



ARRIVAL OF THE ACADIA.

On the receipt of our papers by the above Steamer with the English November Mail, we issued the following Extra Gazette, announcing the joyful news of the

BIRTH OF A PRINCE,

HEIR APPARENT TO THE THRONE OF ENGLAND.

LONDON, 10th November, 1841.

The event which has been so anxiously expected took place yesterday, and there is a male heir to the British Throne. The official announcement was made yesterday, in a London Gazette Extraordinary—

"Buckingham Palace, Nov. 9.

"This day, at ten minutes to eleven o'clock, the Queen was safely delivered of a Prince."

Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent remained with the Queen throughout the day, until six o'clock in the afternoon, when Her Royal Highness returned to Clarence House.

The nobility and gentry thronged during the afternoon to Buckingham Palace; where the following bulletin was exhibited:—

"The Queen was safely delivered of a Prince this morning, at forty eight minutes past ten o'clock."

"Her Majesty and the infant Prince are perfectly well."

"Buckingham Palace, Tuesday, Nov. 9, 1841.

Half-past eleven o'clock, A. M."

No other bulletin than the first was issued; and the very absence of such an announcement at the Palace gates, as the day advanced, conveyed to the eager multitude the assurance that every thing proceeded favourably.

The infant Prince, as eldest son of the Monarch, succeeds to the title of Duke of Cornwall, and at once enters upon the enjoyment of the ducal revenue for his sole use. In a few days he will be created Prince of Wales; George the Fourth was so created when he was seven days old. The titles usually conferred on the infant are, the Earl of Chester in England, the Duke of Rothesay, Earl of Carrick, and Baron of Renfrew, in Scotland. The Prince of Wales is a constituent part of the Order of the Garter; hence he becomes a Knight of the Garter as soon as he is created Prince of Wales.

The Queen and the little Duke of Cornwall are going on so favourably that it was resolved yesterday to discontinue the daily bulletins. The last was issued yesterday morning:—

and of the town of Berwick-upon-Tweed.

day of this instant November, or the Sunday

after the respective Ministers thereof shall re-

ceive the same, has been prepared by his Grace

the Archbishop of Canterbury:—

"O merciful Lord and Heavenly Father, by

whose gracious gift mankind is increased, we

most humbly offer unto Thee our hearty

thanks for Thy great goodness vouchsafed to

Thy people, in delivering Thy servant, our

Sovereign Lady the Queen, from the perils of

childbirth, and giving her the blessing of a

son. Continue, we beseech Thee, Thy Fa-

therly care over her; support and comfort her

in the hours of weakness, and day by day re-

new her strength. Preserve the infant Prince

from whatever is hurtful either to body or soul;

endue him, as he advances in years, with true

wisdom; and make him, in due time, a blessed

instrument of Thy goodness to this Church

and nation, and to the whole world. Regard

with thine especial favor our Queen and her

Royal Consort, that they may long live to-

gether in the enjoyment of all earthly happi-

ness, and may finally be made partakers of everlasting

glory. Implant in the hearts of Thy people a

deep sense of Thy manifold mercies, and give

us grace to show forth our thankfulness by du-

tiful affection to our Sovereign, by brotherly love one towards another, and by constant obedience to Thy commandments; so that passing through this life in Thy faith and fear, we may in the life to come be received into Thy Heavenly Kingdom, through the merits and mediation of Thy Blessed Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Yesterday being the first day of Alderman Pirie's Mayoralty, the "The Lord Mayor's show" took place with the usual ceremonies.

Just as the civic procession was about to leave Guildhall, a special messenger arrived from Buckingham Palace, with the announcement that a Prince was born; and a bumper was drunk before starting, as a libation. In the evening there was the banquet at the Guildhall; at which Sir Robert Peel, the Lord Chancellor, many others of the Ministers, and a great number of distinguished guests were present.

The sumptuous bill of fare, with the customary hundreds of soup-tureens and splendid superabundance, figures in the papers of this morning; but what gave piquancy to the entertainment was the event which had taken place in the morning at Westminster. Sir Robert Peel alluded to it in tasteful and appropriate terms.

By favor of custom, Alderman Pirie, as the actual holder of the Mayoralty, is entitled to a Baronetcy on the birth of Prince of Wales during his term of office; but it is understood that Alderman Johnson, who had only vacated the civic chair a few hours before, will also receive the coveted honour.

Queen Victoria is the first Queen Regnant of England who has ever given birth to a Prince of Wales.

It is stated by an evening paper, that "during Her Majesty's recent visit to Claremont, she selected the wife of one of the attendants of that establishment to be wet nurse to the Prince. Her name is Brough, and she is a remarkably healthy person."

Two hours after Her Majesty's accouchement, the Queen remarked that she had not heard the guns in honor of the birth of an heir to the Throne of England. Her Majesty was immediately informed of the orders that had been issued, whereupon the Queen remarked that the guns would not disturb her, and that it was desirable the people should not be led to think, by the observation of unnecessary silence occasioning the breach of a recognized custom, that she was in any state of danger. Her Majesty expressing a wish that the usual salute should be fired, an intimation was despatched to the Horse Guards, and the Park guns were fired accordingly.

According to a correspondent of the Courier, Prince Albert has informed Lord Hill and the Earl of Haddington, that it is the Queen's wish that a return shall be made of those officers of both services who have most distinguished themselves for promotion on this occasion.

This afternoon, the brother of the Queen Dowager arrived in Dover, from the Continent, and after a short stay, proceeded, at a quarter to four, p. m., under a Royal salute, to Sudbury Hall.—Dover Chronicle, Saturday.

The continued indisposition of the Queen Dowager has given rise to the most unfavourable suppositions.

"The Queen Dowager has had another comfortable night. Her Majesty's symptoms remain essentially the same."

"The Queen Dowager's cough was troublesome during the evening of yesterday; but Her Majesty has since had several hours' sleep, and appears refreshed by it."

The Herald is still more encouraging:—

"The health of the Queen Dowager continues gradually to improve, although but slowly, and there is now some hope that a few weeks will restore that illustrious Lady to health."

REINFORCEMENT TO CHINA.—Major General Lord Saltoun, G. C. H., is about to proceed to China, as second in command to Major General Sir H. Gough, G. C. B. The entire force that his Lordship will carry to China will muster about 1,500 men—no unimportant addition to the troops already there. The present Government in this, the first opportunity that has offered to them, are evidently determined that the character and interests of the country shall no longer continue to be hazarded in "a little war."

The following was received by the Mayor of this City yesterday morning:—

Quebec, Nov. 23, 1841.

Sir,—I am commanded by the Administrator of the Government to inform you, that by a despatch received this morning, it appears that Her Majesty's steamer *Saga*, on which the Governor General and his suite were embarked, had been compelled, in consequence of an accident, to put back to Portsmouth, and that Sir C. Bagot would therefore proceed to Canada on board Her Majesty's Ship *Illustrious*, which was expected to sail about the 10th inst. As, however, it would be impossible for that vessel, at this season, to enter the St. Lawrence, His Excellency would proceed at once, either to New York or Boston, and from thence, direct to Kingston, where he may be expected to arrive about the middle or end of December.

The despatches contain no other intelligence which His Excellency considers it necessary to communicate to the public.
