On Thursday last, the Committee of the New Brunswick Baptist Education Society, waited on the Lieutenant Governor with the following ADDRESS:

To His Excellency Sir WILLIAM MACBEAN GEORGE COLEBROOKE, K. H. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—We, the Committee of the N. B. Baptist Education Society, organized in the year 1833,

for the purpose of diffusing more extensively throughout the Province the blessings of Education, beg to approach Your Excellency on the occasion of your assuming the Government of this Province, and to welcome Your Excellency to the Command of a Colony, over which you have been directed by our most Gracious Sovereign to preside.

In an especial manner we believe, from the character we have learned of Your Excellency, that the Education of a young and advancing country, will claim and receive much of Your Excellency's attention; and we humbly trust that while bestowing that attention on learning in general, the Seminary at Fredericton, conducted under our direction, will receive a share of Your Excellency's patronage and encouragement.

We desire to present to Your Excellency's regard, an Institution which, with the exception of £500, received from the Legislature in 1840, has been established and carried forward entirely by voluntary subscriptions, at a cost of about four thousand pounds; exclusive of all sums received from the pupils for tuition fees; and has educated some hundred of the youth of the Country, both male and female, and spread through the Province many persons from both those departments, who have become teachers of the same blessings received by them at this Seminary.

Deeply convinced that Education, under the blessings of Divine Providence, when more widely disseminated, will be the means of increasing both the moral and intellectual wealth of this flourishing Colony, expanding and keeping pace with its opening resources and prosperity; we cheerfully submit the appreciation of its great interests to Your Excellency, believing that Your Excellency in reviewing the various Institutions for this purpose, to be found in the Province, will not fail to notice the one under our management.

With these sentiments, I readily tender to your Society, whatever support it may require, and I may have it in my power to afford to it, in the discharge of its responsible duties; and with a cordial desire for the success of your institution, and for the moral and intellectual advancement of those who are the objects of your care.

## CHATHAM ADDRESS.

The following is a copy of the Address from the inhabitants of Chatham, which has been presented to Sir William Colebrooke.

To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir WILLIAM MACBEAN GEORGE COLEBROOKE, K. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick.

May it please your Excellency, We, the undersigned, inhabitants of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, embrace this early opportunity of congratulating your Excellency on your safe arrival in this Province; and to assure your Excellency of our firm attachment to Her Majesty's person and government.

Governed by mild and equitable laws, and possessing unbounded freedom, the inhabitants of this Province have every reason to be thankful that it is their happy lot to be residents of a portion of the British Empire, and we assure your Excellency that we shall at all times lend our ready aid in upholding those laws, and cheerfully co-operate with your Excellency in all matters tending to the peace and prosperity of the Province, and the benefit and comfort of its inhabitants.

We most respectfully invite your Excellency to embrace your earliest convenience to visit this side of the Province, and by personal observation inform yourself of its capabilities, and the wants of its inhabitants.

We regret that indisposition has prevented Lady Colebrooke and the other members of your family from accompanying your Excellency, but we sincerely hope, that through the interposition of an All Wise Providence, but a short time will elapse before they will join you in renewed health, when we beg your Excellency will convey to her Ladyship and to them, our hearty congratulations on their recovery and arrival, and our best wishes for their continued health and prosperity during their residence in this Province.

The following is His Excellency's reply to the above.

To the Inhabitants of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland.

Gentlemen, I thank you for the Address which you have presented to me on my arrival, and for the expression of your attachment to Her Majesty's person and Government.

It is very gratifying to me to recognize in this distant quarter of Her Dominions, a just appreciation of the principles of the British

Constitution, and so firm a disposition to uphold them. As Her Majesty's Representative, I shall at all times be prepared to co-operate in promoting the prosperity of the Province, and the welfare of the Inhabitants.

The enterprising spirit of your community is not unknown to me, and I hope to have an early opportunity of visiting your flourishing settlement. I return you my sincere acknowledgments for your good wishes towards Lady Colebrooke and the other members of my family, who, on their arrival, will participate with me in the feelings which your cordial recognition has been calculated to call forth.

The Royal Mail Steamship *Acadia* arrived at Halifax on the 31st ult., performing her passage in 11 days and 23 hours, bringing Liverpool papers to the 19th May. The crowded state of our paper with official matter, permits us only to give a brief summary of the latest news.

COLONIAL BISHOPS.—The true friends of the Church of England will rejoice to hear, what we believe is certainly the fact, that Lord John Russell, as Colonial Minister, has requested the Archbishop of Canterbury to nominate fit persons for the new foreign bishoprics, and that his Grace has undertaken so to do.—*Standard*.

Sir Charles Napier has addressed the electors of Marylebone in characteristic terms:—"Gentlemen, if a dissolution of Parliament takes place, and you would like to be represented by an Old Sailor, I am at your service."

It is universally remarked that a finer season than the present for vegetation has scarcely been known. Scarcely any grain remains to be sown: it has been got in successfully. Within the last few days the growth of pasture has been magical.—*May 9*.

The act under which the sugar duties are collected will expire on the 6th of July, and, if not previously renewed, £4,000,000 of revenue will be lost.

A rumour has reached us, that the extensive Cotton Mills of R. J. Peel, Esquire, at Burton-on-Trent, are likely to be closed; no less than eight hundred hands will be thrown out of employment.—*Derby Reporter*.

Lord James Beresford, of the 10th Hussars, committed suicide on his passage from India.

THE PRESIDENT STEAMER.—Parties who had speculated on the arrival of the President Steam Vessel from New York, have, we understand, closed their risks in the present payment by the insurer to the insured of ninety per cent. in full of all claims.—Such compromises show that the hope of the Steamer's ultimate return to Liverpool is not abandoned.—*Morning Post*.

There having been nothing heard of the unfortunate Steamship President up to the sailing of the *Acadia*, all hopes of her safety had vanished.

It is stated that Lord Palmerston and Sir John Cam Hobhouse will be immediately raised to the British Peerage.—*Times*.

The Duchess of Kent will leave England in the course of this month for the Continent, upon a visit to Her Royal Highness's illustrious relatives in Germany. It is stated that Her Royal Highness will not return to this country until the end of the autumn.

Sir Henry Pottinger, Bart., recently appointed to succeed Captain Elliott, as our plenipotentiary in China, is highly esteemed for his intelligence and firmness. He was the East India Company's President at Cutch, and there, as well as elsewhere, had proved himself eminently fitted for important public trusts.

By an order in Council, dated the 8th May, an addition of 1500 is to be made to the Marine corps, with a corresponding number of Officers.

DREADFUL FIRE.—A fire has taken place in the city of Drontheim, Norway, which destroyed 314 houses, and left 4,000 persons without shelter. It originated in the carelessness of a servant.

We regret to state, that several extensive failures have taken place in Glasgow and neighbourhood within the last few days.—*Glas. Chron.*

The English Mail to meet the sailing of the *Acadia*, will be closed at the Post Office, on Saturday the 12th inst., at half-past eleven in the forenoon.
