

That every Licensed Tavern Keeper shall have a proper place of security for Sleights, Sleds, and other Carriages of Travellers.

7th.—That every Licensed Tavern Keeper shall, at any time when called on by a Magistrate, exhibit or present to his view, the nature and extent of his means of entertainment.

8th.—That every Licensed Tavern Keeper shall cause a copy of the above regulations to be fairly written and posted up conspicuously in his public room.

9th.—That any Licensed Tavern Keeper who shall hereafter be duly convicted of a violation of either of the foregoing regulations, shall be subject to a penalty of not less than Twenty Shillings, nor more than Five Pounds; to be recovered with costs, agreeably to the directions of the Act of Assembly, in such case made and provided.

LADIES' BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

At a Meeting of the Committee of this Society, held on Wednesday the 15th December, the following account of its proceedings, during the past six weeks, was laid by the President before the Meeting:—

"The Ladies' Benevolent Society commenced its operations on the 8th November last, and the Ladies of the Committee having visited the poor in the several divisions of the Town, the result of the information acquired by them, as to the condition of the suffering poor, has been that the resources of the Society has been applied to the relief of 74 families, in supplies of clothing, fuel, and food—26 poor women have been employed by the Society in making up clothing. Since the General Meeting, on the 1st November, arrangements have been made for fitting up the Cholera Hospital, for the reception of those sick persons who do not obtain relief in the Poor House, and also for the secure and reception of lying in women. And it is proposed that in aid of these expenses, the sum of £20 should be advanced by the Society to the Hospital—which sum would be re-accounted for to the Society, in the charges for such patients as the Committee may send in. That this establishment, under Dr. Tollervey's care, will be extremely useful to the community, may be confidently hoped.

The objects contemplated at the General Meeting, in the establishment of Benefit Societies, whereby the poor may acquire the means of protecting themselves and their families against the contingencies of life, should not be lost sight of; and it is hoped that such Societies, on the plan of those which are in successful operation in England, will be soon established in this Town.

No pains have been spared by the visiting Ladies in protecting the Society from imposition; and it may be confidently hoped that its resources have been judiciously applied to the relief of distress and suffering, within the rules of the Society.

Some difficulties have impeded the formation of an Infant School; but the object is one of very great importance;—and temporary accommodation can be obtained, and a competent person engaged to take charge of the children until an efficient school can be formed. It may be worth while to consider whether a signal benevolence would not be conferred on the poor, even by the most imperfect arrangement which would relieve them from the charge of their young children in working hours, and provide for them care and moral culture.

In this case, it might be advisable that the Committee should aid the most indigent in providing infant clothing, by way of encouragement, and with a view to cleanliness in the young children, who are, at present so much apparently neglected.

After the reading of the Report, it was Resolved, That the sum of £20 be appropriated to the expenses of the Cholera Hospital, with a view to entitling the Committee to send patients there, for medical attendance and nursing.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the above sum to Doctor Tollervey, who has superintended the outlays on the Hospital.

As the opinions of certain Members of the Church of England, who are opposed to the views of Dr. Pusey and his Oxford friends, are sometimes misunderstood, and occasionally very imperfectly represented by the favorers of the *Tracts for the Times*; in places where no opportunity is afforded of vindication, I request you will publish the following Extracts from the writings of Divines; which some still dare to think are orthodox, according to the Holy Scriptures, and the Articles, the Liturgy and Homilies of our Church; and I venture further to say, that the doctrine they set out, has been

maintained by many of the most learned, the most talented, and most exemplary Churchmen, from the days of the Reformation to the present time.

A CHURCHMAN.

BISHOP BEVERIDGE.

"2 Cor. 5, 21. For He hath made Him to be sin for us who knew no sin, that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him."

How was Christ made sin for us? Not by our sins inherent in him, that is horrid blasphemy; but by our sin imputed to him, that is true divinity. And as he was made sin for us, not by the inhesion of our sins in him, but by the imputation of our sins to him; so we are made the righteousness of God in Him, by the imputation of His righteousness to us, not by the inhesion of His righteousness in us. He was accounted as a sinner, and therefore punished for us; we are accounted as righteous, and therefore glorified in Him. He was accounted as sinner, for us, and therefore he was condemned; we are accounted as righteous in Him; and so we are justified. And this is the right notion of justification, as distinguished from sanctification. Not as if those two were ever severed or divided in their subjects; no, every one that is justified, is also sanctified; and every one that is sanctified, is also justified. But yet, the acts of sanctification and justification are two distinct things; for the one denotes the imputation of righteousness to us; the other the implantation of righteousness in us. And, therefore, though they be both the acts of God, yet the one is the act of God towards us; the other is the act of God in us. By our sanctification, we are made righteous in ourselves, but not accounted righteous by God; by our justification we are accounted righteous by God, but not made righteous in ourselves.

BISHOP HOPKINS.

