His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has arrived here from an extensive tour through the principal Counties of the Province. We have also much pleasure to announce the safe arrival of Lady Colebrooke and the other members of Sir William's family, who came to Halifax in the Steamer *Columbia*, and were accompanied to Saint John by A. Reade, Esquire, His Excellency's Private Secretary. His Excellency Sir Charles Fitzroy, Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, accompanied by his Private Secretary, Mr. George Fitzroy, and the Hon. Mr. Haviland, who is on a temporary visit to this Province, joined Sir William in Saint John, and the distinguished individuals proceeded on Thursday morning for this place, and arrived on the afternoon of the same day, in the Steamer *New Brunswick*. They were received by a Guard of Honour of the 69th Regiment, and a salute from the Royal Artillery, and the whole party immediately proceeded to Government House. His Excellency Sir C. Fitzroy embarked on board the Steamer *New Brunswick*, on Monday last, on his return to P. E. Island.

We are authorized to state, that it has been found expedient to discontinue "the Monthly Review, devoted to the Civil Government of Canada," and that Mr. J. **SHEDIAK, July 21, 1841.**—Yesterday the inhabitants of this village were highly pleased to have in their power to witness once more the arrival of a steamer in their harbour. On the boat coming to anchor off the wharf, it was soon pretty generally understood that His Excellency Sir CHARLES FITZROY, from Prince Edward Island, was on board. A carriage was immediately ordered, and His Excellency was conveyed to the Shediak Hotel, where, after taking some refreshments, he proceeded on his route to Fredericton, via Saint John. His Excellency is expected to return to Shediak on Monday next, to meet the steamer on Tuesday morning. It is to be lamented that the sight of a steamer upon the waters of the Shediak Harbour should be such an unfrequent occurrence. The propriety of connecting these waters with the Bay of Fundy, has been the fire-side conversation of the inhabitants of this place ever since it was settled, and the conclusion that they now come to is, that if the *Transmar Great Marsh* could be placed between this Harbour and the Bay of Fundy, some steps would immediately be taken for connecting the waters.—*Com.*

**VISIT OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.**—On Monday afternoon, the 19th inst. we were gratified by a short and unexpected visit of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor. The instant it was ascertained that he had arrived, several of the Magistrates and persons in authority waited on him and attended him about the town, to show him the public buildings and point out to him the best views, &c. He took a hasty view of our block-houses and dilapidated fort. We are informed His Excellency expressed himself much pleased with the neat appearance of the streets, the numerous handsome houses, and the general air of comfort that pervades our little town.

We observed him conversing very affably with a number of emigrants that have lately arrived from Ireland, and heard him advise them to weigh well the consequence of seeking a home in a foreign country, in preference to staying in the Provinces, which were governed by laws they were accustomed to. He seems very solicitous that more facilities should be afforded the emigrants to settle upon our vacant lands. In his views we most earnestly concur. About half-past 9, all the Magistrates and as many of the gentry as could be assembled on so short a notice, waited upon him at Mr. Copeland's Hotel, and presented him, through the Hon. Col. Wier, with a respectful Address, which, with his answer, will be found in our columns of to-day. At 10 o'clock, he and a number of gentlemen repaired to the Hon. Col. Hatch's, where they passed the evening. In the morning he inspected the Court House and Gaol, and then learning the peculiarly hard case of a crown prisoner confined for debt, most kindly, and in a very feeling manner, desired the Sheriff to discharge him. His Excellency embarked shortly after in the steamer *New Scotia*, for St. John, amidst a discharge of artillery and the cheers of a great concourse of spectators. The impression remaining on our minds, from what we have heard and seen of His Excellency, is, that few Governors will have been more popular than Sir William Colebrooke bids fair to be.

We have copied from the Weekly Register of last Tuesday, the Lieutenant Governor's Message of the 15th inst. to the other Branches of the Legislature, announcing, *formally*, the appointment of our invaluable Governor Ge-

neral to be Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick—whether that great man has carried the best wishes of nine-tenths of the inhabitants of the Leeward Islands—now deprived of the benefit of his fostering solicitude for their general welfare. It is highly gratifying to find the services of this upright Governor so graciously appreciated in the proper quarter; as it must afford Sir William much satisfaction to find his disinterested and unprejudiced efforts to promote the general happiness of those confided to his care, so eminently acknowledged and approved by his Sovereign.

