

The Earl of Belfast, eldest son of the Marquis of Donegal, is created a Baron of the United Kingdom—Baron Enniskillen, of Enniskillen, in the county of Donegal, and Carrickfergus, in the county of Antrim.

Lord Barham is made Baron Noel, of Ridlington, in Rutland; Viscount Campden, of Campden, in Gloucestershire; and Earl of Gainsborough, in Lincolnshire.

Sir Hussey Vivian is created Baron Vivian, of Glynn and of Truro, in Cornwall.

Sir Henry Brooke Parnell, the late Member for Dundee, is now Baron Congleton, of Congleton, in Cheshire.

All these creations are in the usual form, with remainder to the heirs male of the new Peer's body lawfully begotten; except that, in default of such issue to the Earl of Stair, the new title is to descend to the heirs-male of his brother, Mr. North Dalrymple, of Cleland.

At the Wesleyan Conference, at Manchester, on Wednesday week, a letter from the Reverend Mr. Hodgson, a member of the Established Church, recommending a union between the Wesleyans and the Church, was discussed at great length. The discussion was renewed on the following day; when it was resolved that a reply should be sent to Mr. Hodgson, simply thanking him for his kind motives in writing the letter, and expressing a desire that greater unanimity of feeling may obtain among all religious denominations. The Conference have also decided that no preacher shall wear a silk gown without the express permission of the Conference; and two clergymen were reproved for having worn the gown in the pulpit.—*Colonial Gazette.*

At two o'clock on Thursday afternoon, Sir Isambard Brunel passed from the Surrey side of the river through the Thames Tunnel, and ascended into the shaft on the Middlesex side. The small portion of the distance, about twenty five feet, now incomplete, is connected with the shaft on the Middlesex side of the river by a driftway, through which, at the end of the Tunnel, Sir Isambard passed. Mr. Page, the acting engineer, was in the shaft; and with the men, received Sir Isambard with loud cheers. He briefly addressed the men, thanking them for their courage and perseverance. About an hour afterwards, Mr. Hawes, M. P., and Mr. Hutton, the late Member for Dublin, accompanied by Mr. Mason, one of the assistant engineers, walked from Rotherhithe, through the Tunnel and driftway to Wapping. In a few months, it is expected, one of the archways will be open for foot passengers.

As Lord John Russell passed through Selkirk, on Saturday last, in returning with his bride from Bowhill to Minto House, he stopped to accept the freedom of the ancient burgh. The ceremony was performed at a hustings in front of the Town-house: the initiatory rite consists of "licking the birse"—that is, dipping a bunch of shoemaker's bristles into a glass of wine and drawing them across the mouth. He made a speech, and received an address from the inhabitants of Galashiels.

Her Majesty has appointed William Allan, Esq., President of the Royal Scottish Academy, her Majesty's dinner for Scotland, vacant by the death of Sir David Wilkie.—*Globe.*

The Postmaster-general has issued an order by which petitions addressed to Parliament, and forwarded by post to members of either Houses, if they do not exceed thirty-two ounces in weight, are exempt from postage, provided they are sent without covers or in covers open at the sides. No letters, however, may be enclosed in such petition intended to be sent free of postage, the practice being illegal; and if any enclosure is found in a petition, it will be subject to the full rate of postage.

**RESTORATION OF THE POST OFFICE REVENUE.**—In Mr. Rowland Hill's paper, read to the Statistical Society, on the results of the new postage arrangements, it is shown, that should the present rate of increase of letters continue, a space of five years from the commencement will suffice for the complete financial success of the plan—that is to say, for the complete restoration of the gross Post Office revenue. In the case of the reduction, in 1825, of the duty on coffee, a reduction of only 50 per cent., it was not till the fourth year that the revenue recovered its former footing; and had that measure been judged of by its immediate results, or even by those of the second or third year, taken abstractedly, it must have been pronounced a financial failure; whereas, it is at present universally recognised as a measure of eminent and undoubted success; and, indeed, the last year, which was the sixteenth since the reduction, yielded a revenue more than double that obtained under the high rates. Nor is there any reason to suppose that the benefit has yet attained its maximum.—*Patriot.*

Government has entered into a contract for the running of a steam-packet weekly from Liverpool to Halifax, Nova Scotia, during eight months of the year, a step of the highest importance to the British Provinces of North America.—*London Watchman.*

On Wednesday last, a Deputation from the Synod of New Brunswick, consisting of the Rev. Mr. Wilson, Moderator, and the Rev. Mr. Stevens, waited on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and presented a congratulatory Address from that Body. The Rev. Dr. Birkmyre, who had also been appointed a member of the deputation, having left Fredericton before the arrival of the other members from Newcastle, was consequently unable to accompany them to Government House. His Excellency received the Deputation very courteously, and was pleased to return a gracious reply.
