LIEUTENANT COLONEL PETERS' REPLY.

May it please Your Excellency,-For myself, the officers, non commissioned officers and men of the 1st Battalion City Militia, I have the honor to acknowledge the high compliment Your Excellency has this day been pleased to pay them, by presenting, and placing under their charge, this Stand of Colours, and for the highly gratifying and complimentary terms, in which it has pleased Your Excellency to call our attention to the sacred trust reposed in us, to honor, guard and protect them, with devoted lovalty to our Sovereign Queen Victoria, in support of the glorious constitution we are happily living under, and in defence of our country.

Situated as we are, enjoying the blessings of British liberty, protection and feelings, and happy in the wish that they may be transmitted down to future generations; more strongly cemented and united together, I feel, that may say, the Province of New Brunswick stands second to none in Her Majesty's widely extended dominions, for devoted Loyalty.

Early settled as this Province was by a body of Lovalists, who were driven from their homes, (sacrificing property and comfort) preferring as they did, the hardships they endured, in the wilds of this then wilderness Province, that they might secure to their descendants the blessings of British Liberty. Years of priva tions followed, and by dint of their industry the towering forests gave way to their exertions.

In time, the attention of the Mother Country became alive to the importance of her North American Colonies, and the tide of Emigration set towards our shore, and the Province of New Brunswick has rapidly progressed in population, wealth and importance, and become more thoroughly British by the influx of British subjects from all parts of Great Britain.
