GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

VARIOUS Petitions having been presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by parties desirous to purchase Lands, from which it appears that the Petitioners have misunderstood the Law, and the terms upon which the Land can be procured, —The attention of Applicants is hereby called to the subjoined Clause of the Civil List Act, by which they will observe that all Grants of Land, unless made upon sale at *Public Auction to the highest Bidder*, shall be null and void.

“V. And be it enacted, That all and every Grant, Lease or other assurance which, during the continuance of this Act, shall be made or granted by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, of any Lands, Tenements, Rents, Woods, Mines, Royalties, Revenues, or other hereditaments within this Province, now belonging or hereafter to belong to His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, whereby any estate or interest whatsoever in Law or equity shall or may pass from His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, save and except as hereinafter provided, shall be utterly void and of none effect unless such Grant, Lease or assurance be made upon sale or rent to the highest Bidder at Public Auction in this Province, due notice having been first given thereof in the Royal Gazette, and unless all such sums of money and rents as may be payable in consideration of such Grant, Lease or assurance be made payable to His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors during the whole term or time of the continuance thereof respectively.”

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, accompanied by A. Reade, Esquire, Colonel Hayne and Lieutenant Wilson, left Fredericton for St. Stephens on Thursday last the 20th inst., where he arrived the same evening by the new Road passing through the Harvey Settlement.

On Friday His Excellency visited Milltown and afterwards proceeded to St. Andrews, which place he had visited in the last year, and on Saturday he prosecuted his journey to Saint John, where he remained on Sunday.

His Excellency proceeded on Monday to Kingston, and on Tuesday returned in the New Brunswick, Steamer, to Fredericton.

It is expected that His Excellency will visit Sunbury and Queen's Counties in the course of next week.
