

quer Office has been the subject of much conversation during the last week. The treasure found, is said to be of considerable value, and, according to all appearances, it has been hid for one hundred and fifty years—plainly for more than a century. The most probable surmise is, that the jewels were pledged in the reign of either Charles the Second or James the Second.

It is evident that it is not the intention of the present administration to cripple the resources of the British Admiral in the Chinese waters. No less than five ships of war—the Cambrian, 36; the North Star, 26; Spartan, 26; Clio, 18; and Harlequin, 16; besides the Apollo, armed *en flute*, with the 98th regiment on board, are stated to be under orders to join Admiral Sir William Parker. Besides these vessels, the Malabar, 74; and the Madagascar, 44; are ordered to complete their complement of men, though their destination is unknown. The Carysfort, 28; is also under orders for foreign service; the Eagle, 50; and the Castor, 36; are to be immediately commissioned; and it is expected that the Satellite, 18; and Ringdove, 16; will shortly be so. We have it from good authority, that never since the war, has there been so much activity in the various departments of the Admiralty as at the present moment.

The gun-making trade is all on the *qui vive*, both at London and Birmingham, since the immense destruction of arms in the Tower, and the Government authorities have already taken steps to repair the immense loss which they sustained in the munitions of war by that unfortunate event. It is expected among the trade that nothing but percussion guns will now be manufactured, and that for them, Government will issue an entirely new pattern.

It is asserted in well informed quarters, that a sense of duty to the nation will impel the Earl of Aberdeen to advise the Queen—if indeed his Lordship has not already done so—to revoke the appointment of Captain Elliott to the consul-generalship of Texas. In taking such a step, however disagreeable to the noble Earl's feelings, public opinion would fully support the Foreign Secretary.

ROBERT BURNS.—The memory of the Scottish bard has recently been revived by two events of interest: the first, the erection of a sepulchral monument to his Highland Mary, (Campbell); and the second, the death of his celebrated Clorinda, Mrs. Maclehoze, at the age of eighty.

The Erigone French frigate arrived at Singapore on the 4th September, from Rio Janeiro, which she left on the 14th June. Col. Dubois de Jaucigny was on board, and would proceed immediately to China, to watch the progress of events on the part of the French Government.—*Morning Chronicle*, Nov. 17.

There is a decrease of no less than 41,924 quarters in the consumption of malt, between the 10th of Oct., 1840, and the 10th of Oct., 1841, and in London alone.

Lord Waldegrave, on his release from the Queen's Bench Prison, last week, left with the Marshal, twenty five pounds for the use of the poor prisoners; which was distributed among them on the joyful occasion of the birth of an heir to the throne.—*Morning Post*.

Prince Albert has acceded to the request of the Gresham Committee, that he should lay the first stone of the new Royal Exchange. The ceremony is to take place early in January; and seats have been ordered, to accommodate twelve hundred spectators.

We understand that Captain Ogilvy, of the 2d Life Guards, the officer of the day on Tuesday at the Horse Guards, has received an intimation that he will obtain the promotion usually bestowed on officers who chance to be in that position on the birth of an heir apparent to the throne.

Mrs. Maclehoze, the Clorinda of Burns the poet, and widow of Mr. A. Maclehoze, writer, of Glasgow, died a few days since at Edinburgh, at the advanced age of eighty two. To the last she retained traces of her early beauty.

On the 4th of November, Guildhall was set fire to, but the flames were speedily subdued.

On the 6th, £200,000 worth of property was destroyed at Manchester by fire, and 600 people thrown out of employment.

From 7,000 to 8,000 men of the naval force of France are to be discharged. This is an earnest of the pacific intentions of France.

PROPOSED MARRIAGE OF THE SON OF DON CARLOS WITH QUEEN ISABELLA.—We are enabled to state that a person charged with full powers from Don Carlos to negotiate a marriage between his son and the young Queen of Spain has arrived at Paris. This fact is the more important, as Don Carlos has hitherto obstinately refused to give his consent to the proposed union.—*Chronicle*.

FREDERICKSON READING AND NEWS ROOM, 7th December, 1841.

A Semi-annual Meeting of the Subscribers, and other gentlemen invited by requisition to attend, was held this day at 4 o'clock, p. m.

His Honor the Master of the Rolls being called to the Chair, and Mr. Michael White having been appointed Secretary to the Meeting.

Mr. Gowan the Honorary Manager, submitted his accounts from the 29th of March last, and then made his Report. After which the following Resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, As the opinion of this Meeting, that the Reading and News Room should be continued, and that the expenditure be proportioned to the income.

That the Annual Subscriptions be reduced to Twenty Shillings.

That the subscriptions for each succeeding year, be collected previous to the general Annual Meeting in December.

That from and after the first day of January next, the officers of the Garrison of Fredericton, be admitted to the use of the Room, either upon the same terms as non-residents, or upon payment of five shillings per quarter.

Upon reading the 6th Rule, which provides for conducting the Institution by an Honorary Manager, with a Committee of reference; Mr. Gowan informed the Meeting that the nature of his official duties, would at present disable

him from continuing in the situation of Honorary Manager, but that he was prepared to render to his successor any assistance which might be in his power; and thereupon Mr. Inches was by acclamation elected Honorary Manager for the ensuing year, with Mr. Gowan, Mr. Botsford and Mr. Wilkinson, as his Committee of reference.

Resolved, That Clerks and Law Students be allowed the use of the Room, on payment of an annual subscription of ten shillings, and being first approved of by the Committee.

