

PARLIAMENT.—The Gazette of Friday night contains the announcement that Parliament is prorogued from the 11th of November to the 21st of December next.

THE EXCHEQUER BILL AFFAIR.—The frauds committed in respect to Exchequer Bills, have been committed through the agency of a person in the Exchequer Bill Office. Whether the duplicate bills in circulation are forgeries, or whether the bills, having been regularly signed, have been fraudulently obtained, is yet uncertain. The bills, whether forged or fraudulently obtained, were applied to speculations in foreign funds, chiefly Spanish stock. The inquiry at the Home Office yesterday, respecting the fraudulent issue of Exchequer Bills, lasted until half-past seven o'clock in the evening. The particulars of the inquiry are kept a profound secret; nothing whatever is allowed to transpire. The result, however, was, that at the close of the proceedings, the party accused was taken away in the custody of two inspectors of police, and we understand will be brought up again for further examination this evening or tomorrow. In the meantime the most searching investigation is going forward at the Treasury and Exchequer Bill Office. Sir R. Peel, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Sir James Graham attended the examination of the prisoner, which was taken before Mr. Hall, chief magistrate of Bow-street. Lord Montagu was also present at the inquiry into this mysterious affair. As the name of the accused individual is now very generally mentioned, perhaps we ought, in justice to other parties holding official situations, no longer to withhold it. The party in custody is "Mr. E. B. Smith, senior clerk in the office of making out and issuing Exchequer Bills." We understand Mr. S. has been many years in the office, and is most respectably connected.—*Standard*.

THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.—It is reported, and the quarter whence the information reaches us is a pretty good guarantee for the accuracy, that three of the leaders of the non-intrusion party, (Rev. Messrs. Candlish and Cunningham, and Mr. Dunlop) recently met in Edinburgh three of the leaders of the Moderates, (the late Dean of Faculty Hope, now Lord Justice Clerk, Dr. Gook, and Dr. Muir) and, in presence of Sir George Sinclair, who acted as Moderator or Umpire on the occasion, took upon themselves to arrange the disputes of the Scottish Church on the following basis, viz:—That patronage should remain in full force, but that the patron should present to the parish a list of six candidates, the people's choice of one of whom to be absolute. Our informant states, moreover, that the whole question may now be considered as at rest, as there is good reason to believe that Sir Robert Peel, if allowed, is prepared to carry this religious treaty into effect.—*Ayr Advertiser*.

His Excellency Sir Charles Bagot, will it is said, re-embark for Canada, on board the *Illustrations*. Her Majesty's Government originally wished that His Excellency should have been conveyed to Halifax in one of Mr. Cunard's steamships, to be there sworn into office, and to have then proceeded in the same conveyance to Quebec. An apprehension, however, that the weather might lay up the vessel in that port for the winter, precluded the carrying out this intention.

The *Styx*, steam-frigate, Captain Vidal, arrived at Spithead, Portsmouth, early on Monday morning. This ship sailed a few days since for Canada, having on board Sir Charles Bagot. The cause of her return is her having carried away her connecting rod, and otherwise damaged her machinery, when coming out of Cork harbour, which anchorage she put into, owing to the recent severe westerly gales. Sir Charles Bagot left Portsmouth for London immediately.

THE LORD MAYOR OF DUBLIN AND THE BARONETCY.—We have seen a letter from London, which states that the greatest anxiety prevails amongst the friends of the outgoing Lord Mayor, Alderman Johnson, and the Lord Mayor elect, Alderman Pirie, as to the royal accouchement—for in the event of the Queen blessing the nation with a Prince before the 9th of November, the present Lord Mayor would be entitled to the baronetcy; but, should this auspicious event take place subsequent to the 9th of November, Alderman Pirie, as the Lord Mayor of London, would obtain the elevation. The writer in conclusion observes—That Mr. O'Connell, as Lord Mayor of Dublin, and the first Catholic one for ages, would, in despite of the enemy, be entitled to receive a similar honour.

