it advisable, to make timely provision for their reception and disposal, and to take the necessary precautions against the evils which usually attend the sudden influx of large bodies of poor people not possessed of accurate information, into places where no adequate preparation has been made for their arrival. Capitalists also and others in want of labour would be enabled, by reference to the Immigration Agent, to know what supply they might shortly expect; and the Agent himself would be enabled to exercise a check on the Lists furnished by the Master, and more immediately to detect any improper addition to the number on board, after the Vessel had left the Port from which she cleared at the Custom House.

These are some of the reasons for which it has appeared to us that the early transmission to the Colonies of Duplicate Passenger Lists would not be without utility; and from the inquiries we have instituted on the subject, amongst the several Government Agents in this Country, we see no reason to suppose that the execution of the measure will be attended with any practical inconvenience.

We beg to enclose for transmission to the Colonies, a List of the Officers to whom we have given the Instructions alluded to in this Letter, and of the Ports at which they are resident.

To His Excellency Major General Sir JOHN HARVEY, K. C. B. and K. C. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We the undersigned, Inhabitants of the Harvey Settlement, beg leave to approach Your Excellency with assurances of the most ardent and devoted feelings, and to express our regret at the tidings of Your Excellency's approaching departure.

The circumstances under which we Address Your Excellency, are of no ordinary description. We had quitted the homes of happy England, in the sanguine expectation of finding in New Brunswick a recompense for the sacrifice, in the realization of hopes that were doomed to be disappointed; and with helpless families were thrown destitute upon the sympathy of strangers, when Your Excellency's opportune arrival in this Province restored us to competence and comfort.

Under Your Excellency's protecting auspices, we commenced opening up the Wilderness at this place, and by industry and perseverance have procured ample means for future subsistence and comfort—encouraged in our course by Your Excellency's kind and paternal regard,—the expression of which was not confined to the cold formalities of official station, but partook of the kindlier charities of domestic life.

In losing Your Excellency, therefore, we feel that we are losing a considerate and valued friend; and we beg to assure Your Excellency, that in whatever station, or in whatever clime, your future life shall be passed, our warmest prayers shall never cease to be offered up for the prosperity and happiness of yourself and family, and that we shall, to the most remote period of our lives, cherish a grateful recollection of those acts of spontaneous and considerate kindness, which have cheered and rendered happy our solitary abode.

REPLY:

To the Inhabitants of the Harvey Settlement.
MY WORTHY FRIENDS,

Your affectionate Address has been received by me with sentiments of the sincerest satisfaction. Your grateful hearts have greatly overrated whatever I may have had it in my power to do, to evince the desire, which I most sincerely felt, to aid and to promote the establishment in this Province, of an interesting band of strangers, whose Sobriety, Morality, and Loyalty, added to their earnest desire to raise themselves to an humble independence, by hard labour and honest industry, at once secured for them the sympathies of a liberal Legislature and of an enlightened community.

In return for your kind wishes for the welfare of myself and my family, receive my prayers for your happiness and prosperity in your wilderness homes—converted as they have already been, by your labour, into a flourishing and smiling Settlement, the period is at hand when its solitude shall be enlivened by the cheerful voice of the traveller, and when the facilities and advantage of easy intercourse with every part of the Province, will be yours.

Identified as I feel myself to be, not in name alone, but in sentiments of affectionate interest, in all that relates to their future welfare, I beg the Inhabitants of the Harvey Settlement to be assured that separation or distance will make no change in those sentiments, and that I shall always retain an anxious desire to hear of their continued welfare, and if by any means it should be possible, to aid in promoting it.

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMSHIP ACADIA.

HALIFAX, April 5, 1841.

We have much pleasure in announcing the arrival, this morning, of the steamship 'ACADIA,' Captain Miller, in 16 days from Liverpool, during the first twelve of which she experienced most severe gales, with constant head winds. She has arrived in perfect order, not having sustained the least damage either in hull or rigging, thus affording another convincing proof of the superiority of these boats over any other Steamers which cross the Atlantic. The Passengers speak in the highest terms of both the Acadia and her gallant Commander. She came up the harbour about six o'clock, in the midst of one of the most severe snow storms experienced here during the past winter.

LONDON, March 11 to 18.

THIRD APPEARANCE OF THE BOY JONES AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.—The boy Jones, who on two former occasions effected such a mysterious entrance into Buckingham Palace, on Monday achieved a similar unenviable exploit. The urchin was discovered on Tuesday morning, between one and two o'clock.

The lad's father says, although his son has often been the cause of uneasiness to him, he never knew him guilty of any dishonest action, but that his curiosity on many occasions, has been most remarkable; and the urchin himself still persists in declaring that his only object in going to the Palace was to hear the conversation of Her Majesty and Prince Albert, in order to "write a book," which he says, must be read with great interest. He has from his infancy been fond of reading, but no one would form such an opinion from his personal appearance, which is anything but prepossessing. His countenance is exceedingly sullen, and he is very diminutive of his age, which we understand is 17 years. His father asked him several times how he had obtained his admission. The only reply he was ever able to obtain was, "Oh, by the door or window."

