All hands concurred in the opinion that it was the wreck of a large steamer. It may or may not have been part of the hulk of the "President." If, as has been conjectured, the above mentioned vessel struck on the ice off Newfoundland, it is highly probable that the great Atlantic current, which sets in from the North during the summer, may have drifted the ill-fated ship thus far to the southward.

The Moderator, Dr. Gordon, together with Dr. McFarlan, of Greenock, Dr. Buchanan, of Glasgow, Mr. Bannerman, of Ormiston, Mr. Candlish, Robert Bruce, Esq., of Kennet, and John Hamilton, Esq., advocate, are at present in London, as a deputation to Her Majesty's Government, in regard to the Church question. Tranquillity has been restored in France, both in the capital and the departments.

THE ALBION AND ITS NEW PLATE.—The Albion of this morning is embellished by a noble engraving of Windsor Castle, the principal residence of British Royalty. It is a picture which is of itself worth a year's subscription price of the excellent paper in which it appears; but as we have repeatedly taken occasion to say, the Albion is one of the best foreign papers ever established in a country in which its editor is an alien. It is conducted with undeviating legerism towards the Government and people of the country in which it is published, at the same time that it maintains a manly loyalty to its native sovereign.