The high consideration for Sir William so manifest throughout the whole of Lord John Russell's Letter, by which Sir William's new Commission was accompanied, shows the elevated estimation in which his Lordship holds our late Governor General:—and renders that document the most flattering testimonial that has for a long time emanated from Downing Street. For our own part, we unfeignedly regret the removal of our excellent Governor General—and this regret is mitigated only by the consideration that the measure which has deprived the Leeward Islands of Sir William's able and zealous services, is only the precursor of other measures which will, we ardently hope, have the happy effect of placing Sir William in that extensive and dignified field of action for which his "well established character for ability and zeal for the public service" so eminently qualify him.

With a distressing consciousness of our inability to do justice to the merits of the Governor whose removal we now deplore as a public calamity, by which we fear the march of Colonial reform will have been lamentably retarded, we console ourselves with the hope that his successor, be he who he may, will emulate that love of justice in which all the measures of Sir William Colebrooke's administration are founded.

The following is a copy of the Message referred to, with the despatches from the Colonial Office.

The Lieutenant Governor administering the General Government,

To His Honor the President and Board of Council, and His Honor the Speaker and House of Assembly;

GENTLEMEN.—I have the honor to lay before you, for the information of your Honorable Board and House, the copy of a despatch, with its enclosure, which I have received from the Right Honorable the Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, and from which you will learn that Her Majesty has been most graciously pleased, for special reasons, to confide the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick in North America, to the hands of His Excellency Sir William Colebrooke, late Governor in Chief of these Islands.

Sir,—I transmit to you the copy of a letter which I have addressed to Lieutenant Colonel Sir William Macbean George Colebrooke, on that Officer's appointment to be Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick in North America.

You will give publicity to it in the Leeward Islands in whatever manner you may judge most convenient.

To the Officer Administering the Government.

Downing Street, February 27, 1841.

Sir,—In obedience to Her Majesty's commands, I herewith transmit to you a Commission under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, by which you are appointed to be Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick in North America.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to call you to the discharge of this arduous and important duty, from the reliance which Her Majesty reposes in your well established character for ability and zeal for the public service.

Valuable as have been your labours as Governor of the Leeward Islands, circumstances, of which you are apprized, and which it is therefore needless for me to state more particularly in this place, will impart a still higher value to them in the new field of action to which you have been summoned.

It has been a source of regret to the Queen, that the arrangements indispensable in the present state of British North America, renders it necessary that you should henceforward assume a titular designation inferior in rank to that which you have recently borne. Her Majesty is, however, persuaded that the public spirit of which you have given so many proofs, will reconcile you to this inevitable loss of Official Rank, and that no one will so far misapprehend the real motives of the change as to ascribe it to any abatement of the confidence with which you have so long been honoured by your Sovereign.

To prevent, however, the possibility of such a misconception, I am to authorize you to make any use which you may think proper of this communication. I shall myself transmit a copy of it to the Officer Administering the Government of the Leeward Islands, with instructions to him to give publicity to it there in whatever manner he may judge most convenient.

Sir WILLIAM COLEBROOKE.

The Chamber of Peers has voted the extraordinary budget of 1842, but not without protests against the insufficiency of the reduction.

The Marquis Barthélemy observed that Ministers certainly reckoned on peace for their country, or having always the reserve of the Sinking Fund to dispose of, since they still proposed to spend five hundred millions on public works. He would vote the budget, but he expected that Ministers would spend less, above all, that Marshal Soult would disband the new regiments formed. With regard to the marine, it was impossible to pay 44,131 sailors, as at present, without throwing disorder into the finances.

Marshal Soult admitted that he had promised further reductions in the military expenses of 1842 if possible, but he could not be more explicit at present.

The following ships of war will be launched this summer in addition to the *Trafalgar*, first-rate:—*Hindustan*, 80, at Plymouth, the 2d of August; *Collingwood*, 80, at Pembroke, the 17th of August; *Cambrian*, 36, at Pembroke, the 3d of July; and *Growler*, steam-vessel, at Chatham, first week in August.

**THE QUEEN OF HANOVER.**—We regret to find that the health of the Queen of Hanover is not at all improved. Indeed, some of the journals speak upon the subject in a very depressing tone.—*Courier*. The Hamburg Borsen Halle contains the following.—It is said that the Hanoverian physicians fear that Her Majesty is labouring under the same complaint which, in the opinion of the English physicians, caused the death of Napoleon.