"Justification is a gracious act of God, whereby, through the righteousness of Christ's satisfaction imputed, He freely remits to the believing sinner the guilt and punishment of his sins; and through the righteousness of Christ's perfect obedience imputed, He accounts him righteous, and accepts him into love and favour, and unto eternal life. This is justification which is the very sinew and pith of the whole Gospel, and the only end of the Covenant of Grace."

BISHOP DANIEL WILSON.

(In a late charge to the Clergy of Bengal.)

"Preach then, Brethren, more determinately than ever, the *ruined and fallen state of man, as the Holy Scriptures reveal it.* Unfold the unspeakable malignity of sin, as committed against God—the deep and in a proper sense total corruption of our nature in all its powers—our inability of ourselves to do anything spiritually good—our moral responsibility—our guilt, demerit, ruin, condemnation, helplessness—the inconceivable value of the soul—the nearness of Eternal Judgment—the everlasting duration of the miseries of a lost state. And point out the remedy for all them, with the simplicity of the inspired Apostles, 'in repentance towards God, and faith towards our Lord Jesus Christ.' Teach the *atonement and satisfaction made to the Divine Justice and government by the incarnation and obedience unto death, of the consubstantial and coequal Son of God.* Clearly explain that justification is the penitent sinner's being accounted and dealt with, and treated, 'as if he were righteous in God's sight by faith only in the merits of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, and not for his own works and doings;' distinguish, as Hooker did, between justification and sanctification, and boldly preach as he did, that God 'hath made Him who knew no sin, to be sin for us, that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him.' Account this as Luther did, the *articulus sanctis non cadentis ecclesie.*

Teach also the *personality, divinity, and inward work of God the Holy Ghost, the Lord and Giver of life, in all Scriptural fidelity,* as infusing the righteousness of sanctification; as renewing man after the Divine Image; as creating him in Christ Jesus, unto good works, raising him from spiritual death, inscribing the laws of God upon his heart; transforming him in the spirit of His mind; as commencing first, and then carrying on the new birth and life of holiness, which is the preparation and qualification for serving and loving God, both on Earth and in Heaven; and in developing this show the fatal error of limiting or appearing to limit, the determined commencement of all this mighty transformation to the change of state and attendant grace—important and blessed as they are—received by the infants of the faithful in the Sacrament of Baptism.

Teach again, the *indispensable necessity of good works in all their ramifications, as the fruit of faith, and following after justification*; so that by them, a lively faith may be as evidently known as a tree is discerned by its fruit. Enter into all the details of duty, as opened by our Lord in His Sermon on the Mount, and by the Apostles in the practical division of their Epistles. Enforce the perpetual obligation of the moral law upon every human being. Explain the interior life of communion with our Heavenly Father, reconciled to us in Jesus Christ; the duties of private and family Prayer; of diligent study of Holy Scripture; of separation from the follies of the world, and of growth in grace, and the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, to the last hour of life.

Teach further, in connexion with all this, the *constitution of the Christian Church,* the dignity and importance of the Public Worship of Almighty God, the grace and efficacy of the Sacraments, the Divine authority and perpetual obligation of the Lord's Day, and the duty of reasonable subjection to the order and discipline of the Church, as ordained by Christ, its Divine Head. Finally, instruct men to ascribe the whole of their salvation to its purchase, its offers, its application, the merciful will and choice of God in Christ Jesus."



POSTSCRIPT.

WEDNESDAY MORNING,

22d December, 1841.

Just as the Gazette was being issued from the Press, we received our English papers by the December Packet, down to the 1st of that month.

LONDON, Dec. 1, 1841.

We are happy to state that Her Majesty and the infant Prince continue in the enjoyment of perfect health. On Monday afternoon Her Majesty, in company with Prince Albert, was able to take an airing in a close carriage, for the first time since her accouchement.

It is arranged that Her Majesty will remove to Windsor as early as can be considered safe by the Physicians, and that the infant Prince will be baptised in St. George's Hall with a courtly magnificence and regal splendour unknown since the days of George IV.

Her Majesty, wishing to show an act of Royal clemency on the happy occasion of the birth of a Royal Prince, has been pleased to notify to the Right Honourable Sir James Graham, the Secretary of State for the Home Department, that those convicts who have behaved themselves well shall have their punishment commuted; and that those who seem deserving of such a mark of clemency, and who are now lingering on board the hulks at Deptford, Woolwich, Sheerness, Portsmouth, Pembroke, Cork, and other prisons, shall have their liberty granted to them.—*Britannia.*

The Queen, we understand, has already sketched a likeness of the infant Prince, which will immediately be lithographed. The resemblance is said to be perfect, and the circumstances under which it was made cannot fail of giving to it an interest peculiarly its own.—*John Bull.*

When the Duke of Cornwall is shown to the visitors privileged to behold His Royal Highness, he is dressed *en grand tenue*, viz.—with a purple velvet robe and ermine, and a lace cap with a rosette.—*Globe.*
