CHURCH SOCIETY OF THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

February 10th, 1842, being the day appointed for the Anniversary Meeting of the Church Society, on the preceding day the Clergy and Lay Deputies assembled in General Committee in the National School House; Divine Service having been celebrated in Christ's Church. Present, The Ven. the Archdeacon, Rev. Dr. Alley, Dr. Thompson, Frederick Coster, S. D. Lee Street, James Hudson, William E. Scovill, J. Sedgfield Thompson, John M. Sterling, James W. Disbrow.

The following Gentlemen attended as Lay Deputies, the Hon. G. F. Street and A. Edwin Botsford, William J. Bedell, George J. Dibblee, Charles Lee, Mark Needham, William Pyewell, and Charles P. Wetmore, Esquires.

Read the Accounts of William J. Bedell, Esquire, the Treasurer, made up to January 1, shewing a balance in his hands of £187 1s. 4d.

Read Mr. Bedell's Account of the Funds set apart for "Missionary Visits," shewing that the amount of that Fund is £678 9s. 7d., of which £635 10s. 7d., is at interest on endorsed notes.

Read the Secretary's Account of the distribution of the Books imported in 1841 from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge.

Read a List of the Books now in the hands of the Secretary, remaining from the importations of 1839, 1840, and 1841, of the value of £25 11s. 4d. Currency.

Read a statement shewing the operations of the Society during the past year.

Reports from the following Local Committees, were laid before the Committee, viz: Saint Andrew's, Saint Stephen's, Woodstock, Kingston and Springfield, Miramichi, Glenelg, Bathurst, Shediac and Bay de Verte.

Resolutions of Appropriation.

Resolved, That such sum be taken from the Collections for General Purposes, as will make up, with the Collections limited to that object, the sum of £50, the same to be added to the Fund for "Missionary Visits"; and that a sum not exceeding £100, be placed at the disposal of the Executive Committee for "Missionary Visits to neglected places."

Resolved, That such sum be taken from the Collections for General Purposes, as will make up, with the Collections limited to that object, the sum of £30, the same to commence a Fund for founding "Divinity Scholarships," to be put out at interest by the Treasurer.

Resolved, That the sum of £175 be placed at the disposal of the Executive Committee, for the "Building and Enlarging of Churches and Chapels," and that it be an instruction to the Committee, to comply with the recommendations of the several Local Committees.

Resolved, That such sum as will purchase a Bill of Exchange for £50 Sterling, be transmitted to the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, for a supply of Prayer Books of various kinds; and that the balance of the Society's available Funds, be applied to the purchase of Books and Tracts suitable for Distribution, Libraries and Schools.

ANNIVERSARY MEETING, February 10.

The Archdeacon having addressed the Meeting.

Read the Statement of the operations of the Society during the past year: the Resolutions of Appropriation of the General Committee; and the Treasurer's Accounts.

Resolved, on Motion of the Hon. the Master of the Rolls, that it be recommended to the General Committee at their next Meeting, to take into consideration the expediency of at once establishing one or more Divinity Scholarships in King's College, Fredericton.

Resolved, on Motion of the Rev. S. D. Lee Street, 1st. That in future, all Local Committees do send in their Annual Reports, (or abstracts thereof,) to the Executive Committee, on or before the 20th day of January in each and every year: 2nd. That in order to make the General Report more interesting and explanatory, and to prevent confusion at the Anniversary Meeting, it shall in future be the duty of the Executive Committee, to prepare from the several Reports so to be sent in, one full and general Report of all the proceedings and state of the Society, and its different Branches throughout the Province, with any other matter that the Committee may think important to be introduced in such Report:

3rd. That no Report of any Local Committee shall be introduced or noticed in the General Report of the Society for that year, unless sent in within the time prescribed by the above Resolution: 4th. That the Secretary do transmit a copy of the foregoing Resolutions to each of the Local Committees, as soon as possible.

Resolved on Motion of George Botsford, Esquire, that a Committee be appointed to collect Subscriptions in the City and County of Saint John, to the purposes of this Society, and that the following Gentlemen be nominated as such Committee, viz: H. Bowyer Smith, Alfred L. Street and George Wheeler, Esqs.

Read a Letter from the Secretary to the Archdeacon, informing him that the Board of Managers of the New York Tract Society had forwarded to him, through the Rev. Mr. Carder, ten thousand pages of Tracts, as an expression of kind and brotherly feeling on the part of that Society, towards the Church Society; whereupon **Resolved**, That the Secretary be requested to return to the Rev. Mr. Carder the grateful thanks of the Church Society, to be by him communicated to the Board of Managers, for this valuable and acceptable expression of kind and brotherly feeling on the part of that excellent Society.