THE WEATHER.—Such genial weather at this season has seldom been experienced. It has all the amenity of summer, without its oppressive heat.—*Scottish Standard.*

The Great Liverpool steamer has arrived at Falmouth from the Mediterranean. She left Alexandria on the 21st ult., and the news she brings from thence is of importance. The statement that Mehmet Ali would not agree to the recent conditions proposed by the Porte is confirmed, and in consequence of this new aspect of affairs, Commodore Napier had delayed his departure from Alexandria. The accounts received at Malta from India, state that Admiral Elliott had left Singapore on the 20th of December, and that Commodore Sir James Gordon Bremer had assumed the command of the China expedition in his room.

Manchester, Friday Evening.—Things were never more gloomy than they have been since Tuesday's night; and with the advance on cotton, and a declining value in goods and yarns, makes the business worse in the way of profit than at any former period. There has, however, been a little more disposition to buy cloth at Tuesday's rates, and some sales have been made on those terms. Yarns are also miserably dull, though not quite so difficult to quit as price goods.—*Liverpool Mail, March 13.*

The trade of Leeds is dull, caused mainly by the American news. The business in the two Cloth-halls on Saturday and Tuesday was limited to immediate wants, though bargains might have been had in some instances. In the warehouses, considerable business goes on in connexion with the home trade. Money is scarce, and very hard to get at.—*Leeds Intelligencer, March 13.*

We understand that Major General Sir Jeremiah Dickson, K. C. B., has been selected for the command of the troops in Nova Scotia and its dependencies, in succession to Major General Sir John Harvey.

Sir Jeremiah Dickson is an officer of long standing and distinguished merit. He was present throughout the Peninsular campaign, and wears a cross and one clasp for his services at Vittoria, the Pyrenees, Nivelle, Orthes, and Toulouse. His last active employment was in the East Indies, where he was placed upon the Staff as Quartermaster General, on the 12th July 1827; in which post he continued until promoted to his present rank on the 10th January 1837.—*United Service Gazette.*

THE ARMY.—The following reliefs of regiments on foreign service are positively determined on:—8th Foot from Nova Scotia; 36th Foot from New Brunswick; 37th Foot from Nova Scotia; 76th Foot from the Cape of Good Hope; and further, the 69th from New Brunswick, and 87th from the Mauritius, if possible.

Brigadier General Mitchell, commanding the English forces in Syria, died on the 24th of January, of the fever prevailing on the coast. The command was assumed by Colonel Bridgman, the next senior officer.

A Deputation of the North American Colonial Company had an interview with Lord J. Russell yesterday on the subject of emigration to the British North American Provinces.

MARRIAGE OF THE PRINCESS AUGUSTA.—A correspondent of the *Quotidienne*, at Naples, mentions a rumour of a marriage being on the tapis between the hereditary Prince of Mecklenburg Strelitz, now in his twenty first year, and the Princess Augusta of Cambridge.

MARRIAGE OF THE LATE KING OF THE NETHERLANDS, NOW COUNT NASSAU.—On the 17th ult., in the morning, the ex-King of Holland, Count of Nassau, and the Countess of Oultremont, were married in the strictest incognito, in the Palace of Prince Albert, according to the Protestant and Catholic rites.

By an extraordinary Express from Marseilles, we have received intelligence from China and India—from China the accounts are to Nov. 24, and Macao to Dec. 18, and Bombay to Feb. 1.

Sir S. F. Wittingham, the Commander in Chief of the Madras Army, had died of Apoplexy.

The great object of interest is the state of the British relations with the Chinese Government.—The negotiations appear to have produced nothing, for the Chinese seem desirous

of shuffling and delay. A truce was concluded on the 6th Nov., with the Chinese, binding them within certain limits—the British boundaries being Chusan and the small islands adjacent. Admiral Elliott resigned the command in consequence of ill health, and had sailed for England in the Volage. The command devolved on Sir J. J. G. Bremer.

PORTSMOUTH, March 18.—Rear Admiral Sir William Parker, K. C. B., one of the Lords of the Admiralty, is to have the command on the East India Station, vice Rear Admiral Elliot, who is invalided, and who will take his seat as one of the Lords, in the room of Sir William Parker.—The Cornwallis, 72, at Plymouth, is to be prepared without delay, with Capt. Peter Richards as Flag Captain.

We have just received the melancholy intelligence that the President of the United States, WILLIAM HENRY HARRISON, died on Saturday the 4th instant, at 30 minutes before 1 o'clock, in the morning.

By the decease of President Harrison, all the duties and responsibilities of President of the United States devolve upon the Vice-President, the Hon. John Tyler, of Virginia, for the remaining 3 years and 11 months of the term for which those Officers were elected.
