DISGRACEFUL PROCEEDINGS.—A special messenger from Harbor Grace arrived yesterday morning, with information to His Excellency the Governor, that in consequence of the riotous and disgraceful proceedings of the mob at Carbonear, the Returning Officer was obliged to close the poll without making any return, being unable to execute the writ for the election of a member for that District. The following particulars from a Conception Bay Correspondent, may, we think, be relied on.

CARBONEAR, Dec. 8.

"The poll opened here as usual, to-day at ten o'clock, the tallies coming up in regular order until two o'clock, when Mr. Pendergast reported to the returning officer, that his voters were obstructed in coming to the poll—at the same time the Magistrates (Messrs. Pack, Brown, Power and Dauson) informing him that a serious riot was going on, and that they were unable to keep the public peace. On these representations the Returning Officer closed the poll, the numbers being for Pendergast, 1268—for Hanrahan, 1251. After the close of the poll, Pendergast's party, in returning to Harbor Grace, many of them were severely beaten and injured.

Mr. Ridley, when on his way to Carbonear, this morning, in endeavouring, in his character of Magistrate, to suppress a riot on the Bench, was knocked down by a man who struck him a tremendous blow with a picket on the back of the head, and lay for some time in a state of insensibility. On examining the injury, it was discovered that his skull was fractured, and his life is considered in danger. This was the more wanton and unprovoked, as Mr. R. had taken no part whatever in the contest.

Many other depredations of a minor character have also been committed.

In addition to this, we have been informed on good authority, that the house of Mr. Ash at Carbonear, being assailed, he fired from his window and wounded five or six of the depredators; on which his house was fired by the mob and burnt down to the ground.

We had hoped from the accounts first received of the peaceable and satisfactory aspect of affairs with which the Election commenced, and that the people of Carbonear, becoming at last awakened to a sense of their former improprieties, were now determined on adopting a proper line of conduct for the future. We cannot but regret that such anticipations have been so falsified, and that the unpleasant duty should devolve upon us of placing this, the most outrageous of all mal practices, on record.

If there were use in talking in the language of reason to men who show how little either reason or justice are permitted to influence their conduct, we should ask what it is that they promise themselves by such a course?—Are their interests to be in any way promoted, or is the end they seek to attain to be effected by such turbulence, violence and bloodshed?—They are mistaken if they indulge in any such impression. The place where such enormities are perpetrated will be shunned as unfit for the habitation of civilized men; and those who have property to lose and lives to care for, will abandon the place where both the one and the other can be thus jeopardised and violated.

Let them not be mistaken—they have laid themselves fearfully open to the operation of the Law, and the safety, the security, and the interests of society demand that the law shall be put in force against them. They may have been emboldened to the perpetration of these deeds of violence by the impunity which had there too often waited on the commission of similar offences; but now matters have been pushed to a crisis, and the most stringent application of that punishment which the law prescribes is imperatively called for and will be dealt out.

The civil authority in Conception Bay having been declared to be totally insufficient for bringing the offenders to justice, it was decided at a Council held yesterday, that a detachment of 100 men of the Royal Veteran Companies should proceed thither to aid in effecting this object. A vessel has been hired, and will proceed with the troops under the command of Major Law, as soon as practicable; and we have only to express our hope, that those who have wantonly outraged the laws, may be brought to atone to the Country for their nefarious misdeeds.

The election of course is a nullity, and we understand that for the present, at least, no new writ will be issued.—*Newfoundlander.*

COUNTY OF KENT.

A meeting of the Officers of the Second Battalion Kent Regiment of Militia, was held on Tuesday, the 8th December, at Mr. Dunsford's Inn, at Douglas, Lieutenant Colonel Long, in the chair, to take into consideration a communication received from the Adjutant General of Militia, relative to the re-constitution of Brock's Monument.

The chairman submitted several resolutions passed at a meeting of Militia and other inhabitants of Upper Canada, held on Queenston Heights, on the 30th July last; and also at a meeting held at Toronto, the 17th August, on the subject of recording the indignation of the Canadian people, at the destruction of the Monument which had been erected to the memory of Major General Sir Isaac Brock, on Queenston Heights, and for its re-constitution upon a more extensive and suitable scale.

It was then unanimously resolved—1st. That this meeting view with detestation and horror, the atrocious act committed by some miscreants, in the destruction of the Monument which had been erected to the memory of the late Major General Sir Isaac Brock, on Queenston Heights.

