The Bank Account, under the Act 2d Vict. cap. 44, allows an interest of 4 per cent. on Deposits, as well as on sums that may be drawn out by the Treasurer. A credit being allowed on the payment of Provincial duties, this Account was deemed expedient to enable the Treasurer to pay promptly all demands against the Province, but the increased expenditure having outstripped the limits of this account, the Treasurer has been obliged to put a number of Warrants on interest, at the rate of six per cent. agreeably to the provisions of the previous Act of 4th Wm. 4, cap. 43.

LETTER FROM ATTORNEY GENERAL AS TO PENALTIES UNDER SEAMEN'S ACT.

Fredericton, 5th February, 1842.

The proceeds of these Bills were applied informers, for penalties incurred by the defendants therein named, for the non-importation of Seamen, The Expenditure of the Province, in consequence of very large sums being appropriated to opening provide for a regular supply of Seamen for new Ships fitted out or loaded in the Province"; which Act was subsequently disallowed by Her Majesty, in consequence of which all further proceedings

The account herewith rendered, states the amount which has been received by me on those Prosecutions. The Act provided that one half of all penalties should be paid to the person who sued and prosecuted for the same; and the other half into the Treasury of the Province, for the use and support of Sick and Disabled Seamen.

The moiety of these penalties, which have been received, was paid by me to the several prosecutors, shortly previous to the receipt of the Despatch announcing the Royal disallowance.

And it will be now for the Executive to direct, whether the remainder shall be paid into the Treasury, or returned to the different persons from whom the same was received.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY-

The Clerical Members of the Church Society of this Archdeacoury, now assembled in Fredericton, are desirous to add their tribute of respect, to those which Your Excellency has already received from so many quarters; and to assure you that, by no class of Her Majes y's Subjects in this Province, are the great objects, which are understood to occupy your constant attention, regarded with greater interest, than by the whole body of the Clergy.

Our prayers are continually offered up for all Schools and Seminaries of sound learning and religious education, and gladly will we give such aid, as may be within our province, to the improvement of such institutions of that kind, as may exist in our respective Districts.'

We pray likewise for concord, order, and security, among all classes and conditions of men, and shall be always found striving to promote them in every way consistent with the duties of our sacred calling.

We are anxious to see the industrious emigrant judiciously assisted in the commencement of his arduous undertaking, as a settler in the wilderness; and that he should not be cut off from the benefit and comfort to be derived from social worship, pastoral superintendence, and religious instruction

And, being given to understand that all these are objects which Your Excellency is, labouring with exemplary earnestness to promote, you have our most cordial wishes for your success, and our prayers that the blessing of the Great God of our Fathers may attend you and your family.

To which His Excellency was pleased to Reply as follows :-

REVEREND GENTLEMEN,-

I have derived very sincere gratification from the Address which you have presented to me, and as a Member of the Church, I return you my cordial acknowledgments for the interest you have taken in the objects which I hope to see accomplished for the benefit of the people of this Province.

I appreciate highly, the aid which you are prepared to afford, in the improvement of the Schools and Seminaries, and I concur with you in desiring that they may be rendered the ligious education to the rising generation.

Your anxiety for the preservation of concord, 45 acres, in block 18, Carleton, head of north order, and security, among all classes and conditions of the people, will, I hope, ne justly estimated by them, and that these blessings, under Providence, may be perpetuated to this Christian Community.

In promoting the settlement of the Province, I should indeed lament if social worship, pasteral superintendence, and religious instruction, should fail to be the primary object of attention with all who are engaged with me in this undertaking.

Your prayers and good wishes for the success of my humble exertions in such a cause, are truly acceptable to me. I am well aware that they must be unavailing without the protection which you have invoked, and on which I implicitly rely in all that relates to the duties of my station, and the welfare of those who may nearly or remotely be dependent on me.

ORATORIO.

This long expected Musical Festival took

place in Christs' Church on Friday last, and, we believe, we speak the sentiments of all with whom we have conversed on the subject, that the whole of the evening's entertainment was arranged in a manner highly creditable to the projectors and committee, under whose management it was conducted. The coup d'æl on entering the Church was imposing and beautiful-the performers (nearly 70 in number,) being judiciously disposed of in front, and on each side of the Organ, on seats one elevated above the other, while the lights were distributed to the best advantage. The skilful arrangement of the pieces at the commence-120 acres, lot 32, Salmon Creek, surveyed ment, done away with the awkwardness of introducing the audience at once into strange Music, so that the full force of the company did not show itself, until the splendid Chorus "Awake the Trumpet's lofty sound" burst forth with such a power, and yet with such precision, that many good judges pronounced it to be admirably executed. This Chorus was immediately followed by the Solo "Ye men of Judah" which was most melodiously sung by Miss C. Colebrooke, and had a most pleasing effect, after the volume of sound which had just preceded it :-- another Solo was next song in a clear and rich Tenor voice by Mr. Foster, which was followed by a Quartette in which Lady Colebrooke condescended to take a part, assisted by Miss Colebrooke, Hon. Judge Carter, and A. Reade, Esquire, which was admirably and skilfully performed. The latter Gentleman also sung several Solos with great feeling and expression-Mr. STEPHENS was in good voice, and sung in his usual correct and animated style, and was of much assistance in the Choruses; -during the evening several Recitatives were well snng by Mrs. COSTER and others, leading to Choruses, and the effect of the Chorus singers rising en masse, at a given signal, and, as with one voice, pouring forth their joyons strains, had a most sublime effect. The instrumental accompaniments were admirable-Mr. SEUME, Master of the Band of the 36th Regiment, played the leading Violin-Mr. Tyler also, Master of the 69th Band, led the Violas, and several of the same excellent Band formed part of the Orchestra; Mr. GARDINER presided at the Organ and did his part ample justice. We cannot conclude these brief remarks without expressing the obligations which the Community must feel to Lady Colebrooke, for her condescension in having taken so personal an interest in the whole affair, not merely in contributing largely to their entertainment, but in giving a stimulus to the musical taste of our little town, which will, we hope, be available on a future occasion, while Her Ladyship feels amply compensated by the full success that has attended her efforts.
