UNIVERSITY OF KING'S COLLEGE.

The Examinations usual at this season of the year have received the special attention of the Lieutenant Governor; to whom, with other competent judges accompanying His Excellency, they have furnished a gratifying assurance of the advancement of our youth in the several parts of a liberal education.

The College was examined on Tuesday the 14th inst. After an inspection of the Themes and Classes composed during the Term, the Students were called up, as they had been respectively instructed, in the Classics, Mathematics, and Natural History; and the promptitude and precision with which authors were translated, problems worked, and questions answered, attested the diligence with which their studies had been pursued.

The Students who have kept Michaelmas Term in King's College amount to twenty six; of those who entered on it in September, one having withdrawn from severe indisposition; and four having been added by subsequent matriculation. The number attending the Collegiate School during the half-year has been seventy-four. It thus appears that our Provincial University, in this the twelfth year of its establishment, furnishes not fewer than one hundred of the youthful members of the community with that description of education which may be reasonably expected to qualify them for the honorable and useful discharge of the superior duties to which they may be called. That the system is complete, will not be pretended; but that the efficiency of the institution is in fair proportion to the means actually provided, and the circumstances in which it has been placed, no candid observer will probably be found to deny.

The semi-annual examination of the Collegiate School took place on Tuesday the 21st inst., also before His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, attended by Alfred Reade, Esquire, Private Secretary, and the gentlemen connected with the College, who usually take part in the proceedings on these occasions. Several Ladies and Gentlemen of Fredericton were also present.

The Synopsis of the studies of the several classes, in most of which they were examined, is as follows:—

CLASSICAL and MATHEMATICAL DEPARTMENT.—Under the superintendence of Mr. ROBERTS.

LATIN.

Pars Junior.—The accidence of the Eton Latin Grammar.

Pars Quinta.—Adam's Lectiones Selecte, with Etymological Parsing.

Pars Quarta.—The first six books of Eutropius, with Syntactical Parsing and questions on the subjects translated.

Pars Tertia.—The second and fourth books of Caesar's Commentaries with Parsing.

Pars Secunda.—The second, third, and part of the fourth books of Virgil's *Æneid*, with scanning and Parsing.

Pars Prima.—A portion of Horace's Odes and Satires.

GREEK.

Pars Junior.—Valpy's Greek Grammar.

Pars Tertia.—Valpy's Greek Delectus and Parsing.

Pars Secunda.—Part of the Gospel of Saint Mark, from the Greek Testament.

Pars Prima.—Second and third books of Homer's *Iliad*.

MATHEMATICS.

Third Class.—Part of the first book of Euclid's Elements of Geometry. Algebra to Simple Equations.

Second Class.—The fourth book of Euclid; Ratio and Proportion from Ingram's Mathematical Course. Algebra to Quadratic Equations.

First Class.—Euclid through the 6th Book, with all Playfair's additional Problems and Bell's undemonstrated Problems, at the end of the first book. Algebra to the Binomial Theorem, Plane Trigonometry, ad libitum.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT.—Under the superintendence of Mr. HOLBROOK.

First Class.—English Grammar and Syntactical Parsing, Cyphering, Fractions, Decimals, Involvement and Evolution, Book Keeping, Double and Single Entry, Geography, Maps and Globes, Sacred and Secular History.

Second Class.—English Grammar, Etymological Parsing, Cyphering, Rule of Three, Practice, Geography, Maps, &c.

Third Class.—Reading, Writing, Cyphering, Tables, &c.

The general proficiency exhibited in the various departments, reflects much credit on the zeal and ability of the instructors, and on the assiduity and talents of the pupils.

In the Classical Department under Mr. ROBERTS, a very thorough knowledge was manifested of the respective Authors, and while the sense of the original was generally given in clear and intelligible language, the result of an investigation more than usually searching and minute, showed that the literal rendering of the various members of the sentences was well understood, and consequently that the knowledge of the language acquired, was based on an accurate acquaintance with the Grammar. The passages on which the Examination took place, being selected at will by the Examiners, afforded moreover a sure test for forming a fair opinion of the progress achieved.

In the Mathematics, the Examination in which was principally conducted by Professor JACK, the pupils acquitted themselves in a manner highly commendable.

The English Department, under Mr. HOLBROOK, also called for the approbation of the Examiners, particularly in the branch of Sacred History, and the use of the Globe.