2d. That the Officers of the 2nd Battalion Kent Regiment of Militia, regard with satisfaction and admiration, the proceedings at a meeting held on Queenston Heights, of the loyal inhabitants of Upper Canada, on the 30th July last, to take into consideration the re-constitution of a monument to the memory of the late General Brock.

3d. That the Officers of this battalion do contribute a sum equal to one day's pay of their respective ranks, and that the Officers in command of companies, communicate to their respective companies the proceedings of this meeting, and that they be also requested to receive from the non-commissioned officers and men, a sum equal to one day's pay, or such sums as they may be disposed to contribute.

4th. That Lieutenant Colonel Long, Captain Hannington, and Captain Bowser, be a committee to receive the contributions of the battalion, and to pay over all sums when collected, to the Adjutant General of the Province, for the purpose of being transmitted to the Adjutant General of Militia of Upper Canada.

5th. That the funds collected be paid by the respective officers, by the 16th day of March next.

6th. That Lieutenant Colonel Long, be requested to forward a copy of the proceedings of this meeting to the Adjutant General of Militia of this Province.

Lieutenant Colonel Long having left the chair, Captain Poirrier was called thereto. The thanks of the meeting were then voted to Colonel Long, for his urbane conduct in the chair.

YORK AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

Pursuant to notice, a Public Meeting was held on the 5th instant, in the County Court House, for the purpose of forming a County Agricultural Society; and James Taylor, Esq. being unanimously called to the Chair, the following Resolutions were passed:—

1. Resolved, That this meeting being deeply impressed with the value and importance of our Agricultural interests, is of opinion that some extraordinary exertions should immediately be made for the support and advancement of those interests in this County.

2. Resolved, That the beneficial effects, which in other countries have resulted from the establishment of Agricultural Societies, are sufficient to induce this meeting to the conclusion, that the like effects would result from a like organization in this County; and that, therefore, a Society should be immediately formed, to be called "The York Agricultural Society."

3. Resolved, That every person on subscribing his name, as a member of the Society, be required to pay the sum of Five Shillings, and the like sum of Five Shillings on the first day of January, in each and every year, while he shall remain a member.

4. Resolved, That the following gentlemen be respectfully requested to obtain subscriptions in their respective neighborhoods, and transmit the same to James Taylor, Esq. on or before the 26th instant:

James Harrison and Thomas Gill, Esquires, St. Mary's; James Miles, Esq. Mr. W. Dayton, Douglas; Lieut. Col. Allen, Mr. Isaac Lawrence, Kingsclear; George Cheyne, Esq. Mr. W. C. Joslin, Prince William; Doctor Shelton, Harry Jones, Esq. Southampton; Mr. David Dow, Adam Allen, Esq. Dumfries; Mr. Ira Ingraham, Mr. David Munroe, Queensbury; Mr. Thomas Pickard, Mr. A. T. Coburn, Fredericton.

5. Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare Rules and Regulations for the government of the Society,—and also a scale of Prizes, which shall be submitted for consideration, at an adjourned meeting of the Society, to be held in the County Court House, on Tuesday the 26th inst. And that no person be allowed to vote at that meeting, who shall not have paid his subscription. And that the Committee consist of the following persons: L. A. Wilmot, Charles Fisher, J. T. Smith, Esquires.

6. Resolved, That James Taylor, Esq. be respectfully requested to act as Provisional President and Treasurer until the future election of Office Bearers.

7. Resolved, That James Taylor and Chas. Fisher, Esquires, do wait upon His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, and respectfully request His Excellency to become Patron of the York Agricultural Society.

The meeting was then adjourned until the 26th instant.

The annual Subscription has been fixed at a low rate, in order to render the Society accessible by the less wealthy classes of Farmers; and it is to be hoped, that every person in the County, who is at all friendly to Agriculture, will throw his influence as well as his name and money into this good cause. As subscribers will be entitled to seed and other articles imported for the Society at cost and charges, the purchaser of twenty shillings worth, will save the amount of his annual subscription, by being a member. But this, though a consideration with some of little moment when compared with the great advantages that will be held out to the members generally, by the numerous PREMIUMS which will be annually distributed, and also by the general improvement of our Stock and mode of Farming, to which the well directed exertions of such a Society must inevitably lead.

A suggestion was made at the meeting, relative to the establishment of a FAIR, to be held in Fredericton once or twice in the year. This is a most desirable thing, both for buyers and sellers, and would no doubt be continued, if once commenced and conducted under wholesome regulations.

As the £100 granted by the Legislature, can be obtained on raising £50 by private subscription, we are sure that the necessary sum will be paid in before the 26th instant.