On Motion, *Resolved*, That the thanks of the Meeting are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. Gowan, for his very valuable services as Honorary Manager during the past year. Carried by acclamation.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Meeting be given to the Committee for their services during the past year; and that Messrs. J. A. Beckwith, Miller, Flood, McLean, Watts, Jr., Perley and Beck, be appointed a Committee to collect subscriptions.

His Honor the Master of the Rolls having left the Chair, and Charles Fisher, Esq., being called thereto. On motion of Mr. Gowan, *Resolved*, That the thanks of this Meeting be given to His Honor the Master of the Rolls for his able, impartial and patient conduct in the Chair.

The thanks of the Meeting being then voted to the Secretary, the Meeting dissolved.

THE PRINCE OF WALES.—The moment the welcome intelligence of the birth of a Prince of Wales reached this Garrison, its gallant Commandant, Lieutenant Colonel Maxwell, who at present commands all the Forces in this Province, ordered the bugles to be sounded, and the troops to be instantly under arms; and in less than half an hour, the line was drawn up, in review order, facing the sea, with three six-pounders on its right. Exactly at 12 o'clock, the salute commenced by seven guns from the Royal Artillery, which was followed by a *feu-de-joie* in the usual manner, then seven guns more and another round of the small arms; and after the third firing, the troops by signal from their spirited commander, who appeared to be all animation, gave three as loud cheers as ever resounded on our shores; the whole being at the same time conducted with that true military precision for which the 36th Regiment is remarkable, and which reflects so much credit both on Officers and Men. The running fire, up and down the line, difficult at all times to be properly performed, was on this occasion inimitable—shot following shot, with the rapidity of thought, and not one out of time or place.

The evening was spent with great festivity at the Mess of the 36th Regiment, at which all the Officers of the Garrison were invited. The Queen, Prince of Wales, Prince Albert, the Lieutenant Governor, &c., were the principal guests of the evening, and many excellent sentiments and speeches, that would have done honor to members of the bar or senate, were elicited on the occasion. We cannot, however, omit to particularise one, which, we have been assured, was received with rapturous applause, by all present:—

"The Author of 'The Run'—and may his work have the beneficial effect it was intended to produce."

The warm-hearted Colonel responded to this toast in his usual happy manner. We are sorry it is not in our power to give some of his words; but all who have ever had the pleasure of hearing him speak, will "guess" that they were worth listening to.

The day happening to be the anniversary of the landing of the 36th Regiment in North America, after an absence of 128 years, caused additional excitement and interest.—*Morning News*.

Saint John, 8th December, 1841.

DISTRICT GENERAL ORDER.—The Officer commanding the Troops felicitates the Army on the birth of a Prince of Wales, and directs that this joyous event be announced to the inhabitants of this loyal Province, by the firing of a Royal Salute at noon, upon the receipt of this order in the different Garrisons, and that the Troops be under array to fire a *feu-de-joie* on the occasion.

PUBLIC MEETING.

A Public Meeting of the Inhabitants of this City, was held in the City Court Room on Wednesday the 8th instant, in pursuance of a requisition made to His Worship the Mayor by the Managers of the "Saint John Mutual Protection Association," for the purpose of considering measures for the establishment of a permanent City Police.

The Mayor having declined to preside at the Meeting, Wm. H. Street, Esquire, was unanimously called to the Chair, and George Wheeler, Esquire, was appointed Secretary.

The Requisition to the Mayor having been read, the following Resolutions were passed:—

Resolved, That the present insufficient Nightly Watch in this City, is wholly incompatible with the public safety and good Government.

Resolved, That the frequent occurrence of street disturbances, and other nuisances and offences in the day time, as well as the liability of a Seaport like Saint John, to the continual influx of strangers and transient persons, render an instant and summary authority for the preservation of the public peace absolutely necessary; and therefore

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare a Petition to the Legislature, praying the establishment of Stipendiary Magistracy and paid Police Force in the City of Saint John and Parish of Portland; and also to prepare the Draft of a Bill to be submitted to the Legislature for that purpose.

Resolved, That the same Committee do request the Corporation of the City to concur in the Petition.

Resolved, That the Committee consist of the following Gentlemen, viz: The Chairman, Dr. Bayard, and Messrs. R. L. Hazen, G. A. Lockhart, M. H. Perley, W. J. Ritchie, and W. Tisdale.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Meeting are due to W. H. Street, Esquire, for his patient, able, and discreet conduct in the Chair. The thanks of the Meeting were then voted to the Secretary, for his services; and the Meeting adjourned.

MORE INCENDIARISM!—We regret to learn that three attempts have been made during the week to set fire to houses in the City. On Sunday evening the house of Mr. W. Brundage, Jan. in Morris-street, was set on fire by matches thrown into the kitchen, through a window that had been opened by the villain for the purpose. When discovered, the floor was considerably burned.

The second attempt was in a new unfinished house in Brussels-street, near the Water Company's Works, belonging to Mr. J. Lordly. A woman who lived adjacent, hearing an unusual noise in the house soon after dark, went in to ascertain the cause, when she discovered an apparently well dressed man making his escape, and some combustible materials igniting on the stairs. She immediately called Mr. Jackson, (whose house adjoined Mr. Lordly's,) who scraped the burning materials together and threw them into the fire place. A cotton glove and some matches, supposed to have been dropped by the incendiary, were found on the premises, and lodged with Alderman Porter.

The third attempt was made last night in the Lower Cove, on the back premises of Mr. Portmore—the vagabonds, however, became alarmed by some of the inmates of the dwelling house, and made their escape.—Matches were found under shavings—and enough was seen to leave no doubt of the intentions of the parties.

The Mutual Protection Association continue nightly their voluntary duty of watching the City, with highly commendable zeal and alacrity, and we trust their exertions will be crowned with success.
