## A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS a Proclamation, bearing date the twenty sixth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty seven, was issued by the Lieutenant Governor, forbidding all persons from occupying any part of the Wild Lands within this Province, comprehending the Territory in dispute between Great Britain and the United States of America, known under the denomination of the *Disputed Territory*, or trespassing thereon by cutting Timber or otherwise: And whereas by another Proclamation, bearing date the twenty second day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine, this prohibition was repeated, and the Warden of the said Territory was duly appointed and authorized to arrest, seize, take and destroy all Timber which might be cut in violation thereof: And whereas it is deemed necessary that the aforesaid prohibition should continue to be strictly enforced; I do hereby call upon and direct all Peace Officers and other Liege Subjects of Her Majesty within this Province to be aiding and assisting in enforcing the same, and also in effecting the seizure of any Timber cut in violation thereof.

## A PROCLAMATION.
