

ever small, whether in money, fuel, clothing or provisions, will be thankfully received, and a fair account kept thereof.

That an office be opened, to be called the "Emigrant's Office," where a register will be kept of the names and circumstances of applicants, who will there be furnished with advice, information and assistance, as may be required, consistently with the instructions of the Managing Committee.

8. That for this purpose, the Secretary be required to attend at the Office daily, or on such days as the Committee shall think necessary; and that he keep a Register, in which shall be entered the names and circumstances of every Emigrant applying for employment, for land, or for assistance of any kind, and the number in family both males and females, and the places where to be found; and also a Register of the names and places of residence of all persons sending information to the Office of their being ready to furnish employment, and to what extent, to Emigrants and in what capacity.

9. That all applications made to any Member of the Society be referred by ticket to the Secretary.

10. That it be the duty of the Committee of Management to make such necessary arrangements with the Secretary as their means will admit of, for the reception of Emigrants at Woodstock, and getting them forwarded to different parts of the County where employment may be obtained for them, or where Lands are open for settlement, and to furnish the Secretary with the necessary instructions for his guidance, in all cases that do not require to be first submitted to the consideration of the Committee.

11. That it be the duty of the Secretary to attend strictly to the general and all other instructions of the Committee of Management, and that he keep a Book to be called The Minute Book of the Committee of Management, in which he shall enter the proceedings of the Committee at every Meeting thereof, and shall at all meetings of the said Committee submit a statement of his proceedings since the then last preceding meeting, and also his Books of Registry for inspection.

12. That in order to assist the Committee in finding employment for those who may have recourse to this Society—the Inhabitants of Woodstock and the County generally, be requested by public notice in the Telegraph, to make application to the Society at the Office, for such Mechanics, Labourers, and Servants, as they may require, and to the same end, Letters be written by the Secretary in the name of the Society, to the Magistrates, or any other respectable persons in each Parish in the County, enclosing a copy of the rules and requesting similar applications, and also general information as to the number they can employ and the means they possess of furthering the objects of the Society, and soliciting their aid in procuring subscriptions in their respective Parishes towards the funds, and inducing the Inhabitants generally, to become Members thereof, so as to enable the Committee to extend its benefits widely through the County.

13. That it be the duty of the Secretary to furnish to Emigrants applying at the Office, all information in his power relative to the means of their procuring Land for settlement, assistance, or employment for themselves or families, and in all cases where he may require further instructions from the Committee before the then next monthly meeting, it shall be the duty of the President, or (in his absence) of one of the Vice Presidents, to call a special meeting of the Committee, on being applied to by the Secretary for that purpose; and in such case it shall not be necessary to send notice to such Members of the Committee who may be absent from the County at the time, provided the Members so absent shall not exceed five.

14. That there be a meeting of the Committee on the first Monday of every month, at half past three o'clock, P. M., at such place in Woodstock as the Committee may themselves determine on, besides such Special Meetings as may be called at the request of the Secretary, according to the provisions of the 13th Rule; and a general yearly meeting of the Subscribers on the 4th Tuesday in January, at 12 o'clock, noon, at the County Court House in Woodstock, at which general meeting a report of the state of the Society shall be submitted by the Secretary, having first passed the Committee, and also at such annual general meeting the Officers for the ensuing year shall be elected, and any alteration in or addition to the Rules now established may then be made, that the majority of the Members present may deem requisite.

15. That it shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all subscriptions, grants, donations, and other pecuniary contributions to the funds of the Society, and to make all such payments and advances thereon as the Committee of Management may from time to time direct; and that he shall keep a true and correct list of the names of all Members paying their subscriptions or making donations to the Society, with the respective amounts thereof; and shall keep a correct Book of account, in which shall be entered all monies received and paid by him, on account of the Society, which shall be balanced at the end of each month, and submitted to the inspection of the Committee at every monthly meeting.

16. That the Committee of Management be empowered to call a Special General Meeting of the Members of the Society, as often as circumstances may require; but such Special General Meetings shall have no power to elect Officers, except to fill vacancies occurring subsequent to the preceding annual meeting, or to make any alterations in the Rules, but may by a majority of votes determine any other matter relating to the business of the Society, that the Committee of Management may submit to the consideration of the Members then present.

#### [CIRCULAR.]

SIR,—I have the honor to acquaint you that a Society has been organized in this place, under the title of the "Carleton County Emigrant Society," the object of which is to afford employment, information and assistance to Emigrants in the County of Carleton, newly arrived in this Province.

I transmit to you herewith, a copy of the Rules and Regulations of the Society, and beg

your attention more particularly to the 8th, 10th and 12th Rules, which refer to the employment of Emigrants on their arrival in this County.

The Society, in conformity with the 12th Rule, have directed me to request your assistance in extending its advantages to your own immediate neighbourhood, and also to such other parts of the adjacent County as circumstances may place within the range of your influence.

It will be clear to you that no means can be more effectual for inducing an influx of respectable emigration of the operative classes than the certainty that upon his arrival in this County the Emigrant will at once be furnished with employment of the kind to which he may have been accustomed in his own Country; and thus the present exorbitant rate of Farm Labour will be speedily reduced to its proper level.

And as the Society will endeavor to ascertain as correctly as may be, the character and circumstances of each Emigrant who may come within the circle of its operations, its agency will, to a certain extent, be a guarantee that none but honest industrious persons are recommended for employment.

I beg to refer you to the notice already published in the Telegraph, inviting the inhabitants of Woodstock and of the County of Carleton in general, to make application at its Office, for such Mechanics, Labourers and Servants, as they may require.

I have also to request from you general information as to the number and description of Emigrant Mechanics, Labourers or Servants of any kind, to whom yourself or your immediate neighbours could furnish employment, or in what other way you can yourself assist in furthering the design of the Society.

As the annual subscription is so very small, it is confidently hoped that few persons will decline their contribution to an object of so much importance to the settlement and cultivation of this Province, and I have to beg your co-operation in procuring subscriptions to the funds of the Society, and persuading the inhabitants generally, to become Members of the Institution, and that they inform me whenever they may require Labourers, or other assistants, so as to enable the Managing Committee to extend the benefits of the Society widely throughout the County.