GREENOCK, Oct. 27.—We understand that the fleet of naval steamers, built and fitted out here, and now in our harbour, have been surveyed by an agent from the Admiralty. Each of the steamers has been found competent to take from 800 to 900 troops on board. The steamers not ready for sea are ordered to be fitted out with all expedition.—*Glasgow Chron.*

THE NEW GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA.—The East India Directors will give a grand entertainment to the newly appointed Governor General of India (Lord Ellenborough,) at the London Tavern, Bishopsgate Street, this evening, to which Her Majesty's Ministers are invited. His Excellency, as at present arranged, intends to leave England for the seat of his government on Saturday next, the 6th inst., but it is not improbable that his Lordship's departure may be delayed for a few days to await the arrival of the next intelligence from the East, which is shortly expected.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 1.—GREAT CONSERVATIVE TRIUMPH AT LIVERPOOL.—The Conservatives have achieved one of the greatest victories ever gained by their party in this town. The municipal election took place to day, and out of sixteen wards they carried thirteen by large majorities, the Reformers gaining only three, which will give the former a large majority in the Town Council, and consequently the civic chair will be filled for the first time for six years by a Conservative.

We have good reason to believe that the French Government has resolved immediately to withdraw six sail of the line from the Mediterranean, and to lay them up at Brest. We cannot doubt that Her Majesty's Government

will adopt corresponding measures, and will reduce to at least an equal extent, the amount of naval force in the Mediterranean.—*Times*.

Mr. William Peel, third son of the Right Honourable Sir Robert Peel, who served as Midshipman in the *Princess Charlotte*, under Admiral Sir Robert Stopford, during the settlement of the affairs on the Syrian coast, is about to go to China in the *Cambrian*, Captain Chads, C. B.—*Standard*, Oct. 23.

MORE TROOPS FOR CHINA. The 98th Regiment is to proceed to China direct, in lieu of relieving the 87th Regiment at the Mauritius, as formerly arranged, and it is probable the 50th Regiment will proceed to Calcutta.

Captain Elliott, R. N., Superintendent, &c., in China, is a son of the late Hon. Mr. Elliott, uncle to the present Lord Minto; his father was the Governor of Madras at the time the late Earl of Minto was Governor General of India.

SPAIN.—The late advices announce the end of the insurrection. The troops which had been tricked into declaring for O'Donnell, refused to fight when placed in the presence of their comrades who had remained true to the constitutional government. General Rodil entered Vittoria on the 21st; and Mantes de Oca, the member of Christina's provisional government there, was shot. On the 20th, Bilbao sent to declare its surrender to Rodil; and on the same day O'Donnell evacuated the citadel of Pampeluna. Thus evaporated the hopes of the Fuertists. The power of Espartero and of the Spanish Liberals is greatly fortified. The troublesome question of the Fueros, so difficult for the Government and Cortes to settle satisfactorily, can now offer no difficulty. Spain will be commercially united, and its customs frontier be definitively on the Pyrenees, not on the Ebro.

A telegraphic despatch from Bayonne, dated the 22d inst., states that General O'Donnell was then on the French frontier, demanding permission to cross it, at the head of 2,000 rebels. Generals Ortigosa and Jauregui (El Pastor) were with him. Count Monteron, and a few Members of the Provincial Deputation, entered France on the 22d.

Letters and journals from Madrid, to the 18th, have reached town. The city was perfectly quiet, and no other execution than that of General Leon had taken place. The Regent was on the eve of his departure from the northern provinces.

The next English Mail to meet the sailing of the Steamer from Halifax, will be closed at the Post Office on Saturday, the 27th inst., at half-past 11 in the forenoon.

KING'S GENERAL SESSIONS,
OCTOBER TERM, 1841.
Regulations respecting Tavern-keepers within King's County.

Ordered, That the following Rules and Regulations be established for the government of Tavern-keepers in King's County, in addition to those made at the last March Term.

1st. Every Tavern-keeper shall cause to be put up and kept over his door, or on some conspicuous place outside of his house, a Board with his Christian and Surname at full length, and the words, "LICENSED TAVERN" legibly painted thereon, under the penalty of *Forty Shillings*.

2d. Every Tavern-keeper shall at all times keep, and when required furnish Travellers with necessary refreshment, bedding and accommodation, and in addition to the liquors usually provided, shall also furnish, if required, Tea and Coffee, with Sugar and Milk, and also good Malt, Spruce or Ginger Beer, or Cider, under the penalty of *Ten Shillings*.

3d. Every Tavern-keeper shall have sufficient Stable room for the accommodation of at least Four Horses, with a proper place of security for the Property, Sleighs, Sleds, Carriages and other vehicles of Travellers, and shall at all times keep a sufficient supply of Hay and Oats, with a competent person to take care of, feed and groom Horses, under the penalty of *Twenty Shillings* for every default.

4th. No Constable or Tavern-keeper shall be taken as a security for a person to whom Licence shall be granted.

5th. Every Tavern-keeper shall cause a Copy of these Regulations to be posted up conspicuously in his Public Room, and there continued, under the penalty of *Forty Shillings*.