**SIR JOHN CAMPBELL A PEER.**—The Queen has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal, granting the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland unto Sir John Campbell, Knight, Her Majesty's Attorney General, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Campbell, of Saint Andrew's, in the County of Fife.—*Gazette of Tuesday*.

**LEEDS ANTI-SLAVERY COMMITTEE.**—A numerous meeting of the Leeds Anti-Slavery Committee was held on Thursday, at the Court House, which had been summoned at the request of the British and Foreign Anti-Slavery Society in London, in consequence of a proposition emanating from America to hold in the British metropolis a second general Anti-Slavery Convention of all nations in the course of the ensuing year. The results of the last convention have been most favourable to the great cause; but it was resolved by the gentlemen present, after much interesting discussion, that the time proposed would be to soon for the repetition of so vast an effort, more especially as the valuable time and exertion of the devoted friends of the cause now employed in carrying the resolutions of the late convention into effect, would be, to a great extent, unseasonably diverted to the making preparations for the succeeding one.—*Leeds Mercury*.

**HERRING FISHERY.**—The herring fishing is daily increasing, and the fish are rapidly improving in quality. The fishing commenced first in Gairloch and Lochlong, and the fruits of each morning's labour are transmitted per railroad, from Greenock to our market in time for being placed on the breakfast table. Thus, by means of the railroad, our citizens are enabled to enjoy the luxury of fresh herrings only four or at most five hours out of the net; whereas, in bye-past times, the produce of the nearest fisheries reached our market scarcely in time for the tea-table, while the far-famed Lochline herrings were brought to market late at night, sold to the hawkers, and retailed next day, so that, properly speaking, the inhabitants of Glasgow knew nothing about a real fresh herring. The fishing has been pretty good in Campbelltown. Friday 50 or 60 barrels of cured herrings arrived per the Campbelltown steamer, St. Kieran, which found a ready market, and brought a good price, being sold at from £4 to £4 10s. The appearances are good in every quarter whence intelligence has been received, and the price of the "poor man's friend" will soon be such as to place it in the power of the poorest to buy.—*Glas. Com.*

**SUFFERINGS OF SEAMEN.**—Two men and a cabin boy, the only survivors of the crew of the Ship *St. George*, of London, arrived here on Thursday last. One of these men, John Foley, informs us that the *St. George* sailed from London, with a cargo of Dry Goods, for New Orleans, on the 28th April last. On the 4th June, the ship encountered a violent N. W. hurricane, which continued to rage till she was driven ashore on the 7th, at 11 o'clock, p. m., on the Cat Keys, Florida shore; Capt. Allen, the Mate and fifteen of the crew were swept overboard and drowned. The three survivors were rescued from a watery grave by Captain Appleton, of the schooner *Comet*, of New Providence, Bahamas, who carried them to Key West. When taken off the wreck they were completely exhausted, having been clinging to it 45 hours, under the rigor of the furious tempest, and lashing of the mountainous surf, and suffering unspeakably from hunger and thirst. At Key West they received from the inhabitants the kindest attention and sympathy that humanity can bestow, during eleven days. Having then recovered their strength, they took a passage to Eastport, in the schooner *Jane*, Crawford, where they arrived on the 9th, and embarked, on the following day, in the schooner *Active*, Cowell, master, for Windsor. They reached Windsor on Monday last, and thence travelled on foot to this city. The *St. George* was owned by Henry Fletcher, Esq., Lower Shadwell, Ratcliff Highway, London.—*Halifax Recorder*.

**THE ARMY.**—We are informed, that, on the 23d instant, the imposing ceremony of presenting a set of new colours to the 74th Regiment, will take place on the *Champ de Mars*, at eleven o'clock. This gallant corps distinguished itself greatly in the glorious action of SALAMANCA—the anniversary of which day has very appropriately been selected for renewing the trophies of their career. Mrs. General CLITHEROW, we believe, will present the new colours.—*Montreal Gazette*.

Vice-Admiral Sir Charles Adam, has been appointed successor to the late Admiral Harvey, as Naval Commander in Chief on the North American and West India Stations. Sir Charles, it is stated, would leave England for Halifax in Her Majesty's ship *Pique*, early in August.