The Rev. Dr. Thompson gave notice of a motion for a change of the day for the Anniversary Meeting.

Resolved, on Motion of the Rev. Dr. Alley, that the thanks of this Meeting are justly due to the Rev. Frederick Coster, for the very efficient manner in which he has hitherto discharged gratuitously the laborious and important duties of Secretary to the Society.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Society be given to the Rev. John M. Sterling, for his zealous services as Assistant Secretary, and Secretary to the Executive Committee.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Society be given to W. J. Bedell, Esquire, for his valuable services as Treasurer.

Resolved, That His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, be requested to accept the office of Patron of this Society.

LADIES' BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

At a General Meeting of the Committee of the Fredericton Ladies' Benevolent Society, held on Tuesday the 15th inst., the following Report was read:—

The Secretary has much pleasure in laying before the Committee a short account of the proceedings of the Society since the last General Meeting; for although our exertions and the relief afforded, have been by no means commensurate with the calls of the poor upon our compassion, we nevertheless have the comfort of knowing that in many cases, not only has physical distress been mitigated, but the delicate and sorrowing have been cheered, and the blessing of some who were ready to perish has come upon us,—a reward sufficient in itself to all—but to those who, in this undertaking, are actuated by a principle of love to the Saviour of the poor, it is only a slight foretaste of the happiness they will experience in the day when it shall be said to them—"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

It is found on referring to our books that 42 families have received partial assistance, in food, fuel, bedding and clothing, since the last report—and 16 women have been supplied with work, though to the very limited amount of £2 9 4.

It is a very gratifying feature in the character of most of our applicants, that they are more anxious to be enabled to assist themselves by work, than to obtain gratuitous relief; and it is extremely painful to be obliged as we frequently are, to refuse employment, when it is solicited, even with tears. It is most desirable that some method should be suggested, and that speedily, for affording permanent employment to our poor population.

It will no doubt afford much satisfaction to those persons who feared, that an organized system of relief for the suffering poor, would tend to increase pauperism amongst us, to learn that we are very far from finding this to be the case; that, on the contrary it has stimulated them to increased personal exertion in their own behalf; and we can conscientiously testify, that many who at first came only for charity, influenced probably by the reasoning, accompanied by the friendly sympathy of the different Ladies who have interested themselves in their state, now improve work and work only. We have in repeated instances been told "give us work of any kind and we do not ask you to give us anything else; we can support ourselves and our families if you will but give us employment."

The Committee will also be glad to learn that under the personal superintendence and care of Doctor Tolderry, the Hospital, to which they at the last meeting allotted £20, has proved an important benefit to the community. Six patients have been admitted, and Doctor Tolderry assured our Secretary that, under Providence, he considered three of those persons indebted to this provision of your bounty for their lives. Three of those persons have been dismissed with restored health—one is now convalescent, and two are still under the Doctor's care. Another subject which will no doubt engage the attention of the Committee is the Infant School. A principal part of the work supplied to the poor women has consisted of garments for children, with a view to fitting them for attendance on this School, which it is hoped, will speedily be in operation.

After the reading of the Report, the Committee was requested to give their favorable consideration to a plan and estimate of expenses prepared by James Buchanan, Esquire, Her Majesty's Consul for the State of New York, with a view to the establishment of "Colonial Sanctuaries," for the instruction and preservation from crime of destitute young females. Mr. Buchanan has taken up this subject in a most practical manner; but it is one of so much importance to the community at large, and so richly deserving the attention of all classes of Society, that we shall endeavour shortly to lay the entire Pamphlet before the public; not doubting that the excellence of the cause will win for it an interest in every enlightened and candid mind.

A READE, Esquire, then handed in a letter of acknowledgment to the Committee and others who had co-operated with him, which was read and is as follows:—

GENTLEMEN,—On the occasion of the last Meeting of the Committee, you were kind enough to express your thanks to me for my exertions in bringing the Performance of the Oratorio to a successful issue.

I trust you will believe that I am fully sensible of the kindness which dictates that expression of your sentiments, at the same time, and while estimating very highly the value of your approbation, I cannot but repeat here what I expressed at that meeting, viz, that it would have been my desire that no notice should have been taken of my individual exertions on the occasion, feeling as I did that so many were equally entitled with myself to thanks for their zealous co-operation, and that it would be almost unfair to place me prominently forward. Having been overruled in these objections, I can only receive your testimony with those sentiments of regard which my connection with you for the period during which I have been entrusted with the conduct of the Oratorio has engendered.

It must be obvious that without your support and indefatigable exertions all my endeavours would have been useless, and I beg to return to you gentlemen individually, and the performers generally, my best thanks for the readiness with which you and they have responded to the calls on their time and labour, to which, much more than to any efforts of mine, must be attributed the success of my undertaking.