On the whole, the appearance of the School on this occasion, was considered to exhibit a very marked and decided improvement.

For several years past we have endeavored to direct public attention to the resources of the Province, and the advantages it offers to industrious immigrants. In our last we adverted to the mineral wealth of New Brunswick, and referred to the notice which has been taken of its natural productions in England; and also the view taken by the London Standard, in regard to emigration.

Since our last paper was issued, we have ascertained from the most correct source, that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in order to induce persons to cultivate the soil, and thereby to improve their own condition as well as that of the Province, has rendered the mode of obtaining land so easy, that even the poorest persons may soon become land owners and make themselves independent. When a number of persons unite in forming a settlement, fifty acres of land may be obtained from the Government upon credit, merely by paying one year's interest, (which only amounts to a few shillings,) in advance. Fifty acres adjoining each lot will be reserved for each settler, should he be disposed to purchase it within a reasonable time. Now as sums of money are granted yearly by the Province to make roads to new settlements, the means of obtaining the money, for at least a part of the payment for these lands, are at once supplied upon the most favourable conditions; and the very money paid by each settler for his lot may be saved to be expended in making a road to his dwelling.

Several large tracts of excellent land have been already surveyed, and persons are thus invited to come forward and settle them. When it is considered that most of the land in New Brunswick is capable of being cultivated with profit, and large tracts are of a superior quality, it is impossible that greater encouragement can be held out either to the present inhabitants of the country, or to those who may emigrate from Great Britain. It is to be hoped that associations now forming in England for the purpose of opening the channels of emigration upon an extensive scale, will not lose sight of the wide field open in this Province for their labours. It would be in vain to enumerate all the advantages, soil, rivers, lakes, roads, facilities of transportation, and other benefits offered to the settler; nor can it be possible that a country where the most enduring resources have been hitherto but imperfectly known and appreciated, will any longer remain without receiving a large share of those British subjects, who, from necessity, must find a home from the place of their birth.

The present depressed state of business in

our City, and the late disastrous fires, have thrown many out of employment; but it is peculiarly fortunate that such persons have the means of providing for their families, and of becoming happy and useful, placed within their reach. We are informed that Dr. Gesner has already associated, in two companies, no less than fifty persons, with families, and arrangements are in progress to afford them, upon the most reasonable terms, a sufficient quantity of land for cultivation; and we cannot but hope that the example of this gentleman will be followed by others, and that the tide of immigration will begin to flow towards our shores.

There is no real cause for the gloom that hangs over the minds of many of our citizens; the Province contains within itself the elements of wealth and strength, and by directing industry to these, its legitimate objects, the result will be equal to the most sanguine wishes of every friend to general prosperity. Fifty eight years ago, the site of Saint John was a dense thicket of spruce and cedar, and in half of that number of years hence, it will rank among the first commercial cities in the world, whatever jealous neighbours may state to the contrary.

ANOTHER ALARM OF FIRE!—Between eleven and twelve o'clock on Tuesday night, our citizens were again aroused by an alarm of Fire. The Volunteer Nightly Watch in the lower part of Duke's Ward, (Messrs. F. A. Wiggins and R. S. Matthew,) having discovered smoke and flames issuing from a building in rear of the large house occupied by Mr. Flanagan, as a tavern and sailor's boarding-house, in Duke Street, gave the alarm and hastened to the spot, when they found that the inmates had been awakened, and some of the women and children were hurrying from the scene of danger almost naked. A timely discovery of the fire having thus happily been made, the flames were soon extinguished, and some of the numerous inmates by which the premises are inhabited were thus providentially saved from a horrible death, as it would have been almost impossible for them all to have escaped had the fire got much headway before it was discovered.—There is a different opinion as to the origin of the fire; but we are inclined to consider it rather the result of accident than of design.

ANOTHER ATTEMPT.—We are informed that on Monday night an attempt was made to set fire to the house of Mr. Samuel Reynolds, at Indian Town, by placing a quantity of dry split wood, shavings, &c., against the house, and setting fire thereto.—When found, the materials were partially burnt, but the fire had gone out of itself before doing any damage. Had this attempt succeeded, in all probability nearly the whole of Indian Town would have been destroyed, as the night was cold and the wind very high.—Chronicle.
