

HALIFAX, Sept. 7.

ARRIVAL OF THE PRINCE DE JOINVILLE.—The French frigate Belle Poule, commanded by Prince de Joinville, third son of the King of France, and the man-of-war brig Casand, of the same nation, arrived here, from Newfoundland, yesterday afternoon, about one o'clock. Considerable interest was manifested as these strangers came up the harbour, and a number of persons were assembled on the several wharves, anxious to witness the novel sight. The Belle Poule is a large frigate of 60 guns, and, being under the command of the King's son, may be considered as one of the first of her class in the French Navy.—Those who have had a nearer view than ourselves, describe her as a handsome and powerful craft—well equipped, manned, and ordered; but there was something to our eye, as she sailed passed, foreign to the trim appearance and taut rig of a British frigate. This is the ship that conveyed Napoleon's remains from St. Helena, and the Prince was in her on that mission. Shortly after anchoring, nearly off the Dock Yard, the Belle Poule saluted with twelve guns, which was answered from field pieces on Citadel Hill, by a Royal salute of twenty one guns. She also saluted the Commodore, which was returned from the Winchester. Previous to this, she had been boarded by Dr. Hoffman, the health officer—and the yellow flag was hoisted at the foremast head, denoting sickness on board; the brig was also boarded, and the quarantine flag similarly displayed. The Doctor, we regret to say, has reported several cases of small pox in the Belle Poule. The brig is healthy, but has been in constant communication with the frigate.

LANDING OF PRINCE DE JOINVILLE.—The quarantine restrictions having been somewhat relaxed, the Prince de Joinville landed at the Queen's Wharf this day at twelve o'clock, noon, in a fourteen-oared barge. A guard of honor, and the Band of the 37th Regiment, commanded by Captain Durham, were in attendance. The Commander of the Forces, the Governor's Aides-de-camp, and most of the Staff, received the Prince, who was accompanied by several of his officers. The Governor's carriage was in waiting, into which the Prince immediately stepped, and was driven off to Government House, under a salute of cannon from the Citadel Hill, the Guard presenting arms, &c.—He is rather a good looking young man, somewhat above the middle height, of clear olive-tinted complexion, and was simply attired in a naval uniform, differing in appearance very little from that used in the British service, and wore a star on the left breast. A crowd of persons were gathered to witness his landing, and welcomed him with three hearty British cheers. About half-past twelve, the Prince left Government House in His Excellency's carriage, and arriving at the Queen's Wharf, entered his barge on his return to the Belle Poule, when he was saluted by the Commodore, which was quickly returned by the French frigate.—Times.

Died.

At White's Point, Grand Lake, on Friday, the 10th instant, Mrs. Margaret Ann, wife of Mr. William Green, of Fredericton, aged 19 years and 6 months. At Charlotte Town, Prince Edward Island, on the 28th ultimo, Anna Maria, consort of the Honorable Chief Justice Jarvis, and eldest daughter of the late Doctor John Boyd, of the Medical Staff—deeply deplored by her family and a numerous circle of relatives and acquaintances, to whom her many virtues had endeared her.

At Grand Lake, on the 4th ultimo, at the hospitable mansion of Mr. John Belmain, while on her return from St. John, where she had been for medical advice, after nearly six days of the most excruciating pain, which she bore with resignation to the Divine will, Mary, wife of James Butler, Esquire, aged 43 years. She was, for upwards of fifteen years, a respectable member of the Baptist Church at that place, and departed this life in hope of a glorious resurrection; leaving a disconsolate husband and seven children, to mourn the loss of a kind companion and tender mother—and the community at large, of a kind and peace-making neighbour. "The memory of the just is blessed."
